"Capt. Hugh Hunter is without doubt a man of great courage. Having served with honor in World War II and the Korean mess he has to be. The USO representative admits without blinking an eye, however, that he has one great fear. He hates to speak before women. As he says, "You just never know what to say."

Proving that he is a brave man, Hunter made one of the most interesting speeches we have heard in recent months before an audience of mostly women Monday night. He was speaking to a group of sorority "girls." There were a few husbands thrown in, but mostly it was women.

Hunter told of driving a famous actress in Korea to a USO stage. "We didn't have much of a conversation," he said. "She asked me if I knew anyone in Hollywood and I said no." That was all the conversation.

Then he told of the war! "We were dug in in a hilly section and had a working agreement with the Chinks," he said. "We would hold a certain hill in the day and then they would hold it at night. Well they got some new Chinks in and they didn't know the set up and tried to keep the hill on a 24-hour basis. That started a little war in itself. We brought up re-enforcements and the big guns and planes began to pound the hill. Soon we were working on schedule again. Those Chinks kept putting in new guys; however, and we had to do the thing all over again."

Hunter said he would have to go along with the thinking of Gen. Douglas MacArthur. "We have the spirit, the power and the will to win the war," he said. "But they just wouldn't let us go."

We have said it before and we plan to say it again. Trying to pick winners in gridiron games is a stupid pastime. It is, indeed, a waste of time. However, since our luck must change sometime, you will probably see us try it again.

USO Is Needed More Than Ever

"I believe that we will be fighting an all out war in Korea in the next few months," Hugh W. Hunter, USO field representative told Beta Sigma Phi members Monday night at a meeting of the two chapters of the sorority in the home of Mrs. Marene Johnson, Eastland county chairman for the 1953-54 USO fund drive. Hunter repeated the remark at a combined luncheon meeting of the Rotary and Lions clubs Tuesday.

War was not the chief topic in Hunter's off-the-cuff talk, however. He admitted without excu-

s that his reason for being in Eastland was to raise funds for the USO. And the retired Army captain sent his appeal home.

Speaking of his experiences with the USO while serving in Korea, Hunter said the USO "was the only morale builder the boys had unless you want to count beer rations and mail call. I'll go along with mail call as a morale builder, it always is."

Hunter described a visit by Betty Hutton to Korea in 1952 with a USO outfit. He happened to drive Miss Hutton's jeep.

"She gave a terrific show," he said. "Those 18 and 19-year-old boys came crawling out of their foxholes and were the greatest audience she ever had. She had a singing group with her, the Skylarks, that was also great. But, then it wasn't just the Betty Huttons, it was a batch of little people too."

"You see," Hunter said, "when a little guy gets before an audience like that he performs above his head. You can take my word for it. Ninety-nine out of 100 GIs attend every USO show they get a chance to. And they are always a good audience."

Hunter said, now that fighting in Korea is over—or at least delayed—the need for USO does not stop.

"In fact," he said, "we need it more now than ever. We have all of our divisions in reserve over there now, and a group of GIs that have nothing to do have to have an escape valve. During my stay in Korea we saw five and six shows a week while in reserve. They need that many now."

The state goal in the Texas United Defense Fund-USO drive this year is \$775,000. Eastland county's quota is \$4,046 and the city of Eastland's quota is \$500.

Pete Parker is county treasurer for the drive.

In introducing Hunter Parker said "We are indeed privileged to have Capt. Hunter as our guest. He has seen what the USO has done and is doing for our boys and girls at home and overseas, and we are looking forward to an informative and inspirational address."

Hunter served in both World War II and the Korean conflict. He was Headquarters Commandant on Okinawa during World War II and in Korea was a company commander.

Four Day Rain Slows Harvest; Aids Grain

Entire County Gets More Than Inch Rain

Heavy rain that began Thursday, slowed to a drizzle Saturday, and then fell hard again Sunday night, brought welcome moisture to Eastland county, but put a kink in the peanut and cotton harvest deals.

Eastland, Ranger and Cisco all received good rains as well as most other sections of the county.

Peanut buyers in the area said the harvest could be slowed by a week or ten days because of the rain. They estimated that the Eastland county crop was halfway harvested at the present time.

Farmers in the area reported that their peanut hay was blackened, thus lowering its grade. Proteins are still in the hay, however, and it is now a complete loss.

Eastland reported the heaviest rainfall in the county. A measurement of 2.44 inches was reported officially. In Ranger rain totaled 1.6 inches. Cisco had 1.6 inches, Gorman 2.5 inches and Rising Star 1.5 inches. Other cities in this area also reported good rains. Pallinger had 1.2 inches, Breckenridge, 2.1 and Coleman 1.5.

Farmers agreed that the present period of rain, added to the rain just a little over a week ago, has completely snapped the drought.

Judge Long's Home Declared Total Loss

Lightning struck the home of Judge Milburn S. Long, 515 South Hillcrest, Eastland, Thursday night during a downpour of rain and the structure was burned almost to the ground.

Eastland Fire Chief Tack Kilborn said the house was a complete loss. He estimated the loss at approximately \$15,000.

Eastland volunteer firemen answered the alarm at about 10:30 p.m. They put out the blaze but early Friday morning—about 3 a.m.—the house caught fire again and this time burned to the ground.

The Longs were out of town when the house caught fire the first time.

And some of the things the budgies do learn to say. Owners have learned that the birds can be worse than a child when it comes to picking up phrases they shouldn't. It's common belief that budgies can speak only a few

words. The truth, however, is that they can speak up to 500 words, and maybe more.

Perhaps this area's first parakeet raiser was Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Jones of Ranger. The Joneses got in the business in a small way about 20 years ago. They purchased three birds, then later five pair more. With that they now have thousands and sell hundreds almost every week. If you think there isn't a market for them you are wrong. Mrs. Jones said they have sold more than 2,000 since Jan. 1 of this year.

H. M. Hart has one of the main flocks in Eastland. He has several "talkers."

And what do some of the big talking little birds say.

Take Mackey McHenry of Ranger for instance. When customers enter the McHenry Beauty Shop they are greeted with "My name is Mackey McHenry, what is your name?" Usually he adds "I'm a routin, tootin cowboy from Ranger, Texas."

Joe Jarrett of Eastland ranks among the best talkers in the area. Joe is getting in shape to play football. When J. C. tells him to do his exercises he flaps his wings and counts up to five. He also says "Aiful Coffee" when he smells coffee in the morning. Joe is quite a traveler. He has been to Illinois twice and enjoyed both vacations.

Sweetie Pie Wallace of Ranger says "Sweetie Pie is mama's little chicken." He brags that he's sweet saying "Sweetie Pie is so sweet," but he does admit at times that "Sweetie Pie is a bad, pesky bird."

Men Hold Office Women Do Work

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following was swiped from the President Eisenhower special edition of The Mission Times, Mission, Texas, kindly loaned to us by Mr. H. E. McCannless of Cisco.)

Men hold three times as many church offices as women but women do twice as much of the church work.

These facts were found in a study of 412 farm families in six southeastern states.

Nearly all the families said they had "grace at meals." Practically none have family prayers morning or evening. Nearly all said they read the Bible "regularly," but few could recall the last time they had read it.

Eighty-four per cent of the men belonged to a church and 92 per cent of the women.

Their soil conservation practices and their standard of living improved in the same proportion as their church attendance. Their religion made of them better farmers and better parents.

This survey entitled "The Church and the Land," was made by the Rural Department of Drew Seminary, Madison, N. J., and is being sent to farmers on request.

The study shows the relation between good farming and family religion.

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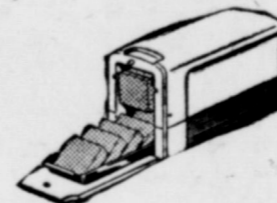
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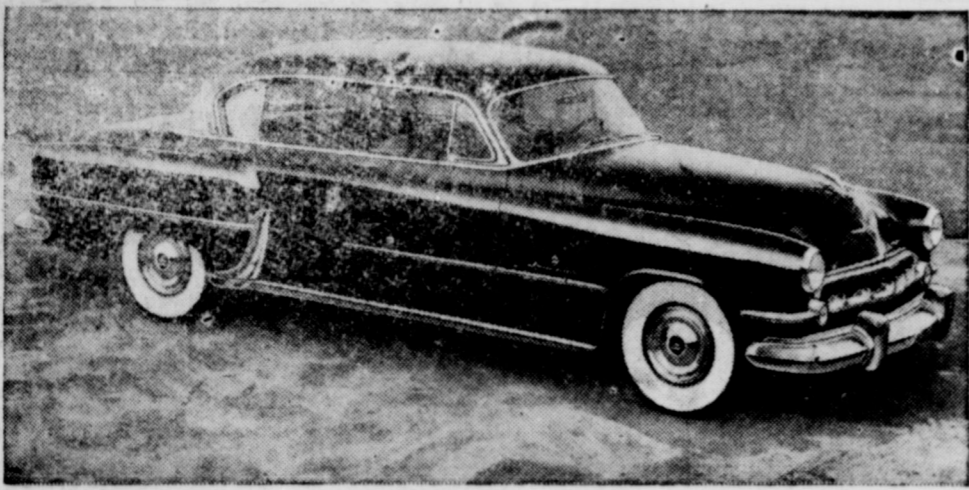
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RANGERS BLAST TARLETON STATE COLLEGE 12-7 THERE

FORMER EASTLAND RESIDENT CHARGED WITH STOCK FRAUD IN \$100,000 NEW YORK DEAL

(Editor's Note: The following article recently appeared in the New York World-Telegram and Sun. It is reprinted here because Mrs. Stratton and her late husband were well known in this area, having lived in Eastland for several years. The clipping was forwarded by John Von Foepfel, also a former resident.)

Alleging stock fraud transactions in which more than 50 investors lost approximately \$100,000, Attorney General Nathan L. Goldstein has halted securities dealings of Mrs. Francis Gorre Stratton, 63, of 605 W. 137th St., a choir singer.

It was charged she made her contacts by singing with religious organizations. One of the victims, also a complainant, was the pastor of her church, who lost more than \$13,000, Mr. Goldstein said.

On the petition of Mr. Goldstein, State Supreme Court Justice Felix C. Benvenge granted the injunction.

Federal Judge Sylvester J. Ryan signed an order March 30, 1948, restraining the Dixieland Petroleum Corp. of Delaware, of which Mrs. Stratton is president, from selling its stock unless it registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission, according to the attorney general.

To circumvent this order, he charged, Mrs. Stratton obtained funds for the corporation by issuing stock of Logical Enterprises, Inc., a New York corporation she also heads, as bonus to the lenders.

This transaction was done on the false representation that Logical Enterprises owned \$100,000 stock of the Dixieland Corp., and a like amount in the Smuggler with an address at 62 Riverside Mining Corp., a Nevada concern.

Dr. Mr. Goldstein said. Mrs. Stratton was accused by the attorney general of continuing the practices of her late husband, John F. Stratton, against whom Mr. Goldstein obtained a similar injunction in January of 1948.

Seats To Be Sold Nov. 1-4

Applications for tickets to the 1954 Cotton Bowl game will be accepted by mail only between Nov. 1 and 4, it was announced by officials of the Cotton Bowl Athletic Association today.

Otto Eisenlohr, Cotton Bowl president, said that a large number of ticket requests had already come in; but that all applications received before Nov. 1 and all letters postmarked after Nov. 4 would be returned to the senders.

The ticket price will be \$1.80 each, and no applications will be accepted for more than four tickets. A check and stamped self-addressed return envelope must accompany each request and a 25c mailing fee must be included in each check.
