Wildcat Staked Near Nimrod; Test Is Due

Oil activities in Eastland county continued to increase Thursday but the big question of what the potential of the Clark P. Chandler Mangum wildcat would be remained unanswered.
A spokesman for the San Angelo oil firm said potential test would probably be run Friday or Saturday.

Meanwhile the Haynes B. Ownby well, which was drilled in the north-west quarter in Section 97, Block 3, H&TC Survey.
J. E. Connally, Abilene, and associates announced intentions to drill No. 1 D. B. Crawley seven miles northwest of Gorman.

Having a proposed depth of 3,500 feet with rotary, site is 330 feet from the north and east lines of B. Y. Ballew Survey.
It is a southwest offset to Connally, et al, No. 1 Susie P. Whatton, a recent Marble Falls lime discovery well. The strike had a daily pumping potential of 94.22 barrels of oil from 3,024-32 feet. In other area oil news both Stephens county and Palo Pinto reported new wildcats being staked.

Baker & Camp Co. and Preston M. Davis of Breckenridge spotted No. 1 Shalor Copeland as a Stephens County wildcat six miles northwest of Strawn.
Drillsite is 425 feet from the north line and 550 feet from the east line (the Stephens-Palo Pinto County line), and in James Ervin Survey. Contract depth is 3,300 feet with rotary.

Potential for a discovery from a lime formation was made six miles north of Ranger at Two Square D Oil Co., Breckenridge, No. 1 D. H. Coffman Estate, J. H. E. Miller Survey, A-1207.

It had a daily potential of 15 barrels of 42 gravity oil, plus 75 barrels of water. The well is pumping from an open hole at 3,404-3,501 feet, pay topped at 3,451 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 10,000-1.
Palo Pinto Oil & Gas Corp. of Strawn staked a wildcat location in Palo Pinto County. It is No. 1 C. E. Allen, five miles north of Strawn.

George Jalonic III of Dallas gave the main address Saturday night at a banquet and Joseph D. Blatt of Washington, assistant administrator of the program commission of CAA was luncheon speaker.

No. 3 Ritchie had a daily potential of 100 barrels of 38 gravity oil, plus 20 percent water. It is pumping from 96 perforations at 1,333-65 feet with the hole bottomed at 1,365 feet.
Same firm staked two new locations at that same field.

No. 4 John P. Ritchie, contracted for 1,600 feet with cable tools, is located 1,500 feet from the south and 2,100 feet from the east lines of Section 42, Block 2, T&P Survey.
Site for No. 2-B John P. Ritchie is 870 feet from the south and 2,975 feet from the east lines of Section 42, Block 2, T&P Survey. It is contracted for 1,400 feet with cable tools.

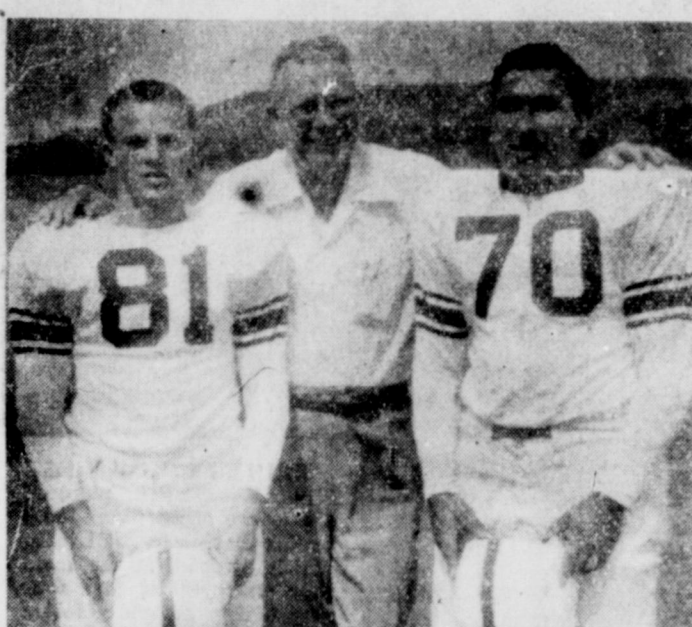
The Eastland Music Study Club are extending an invitation to the Sixth District, Texas Federation of Music Clubs now convening in Abilene, to come to Eastland next November.

Eastland will be fighting hard for this one after dropping a heart-breaker last week to the Dublin Lions' Dublin, you probably remember, took that one 7-6 to wrap up runner-up honors in District 7-A. Ranger won the district with eight straight victories and is now awaiting the winner of District 8-A. Haskell and Albany meet tomorrow in the game which will decide the winner.

Chamber of Commerce Manager Herb Tanner said Thursday that merchants had purchased new fixtures for the downtown section to replace those that were worn out.
"The old ones just couldn't go another Christmas," Tanner said, "so we got some more just like them to replace them."
Texas Electric Service Co. employes began putting up wiring this week. The lights are to go up right away but will not be turned on until Thanksgiving night.
The lights will be strung in the traditional method that has made Eastland one of the prettiest cities in the state for the last several years. A string will run from the top of the flagpole to each corner of the square and at the corner will branch off into three strings—or string running to each section of the corner.
A movement is underway to see how pretty the downtown section and residential sections can be made. Merchants have already begun to decorate their windows in the Yule fashion and homes are expected to begin to look Christmasy early in December.
The courthouse lawn will be decorated by Santa Claus and his reindeer and Old Saint Nick himself will arrive for his pre-Christmas visit early in December.
Tanner said communication had already been contacted with Santa at the North Pole. He said Santa had denied all rumors he was planning to come in a Sablejet this year instead of his trusty sled.

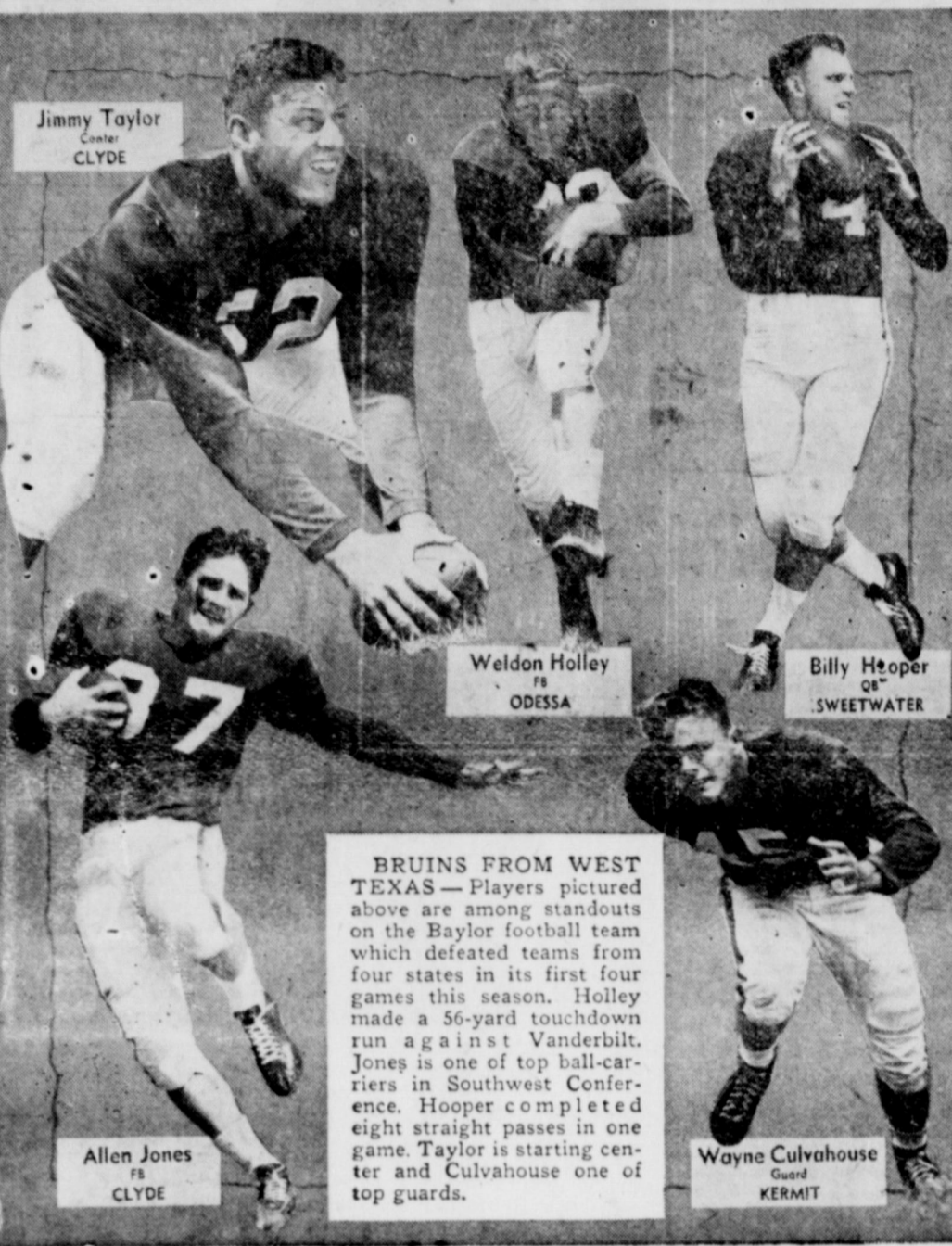

The designer, a native of Knoxville, Tenn., has been making children's clothes for 25 years. For her pioneering in production of more sophisticated apparel, she was one of three winners of this year's American Fashion Critics Award. "I believe firmly in a dress a

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

Tired of your name? Perhaps you can change. To most of us our name is too much an integral part of our everyday life to want to change it. There are occasions, however, when a legal change of name is desired, and Texas laws contain provisions for changing the names of individuals business firms and corporations. Being tired of a name is not sufficient in itself to warrant a legal change. There are occasions, however, when a change of name may be of sufficient benefit to a person to justify a change under the statutes. For example, a name may be so long and cumbersome or so difficult to pronounce as to become a business or social handicap.

A legal change of an individual's name in this state involves a procedure in District Court. The person desiring a change must file an application in proper form in the District Court of the county of his residence, setting forth the reasons for his desire for a new name. If the Judge is convinced that it is for the interest or benefit of the applicant to change his name, he may decree that the adopted name of the person shall be substituted for his original name.

In addition to the provisions for change of name in ordinary cases, our laws permit the court in entering a divorce decree to include an order changing the name of either party especially petitioning for such a change in proper manner during the proceedings.

Provisions for changing the name of a minor are the same as for an adult, except that the application for change must be

filed by his guardian or "next friend". By this latter term is meant a parent or some other person who is looking after the interests of the minor. A change of name will not be allowed to injure third persons under our laws. The change does not operate to release the applicant from any responsibility which he may have incurred under his original name. Nor will it defeat or destroy any rights or property or causes of action which the person may have had or held in his original name.

Any person transacting business in Texas under any name other than his real name is required to file in the County Clerk's Office in each county in which he conducts his business an "assumed name certificate", giving the name of the business and the true full name and post office address of each person carrying on the business, a new certificate is required to be filed setting out the facts.

Whenever the name of a corporation is changed, Texas laws require that its corporate charter must be amended and the amendment filed with the Secretary of State.

Heavy Hydrogen Atoms Test Food

CHICAGO — University of Chicago scientists use heavy hydrogen atoms as "tracers" to see how the body makes use of foodstuffs.

The scientists put atoms of heavy hydrogen, or deuterium, in alcohol which is broken down by body chemicals in much the same way ordinary foods are.

Frank A. Loewus, research associate at the university's department of biochemistry, told about the process at a meeting of the American Institute of Biological Sciences.

In the first chemical breakdown of the alcohol-oxidation, the hydrogen atoms are handed from one molecule to another like batons in a relay race, the scientists reported.

Prelim Boxers Scarce Because of Good Times

PORTLAND, Me. — Chick Hayes, a boxing matchmaker, blames "the good times" for his difficulty in obtaining preliminary fighters.

"Almost anyone can get a job that pays \$50 to \$60 a week now," says Hayes, "and you can't blame boys too much for not wanting to train a week or more for a fight, particularly when they don't actually need the money."

"Back in the middle of the depression there were about six preliminary boys clamoring to be signed for every bout scheduled."

Don't try to do all the preparation and baking in one day. Buy fruits and nuts during regular shopping trips. Cut them and store in screw-top jars as you find time during regular kitchen duty. Prepare the pans and measure the ingredients the day before baking, and you'll find the actual cake-making a breeze.

Cook Book About Meat On Market

Just about everything there is to say about America's No. 1 main course is covered in the latest cookbook on meat.

John and Marie Roberson, old hands at cookbook writing, in their latest work, "The Meat Cookbook" (Henry Holt), discuss everything from Chateaubriand to cold cuts, from New England boiled dinner to Chinese steak with mushrooms.

The book also is a guide to buying, cutting, carving and storing the food which the authors say "accounts for at least a fourth of the average family food budget and three-fourths of a meal's success."

The Robersons include several recipes using economy cuts. Typical is this one for Creole steak: 1 pound flank steak; 3 tablespoons lard or drippings; 1 medium onion chopped; 1 clove garlic, mashed; 2 green peppers, cut in 1-inch squares; 1 cup celery, cut in 1-inch pieces; 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce; 1 teaspoon salt; 3/4 teaspoon pepper; and one 10-ounce can condensed tomato soup.

Slice steak into thin ribbons 4 or 5 inches long. Brown in fat, stirring constantly. Lower the flame, add onion and garlic, and stir until onion becomes transparent. Add peppers, celery, seasonings and soup. Cover. Cook over low heat until meat and vegetables are tender, about 1 hour. Serve very hot. Serves four.

Suggested accompanying menu: chicken broth garnished with chopped water cress; fluffy rice; avocado salad, and date and nut torte.

"This highly integrated four-year degree program of the TSCW School of Nursing will be inaugurated on the TSCW campus next fall. The present diploma course of the Parkland School of Nursing will be discontinued after a three-year period of transition beginning with the 1954-55 session.

SCHREINER INSTITUTE TARGET OF JUNIOR COLLEGE ELEVEN

The Ranger Junior College Rangers drop the curtain Saturday night on their 1953 gridiron season by entertaining Coach Rusty Russell's Schreiner Institute Mountaineers in the Pioneer Conference clash at Bulldog Stadium. Kick-off time is set at 8 p.m.

The game will be a tilt between two of the most improved junior college elevens in the nation. Both teams will be fresh from major upset victories last Saturday and both will be shooting for runner-up honors in the Pioneer Conference race.

Last week Ranger surprised everyone by easily upsetting Henderson Junior College, the kingpin of the Texas Junior College Conference. While the Rangers were busy pasting Henderson's Cardinals the Mountaineers were giving Coach Rex Bumgardner's San Angelo Rams a lesson in the fine art of football. Ranger dumped Henderson 32-12 and Schreiner took San Angelo 14-6.

The game could be figured just about anyway one wanted to. For instance, Tarleton State beat Schreiner and Ranger beat Tarleton State. That would make Ranger the favorite. On the other hand San Angelo rubbed out Coach Henderson's Rangers 20-0 and the Mountaineers took the Rams count 14-6. That would make Schreiner a 28 point favorite.

Take your pick.

Both teams have improved since early season and both teams hold the distinction of being a leader in conference statistics. Ranger leads the conference in passing with a total overhead gain of 909 yards. Schreiner has held

eight opponents to a total of 46 points and an average total gain of 132 yards to get the defensive pace. Ranger is second in total offense with 1,496 yards—only 304 yards back of leading Arlington State. The Rangers have the second best individual passing record in the conference. That is held down by Tommy Wood who has passed 72 times and completed 29 for 389 yards. Gene Leach of Schreiner is the leading kick-off returner with eight for 213 yards and Jon Harrell of Schreiner leads in punt returns with eight for 156 yards. The leading scorer is Tommy Rogstad, Schreiner end, with five touchdowns and nine conversions for 39 points.

Ranger has a season record of 4 wins, four losses and a tie. The Rangers beat Allen Academy 26-6, Midwestern B 26-7, Tarleton State 12-7, and Henderson 32-12. The RJC eleven tied Navarro 20-20. The four losses came at the hands of Wharton 0-20, Cisco 7-20, San Angelo 0-20 and Arlington State 6-13.

Schreiner has a five won, three loss record this year. All three losses came at the hands of top rated teams—Del Mar, Arlington State and Tarleton State. The Mountaineers defeated Texas Lutheran College, Victoria, Navarro, Blinn and San Angelo.

Both teams are expected to be in near top shape. The Rangers will have only one man out of the game—that being Wayne Hargrave, 180 pound guard from Ran-

"All that's lacking now is installation of the engines, some finishing touches and some high water," Drake said.

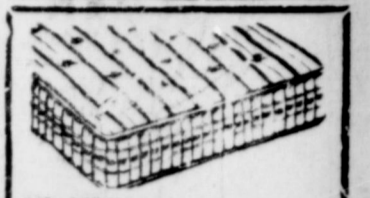

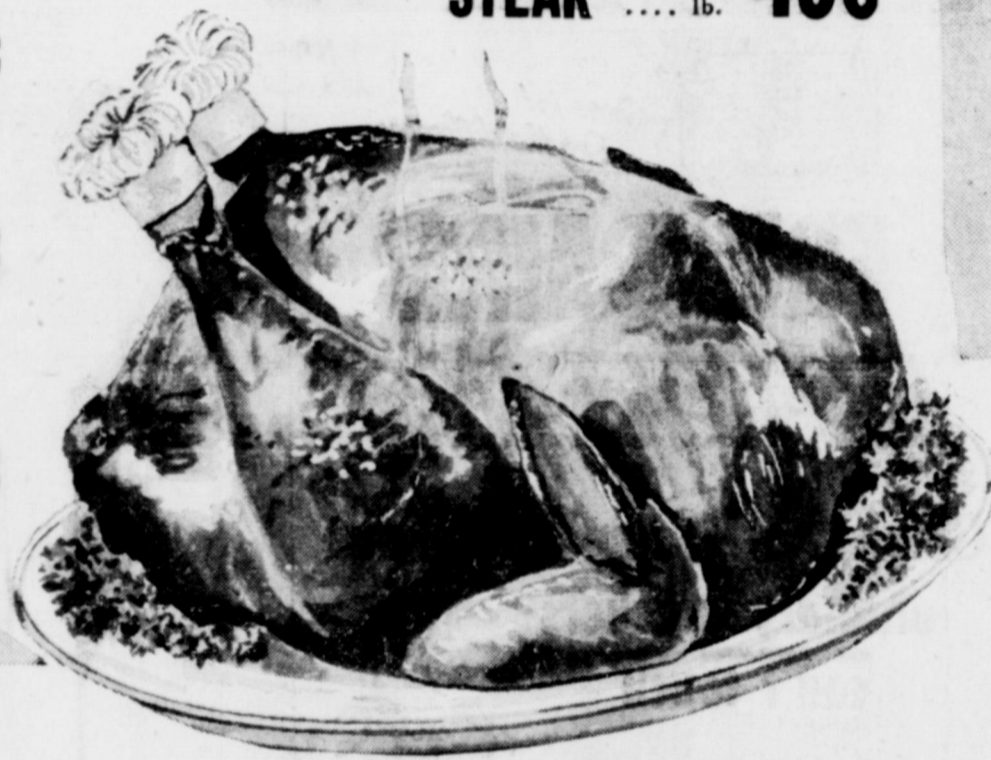

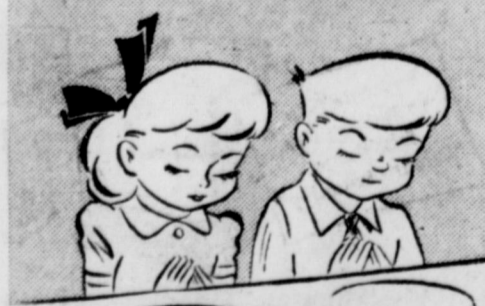
