A Decade of Armistice And No Sign of Peace

A troubled decade has passed since the Korean Armistice was accomplished.

In the conflict, that was neither won nor lost, the United States had 136,913 casualties: 33,629 killed and 103,284 wounded.

Two days after the 10th anniversary of the Armistice, North Korean raiders ambushed a U.S. Army jeep patrol, killing two Americans and critically wounding a third.

Three days later, another American died in an exchange of gunfire with North Koreans.

So, there was nothing to celebrate. The puppet North Koreans, aping the belligerence of their mentors in Peking, have again shown the world that the West can expect no respite in the Cold War. It seems more than coincidence the guns should start cracking just after Moscow and the West reach an accord on a test ban treaty and the USSR appeared to disagree with the Peking government on how the Free World should be buried.

There was nothing to celebrate. The end of the decade could be only marked as the passing of 10 tension-filled years during which inflexible ruthlessness of the Reds has not changed one iota. (AFPS)

ON THIS, the 28th day of August, 1963, the City Council of the City of Merkel, Texas, convened in special session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall, there being present and in attendance the following members, to-wit:

Aldermen and with the following absent: none, constituting a quorum; and among other proceedings had, were the following:

Mayor Boney introduced a resolution and order. Alderman Fisher moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Alderman Satterwhite. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Aldermen Ditzel, Satterwhite, Crawford, Fisher and Wurst

NOES: None.

The RESOLUTION AND ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Merkel, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purposes hereinafter mentioned; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MERKEL, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 21st day of September, 1963, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of said City, who

own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1
"SHALL the City Council of the City of Merkel, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$100,000), maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than THIRTY (30) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE PER CENTUM (5%) per annum, for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Sewer System, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of said Sewer System and, in the discretion of the City Council, such bonds may also be secured by a pledge of the revenues of the City's Waterworks System?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2
"SHALL the City Council of the City of Merkel, Texas, be authorized to issue FIFTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$55,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Sewer System; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed TWENTY (20) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FOUR AND ONE-FOURTH PER CENTUM (4 1/4%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the WELFARE OFFICE, Kent Street, in the City of Merkel, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election to-wit:

MRS. F. Y. GAITHER, Presiding Judge

MRS. T. L. GRIMES, Judge

MRS. WILLIAM CYPERT, Clerk

MRS. PAT CYPERT, Clerk

SECTION 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.-T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1
"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2
"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION SEWER SYSTEM BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION SEWER SYSTEM BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

AS TO EACH of the foregoing two propositions, each voter shall mark out with pen or pencil one of the above expressions thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the two propositions respectively.

SECTION 6: THAT a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Secretary, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF

BONDS," shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice shall be posted at three public places in said City, one of which shall be at the City Hall, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Merkel, published in the City of Merkel, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

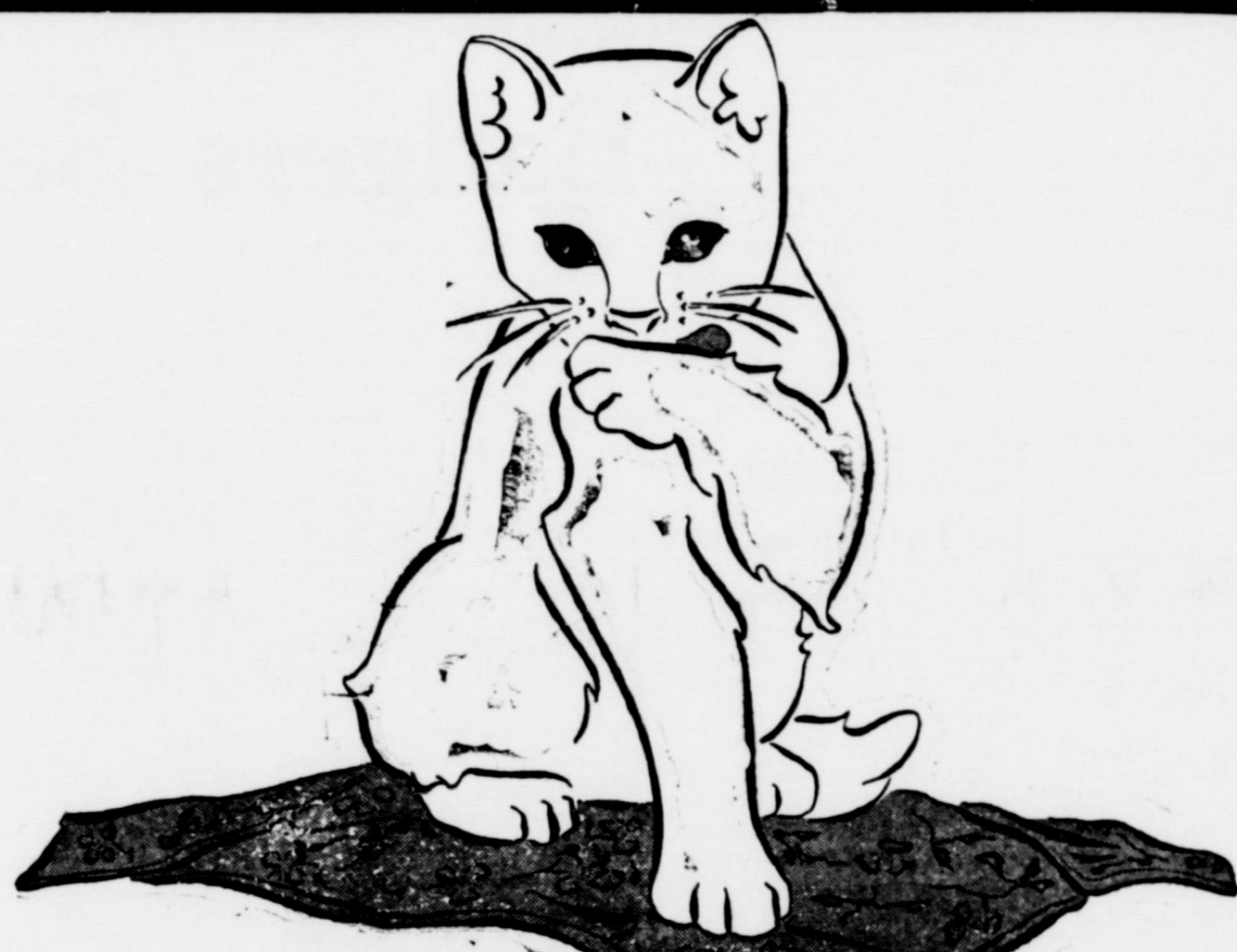

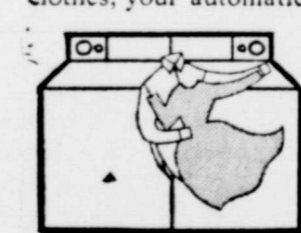

Need some information about sewing on double knit fabrics? Double knits for home sewing are relatively new, although jerseys are familiar to most women, points out Mary Routh, Extension Service Clothing Specialist with Texas A&M University.

While no special skill is required to sew double knit fabrics, an understanding of their characteristics can simplify and speed the handling.

Select a pattern with few seams, a rather easy fit and no buttonholes. It is wise to avoid circular skirts and bias cuts, reminds Miss Routh.

Weight of the double knit fabrics should be chosen to conform to the design of the pattern. And if the knit fabric is "off grain" more than one inch it should be straightened by pulling slightly on the bias while steam pressing it.

"All knit fabrics should be shrunk before cutting — steam pressed at home or at the dry cleaners," the specialist reminds.

Double knits are made in tubular form and some are sold this way. Others are cut along the fold of the flattened tube and edges are overcast. The lengthwise edges should be examined before buying the fabric to see that they follow the grain line.

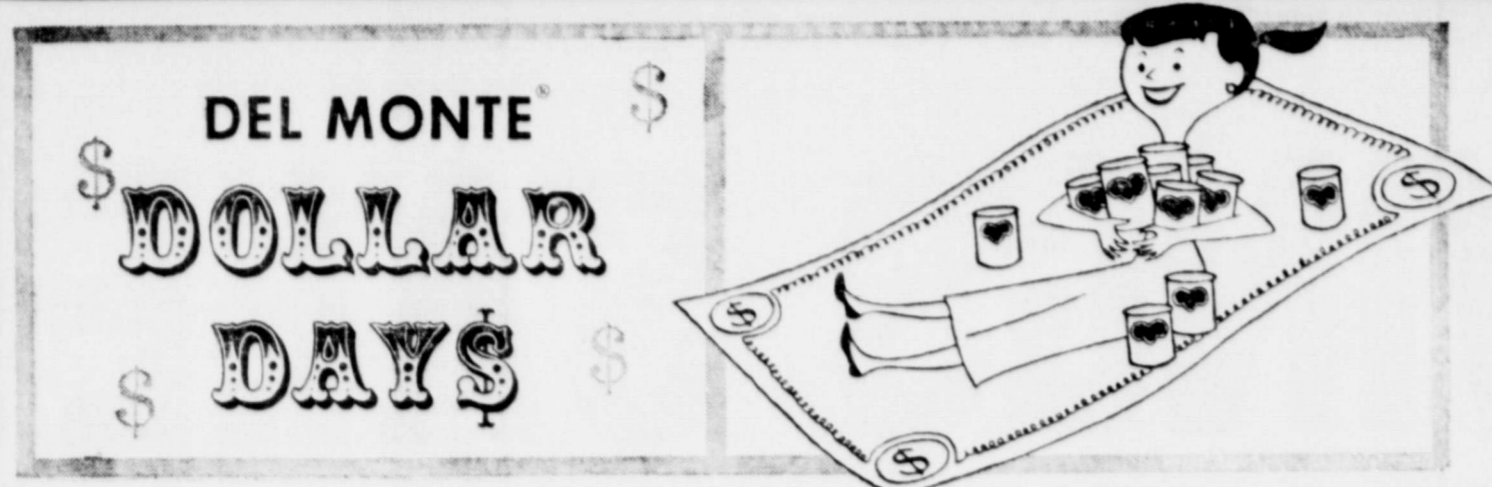
