

Bovina's telephone service is lacking. When our plans were complete on the setting up of a newspaper office in Bovina, we immediately called the Littlefield office and requested installation of a telephone. We got a halfway promise that the phone would be installed in "three or four days."

On the fourth day we still were phoneless, so we called again. The application was tied up in red tape somewhere but they did promise to let us know when they found the application again.

However, installation service is only a part of the services lacking from what we can find out in conversations around town. Many times it takes several minutes to contact the operator after dialing. Heard of one case where the phone rang 27 times before the operator answered. Also heard of some inconsistencies on long distance rates. What excuse, if any, is there for service like this?


As the town grows and progresses, this lack of streets problem will become more acute. The present is the best time we know of to start planning to solve Bovina's street paving needs.

Heed The Storm Signals

By heeding storm signals one can avoid a deluge of small frv stubborn "No's!" which may rival a hurricane for upsetting mealtime atmosphere, Knowing how to recognize the forerunners of "table time storms" is almost a necessity for parents.

Youngsters and appetites easily are parted—a fact to remember when otherwise healthy children dawdle over food. The best food can fail to appeal if emotions are in a turmoil. Where meals are peaceful, stubborn feeding problems are not so apt to occur. The dining room should never turn into a court of appeals with father forced to play judge and mother is on the jury. Excitement of any kind—particularly anger, fear or other intense emotions-hinders digestion.

The overly hungry, overly tired child does not enjoy his food. School age children, constantly on the go, should have a few minutes rest or quiet before meals.

Children with hearty appetites at mealtimes and who eat a good variety of foods, often are genuinely hungry by mid-morning or afternoon. They need an "extra meal"—a sandwich of enriched bread and a glass of milk or some fruit-eaten at midmorning or after school to supply required nutrients and energy.

New foods or new ways of serving well-liked foods can help keep mealtime interest high. To avoid an "I won't eat it" storm, only one new food is offered at a time. Only small portions of it are served the

It should be kept in mind that children like simple, colorful foodsfoods neither too strongly flavored nor highly spiced.

Youngsters' attitudes follow the course set by mother and dad. Dad's frown or ill-timed comment about a food can bring on a crisis, with mother's plans going aground. Happy parents keep family meals a pleasant adventure—in quiet harbors—by steering clear of possible


Richards Building Being Torn Down



Summertime is hard on hands with all of the extra washing, working in the garden, digging around the flowers, and other dirty work that must be done when the days are long and the sun is warm.

Hands are exposed more to the public eye in summer. You can't neglect your hands and be well

Start with the nails-are they split, broken, or soft? If so, maybe you need more iron in your system. Women especially need additional iron to keep their blood built up. Just try taking iron and yeast or iron and liver medicine, and you will see an improvement in your

What about that ragged cuticle or cuticles that have grown down on your nails? The well groomed hand has the cuticle pushed back so the half moon shows. Don't try to do it on dry hands.

Soak your hands first in warm water or warm oil and gently push the cuticle back with a tool made for that purpose. Or best yet, when you finish washing dishes, rinse your hands, dry them, and then push the cuticle back with the towel. Do this each time you dry your hands. It takes only a minute and improves the looks of your chands so much.


Don't try to trim your cuticle all around the nail. That is for a professional beautician to do. But do trim the horny growth on the edges of the finger where the nail starts to grow out. Bovina Has Unusual Business

Bovina has the distinction of being the only town in this section of the country to have an "honor" domino parlor.

Back in 1948, J. S. Potts established a domino parlor in the little building between Wines Produce and The Bovina Hotel. Potts ran the place in person for awhile.

Then his health began to get bad and he was unable to be there all the time. He nailed a small wooden box on the wall with a slot cut in the top of it big enough for coins to go in.

Over this he tacked a sign that said and still says today, "1 to 3 games for nickle. If you play you pay for it."

The slot in the box is well worn from many coin insertions.

After Potts had his "honor system" established, he just started coming down daily and sweeping and cleaning the place. Mr. Potts passed away three years ago and since that time his wife, who still lives in Bovina, comes down in the mornings and does the cleaning.

The story is told about a barber who came to Bovina looking for a place to set up a barber shop. He spotted the small building, decided it would make a nice shop and began to inquire about it saying that he would pay \$25 a month rent for it.







Best of all. Bovina and its territory has not "peaked out" as yet, and the future is still very definitely a thing of the moment. Residents, can expect to see a continued growth rather than a general levelling off, according to indications found in the survey.

Bovina's growth has not been of "boom" proportions. It cannot be compared to an oil boom, a uranium strike, a government construction project, or some such exciting development.

Bovina's growth has been much more subtle. At times, residents have even been unaware of the things that were happening around them because they became "acclimatized" to the gradual but steady changes.






