# Girls find out tonight who they

# will face for district championship

Although the Merkel girls lost two of their last three district games, they are still sitting where they

want to be, at home, resting, but not for long. The second half of the district 6-2A race found Wylie and Coahoma tied for the title and those two teams meet tonight in Snyder to see who will face the Badgers Saturday for the district championship.

The Badgers earned their spot in Saturday's contest by going undefeated through the first half of district play and Coahoma and Wylie earned their spots in Thursday's playoffs by getting past the Badgers

The Badgers lost a thriller to Wylie last Tuesday in Merkel's last home game of the year

The Badgers had a miserable first half shooting as they only scored one field goal. They also trailed by 14 points with 3:17 left in the game before Norma Frazier went to work.

The Badgers managed to tie the game with 24 seconds left and then it was a free throw contest from there and the Badgers ended up one point short. Frazier led the Badgers against Wylie with 17 and

Nancy Click and Sara Prasarn added 4.

The Badgers breezed by Anson in Anson Friday 49-32 and Nancy Click led the way with 18. Norma

Frazier got 12 and Jackie Casey and Kay Amerine added 6.

Against Coahoma, the Badgers started off well and then got in serious foul trouble as Frazier, Click and Gwen Tarpley each sat out two quarters because of fouls.

The Badgers lost by 3 and Frazier, who played only half the game scored 27 and Sara Prasarn added 11. Kay Amerine and Nancy Click had 7.

Badger coach Jan Averitt told the Mail Monday that she didn't really have a preference for an opponent between Coahoma and Wylie, but she added that Wylie would probably beat Coahoma Thursday because "Wylie always seems to play real well in the big games.'

The coach added that her players would probably rather play Wylie than Coahoma because of the revenge factor involved with Wylie. She said that both teams run the same basic offense and that the Badgers would defend either team with the same basic defense with a couple of changes adapted for their opponent.

Coach Averitt also said that although the Badgers will only have one full day to prepare for their district championship game, she would rather already have qualified to be in the game than having to play Tuesday and win and then win again on Saturday

She said that Coahoma has been in a do or die situation for the past three weeks and that it gets hard on a team to have to win so many games in a row to make the playoffs. She said the same holds true for Wylie.


It all gets down to do or die for the girls teams now


If Wylie wins Thursday, school officials said in a memo Monday that the district championship game would be held Saturday at either Hardin Simmons or McMurry College.

Clayton maintains he never intended to keep the money offered him in a fake insurance bribe scheme by undercover FBI agents.


His guilt or innocence will be taken up later. What this reporter wants to know is why it took the Los Angeles Times to break the story.

# Council tabs Pack new police chief

Merkel City Council unanimously appointed Ray Pack as chief of police following the resignation of Leroy Austermann.

Austermann resigned on January 29th and is now the manager of the Merkel Dairy Queen.

Council members also voted Friday to accept the deed on the Max Mellinger building on North Second. The Mellinger's building which is heavily damaged

from roof cave-ins was turned over to the city. It is the same building that housed the Merkel campus of Cisco Junior College.

Council went into executive session to discuss a complaint against the city's judiciary

Council did not have anything to say about the complaint, but that the letter had nothing to do with a local woman's complaint that is still before

council. Ann Talent had appeared at a council meeting four weeks ago to complain about her treatment by Merkel Patrolman John Davis. Mayor Lou David Allen did say that the complaint involved the city's judicial system.

Council also heard an audit report from Jerry Hill a CPA from Stamford. Hill also presented council a proposal to provide a monthly computerized breakdown of expenditures and revenues by city departments.

The audit covered fiscal year 1977-78 and was approved by council.

City Manager J.A. Sadler also informed council that they would pay off their last part of the city's bonded indebtedness and that would only leave a revenue bond unpaid.

## alcohol fuel meeting

A large group of farmers attended a meeting of the Texas Fuel Alcohol Production Association at the Taylor County Courthouse Thursday and discussed possibilities and applications of local gasahol and alcohol fuel plants.

The group is a non-profit, tax-exempt organization that is seeking to develop practical means of producing gasahol and alcohol fuel for operation of farm machinery and other vehicles.

The group is currently trying to organize and check interest in the area. They are also trying to establish themselves as an information point for area grain producers on the feasibility of producing alcohol for fuel.

At the Thursday meeting, Association president Jerry English told the crowd of about 175 farmers and ranchers that the answer to much of the nation's energy problems is lying in fields all over the country.

He said the Texas Fuel Alcohol Production Association would try to become associated with the National Alcohol Fuel Production Association.

During the meeting, association officials talked about existing rules and regulations covering the production of alcohol, what type of documents the government requires before issuing a license to produce alcohol for fuel, and how pending legislation will affect those policies.

Association officials also indicated that the procedures or red tape for obtaining a license to produce alcohol is becoming less of a burden and that pending tax credits for development of alternative sources for oil-based fuel are expanding and are making it more economically feasible for farmers to consider production of alcohol for fuel.

This past Tuesday was city council meeting and we shall report the highlights of the meeting to you readers the next issue.


