## City accepts bids on homes, hears police report...more

The Merkel City Council awarded four more bids for remodeling of homes under the Community Development Block Grant, heard that cheese would be available to area residents soon and heard monthly police report at their regular meeting held Monday night at City Hall.

Council also heard a request for a street light from a local resident during the session. Home Insulation of Abilene was the low bidder on three of the homes and Energy Conservation, also of Abilene was the low bidder on the other property.

This brings the total of homes under contract for remodeling here under the community development program to ten.

The city also heard from Bill Jacobs, who along with Ken Martin have bought the engineering firm of Leon Decker. That firm is now responsible for the surveying and bid specifications of the paving program, which Merkel mayor Kent Satterwhite wanted to make clear was a priority of the firm. The paving program

should be underway in April according to Jacobs.

The city will also soon be announcing another cheese give-away coming up soon. Details will be available at Heritage Hall by next week and the program will work exactly like the recent cheese give-away.

Participants of the nutritional program are eligible for the government surplus cheese.

Merkel Police Chief Ray Pack presented the monthly police report and told council he had hired a new patrolman to replace Dennis Britton.

Britton joined the Midland Police Force and is being replaced by John Golliday, who comes from Sweetwater PD with good recommendations.

During September, the Merkel Police Department handled 68 total cases including seven accidents, three assaults, four cases of criminal mischief, two burglaries, one theft, one harassment, two criminal trespassing, 10 dog complaints and issued 38 traffic citations.

The city also conducted one trial by jury.

## 2 Trent men charged in shooting

Charles Edward Adams Jr., 20 and Craig Scott Whitley, both of Trent were among four people charged in the shooting death of a McCauley youth Sunday night along Texas Highway 59 near Hamlin.

Wandell Williams was killed and Danny Benevides, 17, both of McCauley was seriously wounded in the shooting.

Jones County Sheriff Mike Middleton told the Mail Monday "Only one of the four are actually responsible for the shooting but I won't say if that one person has been unmistakably identified at this time."

Middleton also told the Mail three of the youths were picked up by Tye Police and the other was arrested at a Hamlin home.

Now, if we could get something done about cotton and grain prices, we'd be a lot better off than we have been lately.

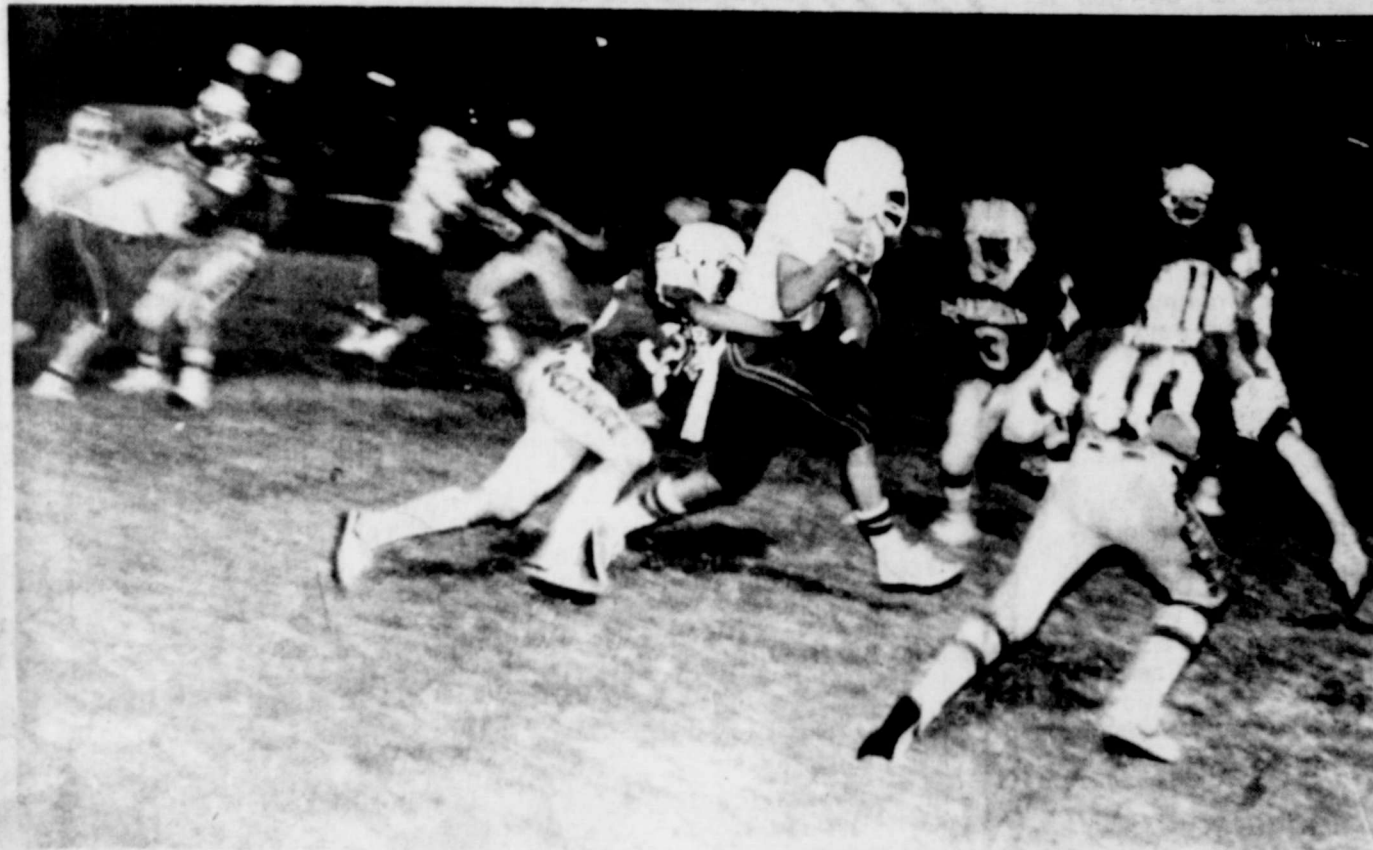
First, we have to find someone that cares about grain and cotton prices, and that's not an easy task.

## Badgers win first district game; travel to Electra Friday

John Warkala may have only gained 17 yards against Wylie here Friday night, but those 17 yards included three touchdowns as Merkel held off a fierce Wylie rally in the third quarter to win 25-20.

It was Merkel's fourth victory of the year and fourth at home. The Badgers stand 4-2 on the season and 1-0 in district play. Wylie has yet to win in six starts this season.

Merkel struck first early in the game as Jimmy Mendez got a Wylie fumble and Warkala ran it in from 2 yards out only two minutes into the game.

Warkala scored two more times in the first half and quarterback Russell Lucas had a good 11 yard run for the Badgers other touchdown.

The statistics from the game indicate how close it was. Merkel had 11 first downs, 156 yards rushing, 15 passing completing 2 of 10, intercepted two Wylie passes, punted eight times for a 33 yard average, lost 4 of 11 fumbles and were penalized 10 times for 94 yards. Wylie had 13 first downs, 121 yards rushing, 140 passing completing 16 of 43, intercepted one Merkel pass, punted four times for a 30 yard average, lost six of eight fumbles and were penalized 10 times for a 77 yard average.

Badger head coach Eddie Lang told The Mail Monday that Wylie played like he thought they would, they just made too many mistakes. He added "we caused a few of their mistakes, but they made some others that helped us out".

Lang said he was real pleased with the Badgers first half performance in scoring 25 and holding Wylie to 0. He added "When you've got a quarterback that can throw the ball like that kid at Wylie, you can score lots of points in a hurry, which is exactly what they did".

Lang singled out the play of Jimmy Mendez, John Warkala, Russell Lucas, Greg Arnwine, Roy

Johnson, Jay Gibson and Lorne Sloan on offense and Mendez, Lucas, Gibson, Johnson, John Womack and Michael Tutt, Brad Nalley and Sloan on defense.

The Badgers suffered no major injuries in the Wylie game but quarterback Jimmy Don Rogers will also miss this week's Electra game and may be ready for the Clyde game next week.

### MERKEL AT ELECTRA KICKOFF AT 8

Merkel will make their first long haul of the year to Electra Friday night to take on the Tigers. They are 2-4 on the year and dropped their first district game to Clyde last week.

Lang said Electra is very much like Merkel. They play the same offense except use a wingback instead of a split-end, and play the same exact defense. He also said they don't really have one great player but have a bunch of kids that are good athletes. Electra will run the ball about 80 percent of their plays and like to use trap blocking and lead blocking from their running backs.

Badger coaches have seen Electra twice and watched three game films and Lang said it should be a tough-evenly matched contest.

The Badgers will be going in style to the contest as the Booster Club has chartered a Greyhound. The football team will leave at 2 for the game. The bus carrying fans to the game, which is full, is leaving at 4.

Because of the distance to Electra, there will be no other games this week for other Merkel teams.

Last week, the Merkel 7th and 8th graders hosted Wylie and won, while the Freshmen and Junior Varsity traveled to Wylie and were defeated.

## RRC announces Sept. discoveries

Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent announced that Texas operators reported 128 gas and 52 oil discoveries in September 1982.

One year ago, 116 gas and 37 oil discoveries were filed with the Sates's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in the ninth month of the year included 44 in deep South Texas, 38 in the Regugio area, 22 in Southeast Texas, seven in the San Antonio area, five in the Panhandle, three each in West Central Texas, North Texas, and the Midland area, two in East Central Texas, and one in the San Angelo area.

Oil discoveries included 18 in West Central Texas, six each in North Texas, East Texas, and the Midland area, five in the San Angelo area, three in the Lubbock area, two each in the Panhandle, East Central Texas, and the San Antonio area, and one each in Southeast Texas and the Refugio area.

Through the first nine months of this year, there have been 1,121 gas and 487 oil discoveries throughout the state. For the same period last year, there were 957 gas and 457 oil discoveries.

In September, operators reported 331 exploratory and field tests would up as dry holes. New

applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 2,667 in September compared with 3,207 in the same period of 1981.

Applications to drill, deepen, plug back and for service wells in September amounted to 3,059 against 3,520 a year earlier.

Operators filed 785 amended applications to drill. A year earlier they submitted 846 requests.

**GOVERNOR'S REPORT**

by William R. Clements Jr.

The Texas Legislature deserves great credit for prompt action addressing major issues in a highly-productive special session.

Within five days, lawmakers completed the emergency assignments for which I called them into session May 24.

The way finally has been cleared for relieving Texas property owners of a potential billion dollar tax liability. Voters will have an opportunity November 2 to adopt a constitutional amendment submitted to them by an overwhelming vote of the Legislature to abolish the 10 cent state ad valorem levy.

At the same time, \$151.4 million was appropriated for construction at the 17 state universities outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems. Revenue from the state property tax went to the 17 schools for their building programs until three years ago when the Legislature sought to repeal it. Some of the schools filed suit challenging constitutionality of the legislative act. The suit is pending.

Future building needs of these institutions will be considered in the regular session of the Legislature which convenes in just seven months. I am confident that a fair and equitable system will be developed for distributing available resources among these schools, some of which have been penalized by an outdated formula which fails to take into account recent enrollment growth.

In addition to providing for tax relief, the Legislature has appropriated more than \$50 million to ease overcrowding in our state corrections system

**THE ABCs OF HOME INSULATION**

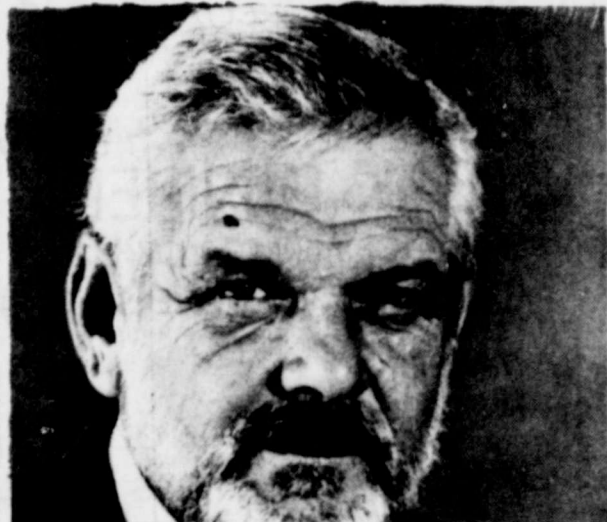

**The Consumer Alert**

AUSTIN—Have you ever had a problem with a local store, a product or service or even with the federal government? If you are like 69% of our population, you probably do not complain. Perhaps it is because you were too busy, felt it was not important enough or just did not know how or where to complain.

To help you in the "art of skillful complaining", step-by-step procedures are given on how to have a complaint resolved satisfactorily. The first step is to clearly identify the problem and determine what you think would be a fair settlement, such as refunding your money or exchanging or repairing a product. Then go back to the person who sold you the product and state the problem and what action you would like taken. If this person is not helpful, ask to see the supervisor or manager. Don't forget to bring along any documentation that substantiates your complaint, such as a sales receipt, repair order, warranty or cancelled check.

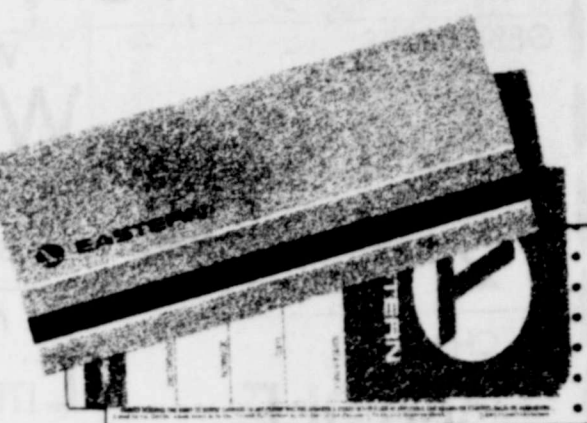
If your complaint is legitimate and you have presented it well, the firm is most likely to settle the problem with you at this stage. After all, most businesses are responsible and want to make sure you are satisfied so that you will return and shop again. But sometimes you have to go a step further.

If the store where you bought the product cannot help you, if the company operates nationally or if the product is a national brand, write a letter to the company president or corporate con-

sumer official. The *Thomas Registry*, which names thousands of products and their manufacturers, and *Standards and Poor's Register*

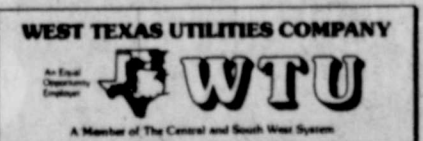

**HONEST ANSWERS TO FAIR QUESTIONS**

Our Customers Are Concerned About The Cost of Quality Electric Service, and So Are We. Here's a Sample of the Questions They're Asking and the Answers We're Giving.

- Q. Why is WTU asking for a rate increase?  
A. There are three related reasons: inflation, the rising cost of capital, and WTU's massive construction program. Mainly, the request is based on capital expenditures during the past year.
- Q. When was the last time you raised retail electric rates?  
A. WTU has had only three rate increases in its history, while it has lowered rates 14 times. The last increase was February, 1982, and it amounted to an average of just over 8 percent.
- Q. Why is WTU having to raise its rates again so soon?  
A. The rate relief granted to us by the cities and the Public Utility Commission of Texas last time proved inadequate. It did not keep up with the cost of additional plant, inflation and high interest rates. Our revenues have not provided an adequate rate of return.
- Q. What are other utilities doing about rates?  
A. Without exception, all electric utilities are having to increase their rates. Some have been filing rate cases every year. Bill comparisons reported by the Public Utility Commission of Texas show that WTU's rates are second lowest among investor-owned utilities in Texas.
- Q. Why are you building a big new plant? Isn't energy use declining?  
A. Energy use in WTU service area is growing. This summer our peak demand reached 994 megawatts. Our current generating capacity is 1,054 megawatts. The summer peak left us with insufficient reserve margin. We will purchase power from neighboring utilities as a stop-gap measure, but the time has come when we must expand our own generating system. If we are to continue providing service our customers are used to.
- Q. What would happen if you could not get a rate increase?  
A. The financial condition of our Company would deteriorate rapidly. Our credit rating would suffer. We would no longer be in position to attract capital at reasonable interest rates to finance necessary major construction. We would have to pay higher interest rates at the expense of our customers.
