These figures are not estimates, those are actual children alive today within the school district and if the area starts receiving a lot of new families, the growth will be that much more dramatic "

Tax rebates here slightly behind

Merkel's latest tax rebate check of \$2,734.65 caused the yearly rebates here to fall below the pace set last year.

It's not a decline however, as Merkel is .1 per cent behind payments of a year ago. So far this year, Merkel has

received \$19,064 in rebates. Tye's latest check of \$4,422.02 pushes their yearly total to

\$18,427.47 for the year or almost 3 per cent ahead of last year's pace. Trent's rebates for the year stand at \$1,071.20 and are 14.44 per

cent ahead of last year's pace. The rebates are generated by the local option 1 per cent sales tax that is collected along with the state 4 per cent sales tax. The money is rebated monthly by the state comptroller's office to the city where the tax was collected.

Details on cable rate hike request

Showcase Cablevision of Tuscola, operators of the Merkel tv cable system, have formally requested a rate increase before the Merkel City Council.

The proposed new rates are broken down into four categories. Plan One will include basic cable service will go from \$9 per month to \$10. The total bill for basic service with an additional Outlet in the home will be \$11.75. Under Plan 2, which is a new

plan offered here, the monthly rate will be \$13 and will include basic cable plus the Nashville Newtork, a country-western music service. Persons wanting that plan will also be charged a one time fee of \$10 to install the Nashville Network and persons using plan 2 will also be charged \$1.50 a month rental for the converter that will be required. The total cost per month for basic cable and the Nashville Network will be \$14.50.

Plan 3 includes basic cable and Home Box Office. The new rate will be \$19 plus the converter rental fee of \$1.50 making that monthly charge \$20.50.

Service plan 4 will be the top-of-the line plan and will include basic cable, HBO and the Nashville Network. Total cost per month will be \$25.

Policies can be purchased through private insurance companies. The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation helps to market the policies and reinsures them.

Crop insurance does not cover neglect or theft but does cover unaviodable losses due to adverse weather, points out Lovell. It provides protection for physical quantity and quality losses on a specific crop.

Farmers insuring their 1984 crops will receive their premium bills around harvest time, notes Lovell. Then they have 30 days to pay or the government will start charging interest on the unpaid balance.

A farmer insuring his crops this year will automatically be reinsured from year to year unless premiums go unpaid or they cancel the policy.
