Badgers rally in 4th quarter to beat Brady, hosts Coahoma Friday

The Merkel Badgers came from behind by scoring 28 points in the final quarter last Friday in Brady to earn a 35-20 win. With the win, the Badgers evened their district record to 3-3 and ran their season record to 5-4. The Badgers have a chance to end up with a winning record for the first time in at least nine seasons with a win here Friday as the Badgers will host the Coleman Bulldogs.

In the first half, Brady was able to move the ball with a strong running game and passes over the middle of Merkel's defense.

Brady jumped to a 12-0 lead at the half.

The Badgers came back in the third quarter scoring on a 4th and goal from the 2 to make it 12-7.

Early in the 4th quarter, running back Cory Hines burned Brady with a 22 yard touchdown run and when Shayne Newberry added the point after (he was 5-5 on the night), the Badgers led 14-12. Brady came back and scored taking a 20-14 lead and after that, it was all Merkel.

Recovering a Brady fumble near mid field, the Badgers marched into the endzone as quarterback Kenneth Jowers lofted a pass which receiver Newberry taking the ball away from a defensive back for the score.

Following a screen pass interception by Badger lineman Tim Harris, the Badgers scored on the halfback pass with Ramon Moreno hitting Justin Amerine for the score, putting the Badgers up ahead to stay. Linebacker Danny Santee closed out Merkel's scoring returning a pass he intercepted 40 yards for the Badgers final score.

The loss by Brady placed their season record at 6-3 and their district record to 4-2. Brady faces Ballinger in their season finale.

Badger head coach Dick Lepard told **The Mail** Monday "I thought the big play in the game was a 4th and 1 screen pass to Moreno. We took advantage of every break they gave us and I think that shows a lot of maturity by our players. I don't want to talk about the "Old Merkel" anymore because its not fair to the town or the players. The kids just went out and did what they had to do."

Lepard said Brady used a different defense than they had been using this season and said he felt the Badgers strength and size really helped out late in the game. He added "It is nice to come from behind and win, especially on the

road. It would have been easy for the kids to give up after we went ahead and then Brady came back and scored to re-take the lead, but they didn't."

This week, the Badgers host Coahoma is the season's finale. Coahoma has had a rough year. They are 0-9 and have managed to score only 33 points so far.

Coahoma runs out of a multiple offensive set, utilizing the pro set most often. They run the 50 defensive set-up.

The Badgers have nine seniors playing in their final contest. They are Douglas Taylor, Justin Amerine, David Doan, Dusty Moore, Tim Harris, Chris Reyna, Danny Santee, Shayne Reagan and Jay Williams. Lepard said "This is their last game and I hate to see them leave. They have had a big

part in taking our program to where it is at."

Lepard also said he and his coaches were looking forward to beginning work in the off-season. He said "The coaches have to be pleased with what has happened and what is ahead for us. We have to continue the process of building our program and hopefully next year we can get in the playoffs. I am excited. I hope the lessons we have learned in football this year carry over to basketball and all the other sports here."

Also this week, the Badger 8th grade team will host Coahoma at 6 p.m. and the Junior Varsity travels to Coahoma for a 6 p.m. kickoff. Both of those games are tonight (Thursday).

Kickoff for the varsity game is 8 p.m.

Trent scares Jayton, face Highland Friday

Last Friday night, the Trent Gorillas almost pulled a major upset in 6-man football but came up short by two touchdowns as the No. 1 state ranked Jayton Jaybirds beat Trent 36-21. Jayton had not played 4 full quarters with such a close margin of scoring since they began playing 6-man football 2½ years ago.

Jayton received the opening kickoff and drove it down to the Gorilla twenty yard line before the hard hitting Gorillas forced a fumble and turned it into a drive that was capped by Freshman Mike Payne passing to classmate, wide receiver, Lee Hunt, for the T.D. Sophomore Quarterback Dock Carriker then connected with Hunt for the extra point.

Trent held at 7-0 lead going into the second quarter until the Jaybirds put 2 quick touchdowns on the board before half time.

The Jaybirds started quickly in the third quarter scoring on a long run by Richard Boswell making the score 20-7. The Gorillas came right back with sophomore running back Lewis Knapp firing a scoring strike to senior center Sam Jones. Hunt kicked the extra points, making the score 20-15.

The reigning state champion Jaybirds roared right back with another score, making it 28-15. Trent would not die though, and drove the ball down the field with Knapp rambling into the endzone from 5 yards out making the score

28-21. With about 5 minutes left in the game, Jayton put the icing on the cake when Richard Boswell scored the last touchdown of the night on a 73 yard run.

Boswell had 240 yards rushing for the night and Trent's Knapp had 190 yards. Senior middle linebacker Chris Simpson led all Trent tacklers with 8 solo tackles and 9 assisted tackles. Along with Simpson, defensive ends Brian Massey and Sam Jones were cited for their tough play against the bigger Jayton team. Linebackers Billy Fee, Mike Payne, Lewis Knapp, and safety Jason Massey were also praised by the coaches for their hustle and heads up play against the Jaybirds.

Trent is now 5-2-1 overall and 3-1-1 in district. Trent has one more game and if they win that one they will come in second behind Jayton and go to the zone playoffs. Their last game, though is with the tough Highland Hornets. The Hornets have a very big and physical team and will be hard to beat, especially because of the game being at Highland said Head Coach John Grimland. He also added that Highland, although not quite as quick or fast as Jayton, was well coached and they played very aggressive football.

Trent will travel to Highland next Friday night at 7:30 p.m. to tangle with the Hornets and a possible playoff berth.

Fortnightly group hears former Russian citizen

The Fortnightly Study Club met October 26 in the home of Joyce Jay with Nina Belle Hughes co-hostess.

After a short business session with President Alice King presiding, Ruby Hammond presented the program. Roll call was where my ancestors came from.

Mrs. Jay introduced the speaker her long time friend, Nina Magness. She related childhood experiences of her refugee family in Eastern Europe during World War II Era. She was born in Russia. Her mother was Russian and her father was German. They witnessed the invasion of the German army along with all the horrors of the war. Her father was denied a visa by the communists so he could take the family to Germany.

Her mother was a Christian and through much pray and perseverance she kept moving the refugee family of four young children and older husband on to freedom from communism. First into Latvia then Poland and finally to East Germany. They lived for a while in East Berlin under Russian control.

After one particular, dramatic experience of threats by the

Russian soldiers to send them back to Russia, her mother and Nina packed a few belonging. The next morning the family boarded a train going to West Berlin as tourist in order to not arouse suspicion. In West Berlin they went to the U.S. Army Headquarters as refugees from Communist Russia.

Mrs. Magness urged us to treasure the freedoms, we have under our constitution founded on Judeo Christian principals, namely the Ten Commandments.

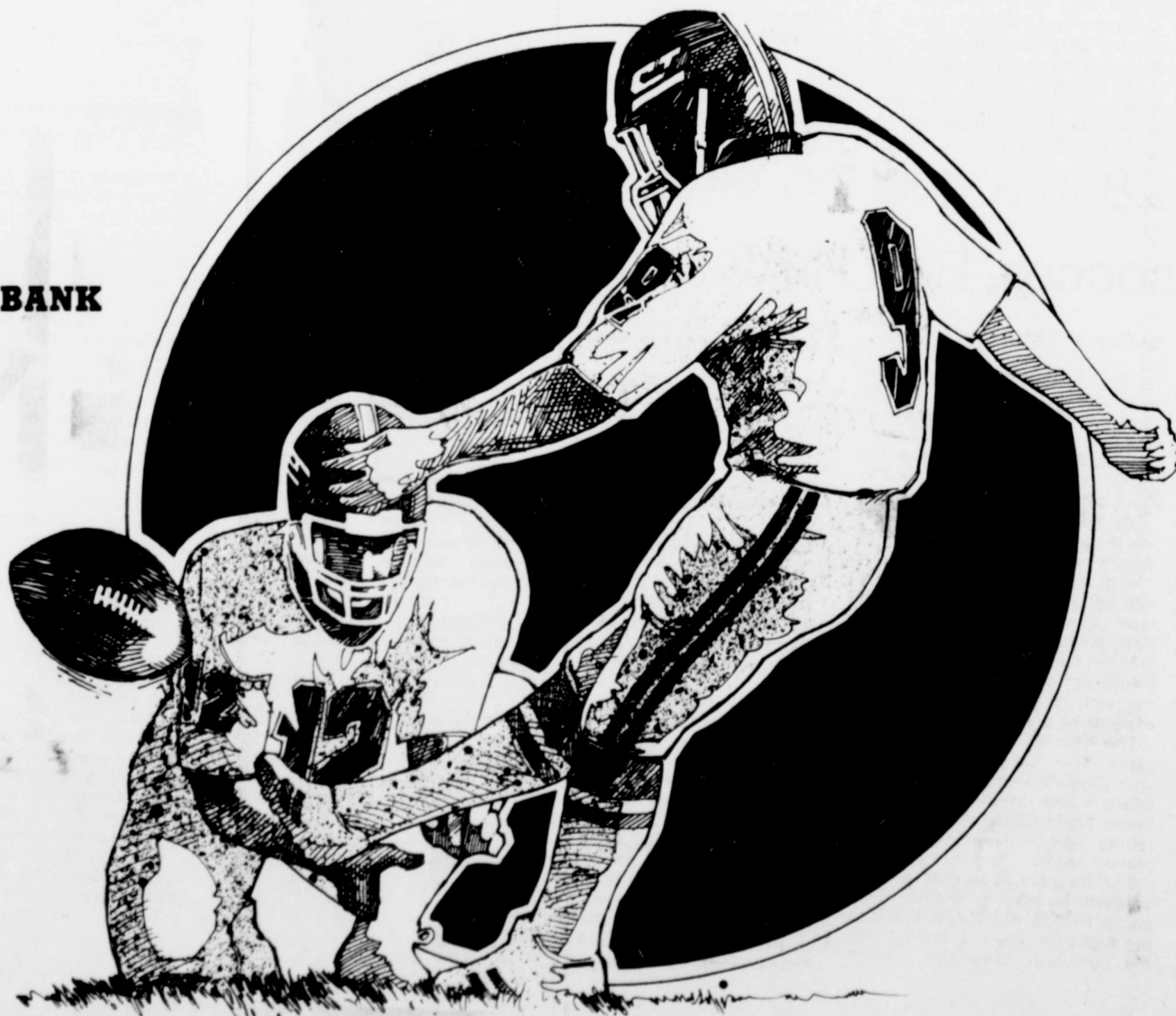

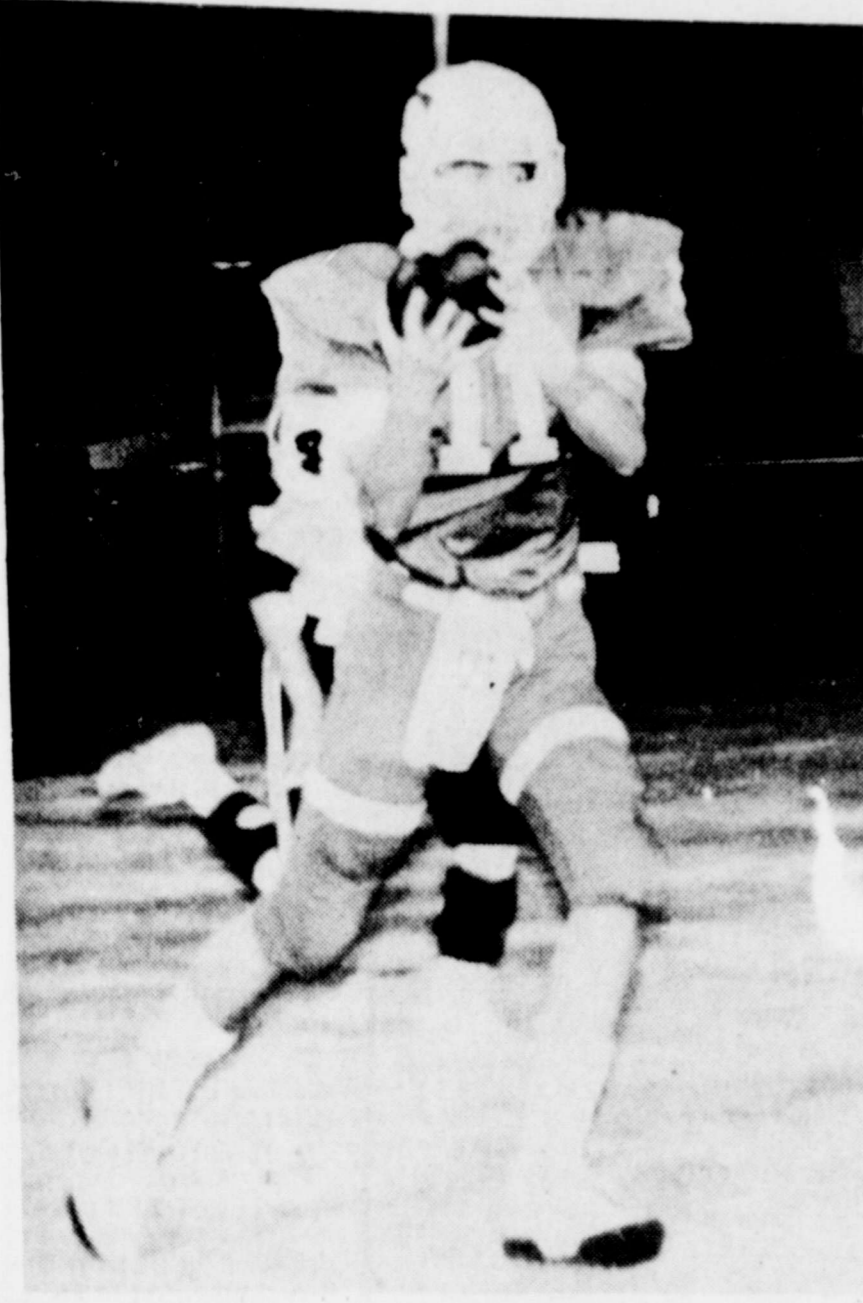

Up to 40% of a home's total heating and cooling bill can be a result of air infiltration. Air infiltration is simply the uncontrolled movement of air into or out of your home. You can help keep the cold out this winter by taking a few simple conservation measures now.

Weatherstripping
 As much cold air can enter your home through a 1/16" crack along the sides and top of a typical doorway as through a 4" x 4" hole in the wall. Help keep the cold out by replacing worn weatherstripping around all doors and windows.

Caulking
 Caulking in the cracks around door facings, windows, pipes and wiring will also help prevent air infiltration into your home. Polyurethane or similar caulking is available in an easy-to-install form at most hardware stores.

You can also help draft-proof your home by installing gaskets behind the cover plates of outlets and switches around your home. (Don't forget to turn the power off before removing the switch plates.)

For more information on the prevention of air infiltration this winter, call your local WTU office.
