

The budget is balanced in that the city expects to take in \$767,300 and spend \$760,599 leaving a balance of

State asks for drought aid

(AUSTIN) -- Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower has asked officials with the U.S. Department Agriculture to provide federal drought assistance to ranchers in South and West Texas.

'Ranchers in more than 100 counties in South and West Texas are suffering from a severe drought. The exas Department of Agriculture is asking U.S. Agriculture Secretary Richard Lyng to allow these ranchers to grow hay on conservation acreage to graze their livestock and to receive supplemental livestock feed from the Emergency Feed Grain Program if local supplies are inadequate.

Hightower's letter was handdelivered Thursday to Secretary Lyng's office in Washington, D.C. Copies of to Texas Governor Bill Clements, U.S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen and members of the Texas congressional delegation, state legislators, county officials, and farm leaders in the drought area.

"I have asked Secretary Lyng to reconsider USDA's earlier denial of a request by drought-stricken Texas counties that would allow Texas ranchers to plant badly-needed hay crops on thousands of acres in South and West Texas which have been set aside for conservation purposes. In addition. USDA must implement the Emergency Feed Grain Program to provide livestock feed in areas where local hay supplies and grazing pastures are inadequate," Hightower said.

"Some of these drought counties have not received significant amounts of rainfall since last fall, and many ranchers cannot stay in business much longer if they have to purchase expensive hay from other regions of the state. These ranchers are faced with the

supplies of weeds and cactus or selling their cattle at depressed prices. A speedy decision by USDA will literally determine the future of thousands of Texas producers," Hightower said.

"The Texas Department of Agriculture is already taking steps to help these livestock producers. We are working with livestock specialists, soil conservation experts and local officials to hold a series of seminars in the most ranchers with emergency land and herd management practices. Those one-day seminars will begin in early June. TDA is also assisting county officials in gathering information required by the Governor's Division of Emergency Management before federal disaster assistance can be requested. All of these efforts are needed because the National Weather Service has projected little or no improvement in rainfall conditions during the normally dry summer

months," Hightower said. Texas is one of four states which have sought USDA permission to allow ranchers to grow hay and graze cattle on land covered under various federal conservation programs. Texas' initial request was rejected by USDA in mid-April on the grounds that "there is no evidence of the occurrence of a natural disaster in 1988 causing a current shortage of hav.

An additional 20 Texas counties, mostly in South Texas, have requested permission to participate in the Emergency Feed Program. Under the terms of the Emergency Feed Program. the federal government would share in the cost of feeding malnourished livestock in drought-stricken counties. The Texas Department of Agriculture is now making a survey of the quantities and location of federally-owned feed grain in Texas that would be available under the Emergency Feed Program.
