Bullock says state has cash

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said last week the state should have enough money to continue current levels of state services in its 1990-91 budget period without new taxes.

That will be true, Bullock said, even though \$972 million in temporary taxes, fees and onetime book-keeping deals adopted by the Legislature are allowed to expire.

That was Bullock's first revenue statement for the 1990-91 budget which the Legislature will write when it convenes in January.

Bullock said that sales tax growth of 7.9 percent per year and motor vehicle sales tax growth of 6.2 percent per year will boost 1990-91 major fund revenues to \$29.9 billion, a 4.8 percent increase of 1988-89.

The sales tax gain will be spurred by an increase in consumer spending and an economic recovery led by manufacturing, Bullock said.

He noted that the sales tax and motor vehicle tax "today are two-thirds of all tax revenue, compared to one half of tax revenue just five short years ago."

Natural gas tax revenue will be up 5.7 percent per year in 1990-91, but oil taxes will gain only 1.2 percent per year as production continues to decline, Bullock said, even though average prices will rise to \$20 per barrel in 1990 and \$21.61 in 1991.

Bullock said there will be sufficient money to pay for current services even if the state loses \$1.9 billion in court cases challenging the corporate franchise tax, insurance tax and utility cases.

He said the revenue forecast could change, of course, if there is a national recession, a sharp drop in oil prices over a period of time or further court challenges to state taxes. He did not put a price tag on any of these possibilities.

Bullock noted that even though the revenue picture is bright, "it has no money to handle an increased spending by the Legislature."

Council approves special use permits

The Merkel City Council met Monday night and approved two zoning changes and heard a report on progress of the new City Hall.

Council approved a special use permit near Merkel Elementary School for the construction of a day care center. The builders plan to construct a 40 X 60 metal building on a 97 X 300 foot lot South of the school. Council said they would rather grant the special use permit rather than a zoning change.

Council also approved a special use permit for a mobile home Southeast of the North Park. A mobile home was located on the lot at one time and the lot has three mobile homes in that area.

City Manager J. A. Sadler said the foundation for the new City Hall was poured Saturday and the construction of the building should get started

next week.

Council also gave the city manager permission to repair the water well at the South Park.

Merkel police chief Bob Jones was unable to attend the meeting but his police activity report for May was presented by the city manager.

City police worked a total of 44 cases in May. They included five traffic accidents, four cases of theft, a case each of injury to a child burglary of a motor vehicle, aggravated assault and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

Police issued 15 traffic citations, made seven arrests and answered three dog calls.

They also made three arrests for minor in possession of alcoholic beverages, one assault, a case of allowing a dog to run loose and one case of making alcohol available to a minor.

Sales tax rebates continue to increase

Merkel's share of the state sales tax continues to increase, according to a news release from the State Comptroller's Office.

Merkel's rebates are 7.96 percent ahead of those last year. So far this year, Merkel has received \$30,240.92 compared to \$28,009.96. The latest check was for \$3,642.11 which is \$1,000 higher than the check for last June.

Tye's rebates also continue to increase. So far this year, Tye is 5.60 percent ahead of rebates last year. Tye has received \$39,201.85 so far this year compared to \$28,599.30 through the same time last year.

Overall, rebates are 9.23 percent

higher in Taylor County this year. The rebates run from a high of a 79.33 percent increase in Tuscola to a 14.98 percent decrease in Trent.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said increases are 23.5 percent higher statewide. Bullock said "Local governments will continue to see a healthy increase in revenues from their sales taxes as the state's economy mends and consumer confidence grows."

He added "The increase is too great to be attributed to the Legislature's broadening of the sales tax base, which was estimated to bring in an extra 3.5 percent in local revenues."

He said he expects to see sales tax receipts increase about 8 percent a year through 1991.

Beef checkoff referendum passes

National beef checkoff referendum results, announced May 27 by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, were seen as extremely positive by industry, education and research groups involved in the effort.

Nationally, 78.97 percent of the eligible cattle producers, dairy farmers and importers voted to continue funding the U. S. beef research and promotion. Of the 256,505 total ballots cast, 202,408 were affirmative votes, while the remaining 54,097 voters registered negative votes, or 21.03 percent rejected the referendum.

In Texas, 37,945 people voted in the referendum. Affirmative votes were cast by 32,269 persons or, 88 percent no were 5,676 persons, or 12 percent.

Dr. Ernest E. Davis, economist in livestock marketing with the Texas A & M University Agricultural Extension Service, said it is very critical that this funding be available to cattlemen not only for advertising and promotion but also "for future research and continuing development of genetically designed cattle to meet consumer and packer carcass and meat demands."

Davis said approval of the referendum will allow funds spent on that research to come from cattlemen rather than private funding.

"This means that cattlemen may own the genetics, instead of a private company," Davis said.

Passage of the referendum will permit long range information planning that will benefit all segments of the beef industry, said Dr. John R. Beverly, beef cattle project group supervisor for the Extension Service.

"Broader promotion and information projects can now be planned in this post-referendum period. Besides product development research and promotion, more comprehensive marketing research and educational efforts can be generated that should have a positive impact on all phases of the beef industry," Beverly said.

According to Anne Anderson, director of the Texas Beef Industry Council in Austin, strategies to be used to influence consumers include reaching the through education of physicians, dieticians, nutritionists and children- the consumers of the future.

"The Beef Industry Council will strive to reposition beef as a food that is fashionable, light, healthy, wholesome, versatile, nutritious and good tasting by working with food editors of magazines as well as the broadcast media," Anderson said.

The referendum provides the accountability needed so producers are aware that funding decisions have been made by the producers, Anderson said.

The beef checkoff program, which began Oct. 1 of 1985 as a result of the 1985 Farm Bill's Beef promotion and Research Act, required that \$1 from every head of cattle sold or imported in the U. S. be put aside for beef promotion and marketing efforts. The program is controlled by a 113 member board of 108 producers and five importers.
