Yet Miss Alice Robertson of Oklahoma and Miss Jeanette Rankin of Montana proved otherwise. And when the Seventieth congress convenes in December four women will be occupying seats in the house of representatives. They are Mrs. Mary T. Norton of New Jersey. Mrs. Florence Kahn of California, Mrs. Edith Nourse Rogers of Massachusetts, and Mrs. Katherine Langley

great open spaces of the West, where men are men and women are gov ernors," Mrs. Miriam Ferguson of Texas and Mrs. Nellie Tayloe Ross of Wyoming proved that it wasn't so improbable after all.

So it's neither impossible nor im probable that Mrs. American Citizen may aim even higher than the halls of congress or the executive offices of a statehouse and we may yet see one of them presiding over the United States senate as "president of senate and vice-president of the United States." As a matter of fact, the movement to bring that about already is under way. Mrs. W. E. Maulsby, vice chairman of the lows Democratic women's organization, has announced that an effort will be made to obtain the vice-presidential nomination for Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, widow of the war President. And from Washington comes the word that the National Women's party is already laying its lines for a campaign to

pear before either the Republican or Democratic conventions next year as a running mate for the standard bearer of either party.

Already several names have been suggested as possibilities. One of them is Mrs. Florence E. Allen, a justice of the Ohio Supreme court, who was defeated in a campaign for the senate last year. Another is Mrs. Medill McCormick, whose father, Mark Hanna of Ohio, and whose husband, Medill McCormick of Illinois, both occupied senate seats. It is considered certain that Mrs. McCormick will be a candidate in the Illinois senatorial campaign if Col. Frank Smith is denied his seat and a vacancy ensues. Still another is Mrs. Alice Roosevelt Longworth, wife of Nicholas Longworth, speaker of the house. "Princess Alice" has been one of Washington's striking personalities ever since her father, Col. Theodore Roosevelt, entered the White House away back in 1901 and there are those who say that she is a "chip off the old block" and possesses such charm, tact and political sagacity as to make her a force worth reckoning with in politics. The first time was 55 years ago when Mrs. Victoria Woodhull Martin was the Equal Rights party candidate for the Presidency, in 1872, when C. S. Grant was the Republican nominee and Horace Greeley was the Democratic. In 1884, when James G. Blaine was the Republican standard-bearer, nd Grover Cleveland the Democratic the Equal Rights party again had a ticket in the field and in that year Belva Ann Loekwood, a lawyer by profession and prominent in temperance, peace and suffrage movements, was its candidate. Again in 1888 Mrs. Lockwood ran against Benjamin Har-

Unsuccessful Presidential candidates usually slide back into the oblivion of public forgetfulness. But not so with Mrs. Martin. Three years ago the memory of her campaign was revived by the following Associated Press dispatch from London, England:

The gift to the Anglo-American association of an ancient English manor house to be used as a hostel by Amerlean pilgrims to Sulgrave manor, the home of George Washington's ancestors, brings out of obcurity a woman once known from one end of the United States to the other.

For the denor of the manor house is the venerable Mrs. Victoria Woodhull Martin, candidate for the Presidency of the United States in 1872 along with General Grant and Horace Greeley Mrs. Martin, then Mrs. Woodbull, was the nominee of the Equal Rights party. That was the year President Coolidge

was born; John W. Lavis was not born until the following year. General Dawes was learning Sunday school texts and Mr. LaFollette was seven-

Famous for her beauty not less than

respecting woman's status in society, Mrs. Woodhull made a spectacular fight in a campaign which closed with the re-election of General Grant and Greeley's tragic death. But she had demonstrated that a woman could run for President, even though the women of the nation as a whole were not to receive the franchise until nearly balf a century later.

But Mrs. Woodhull Martin has lived to see the suffrage fight won, not only by the women of her native America, but by English women as well and from the retirement of her home at Norton Park, Bredon's Norton, up in Worcestershire, at the age of eighty-six, she looks out upon a world which today cheerfully accepts for women the entarged horizon for which she was

fighting two generations ago.

Born in Ohio in 1838, she was the widow of Dr. Canning Woodbull when she made a speaking tour of England. One of her audience in old St. James hall was the late John Bidulph Martin, English banker and philanthropist. Their marriage followed, and the womon who had startled the United States by running for the Presidency came to England to reside.

And early this year that memory was revived again by the following A. P. dispatch from Brighton, England:

Mrs. Victoria Claffin Woodhull Martin, the first woman candidate for the

Presidency of the United States-in 1872—and long a fighter for equal suffrage, believes that twenty-five is plen-ty young enough for men and women to obtain the franchise.
In 1872 Mrs. Martin carried the ban-

ner of equal suffrage in Maine and Cal-ifornia as Presidental cambidate of the Equal Rights party and at eightyeight she is still interested in promot-ing the emancipation of women.

"I want women to have the vote as soon as they are fit to use it," Mrs. Martin told a correspondent for the Associated Press, "but I do not believe in forced maturity. Twenty-five is young enough for persons of both sexes to exercise the franchise."

Mrs. Martin was seated with her daughter, Miss Virginia Woodhull, in their apartment here when she received the correspondent. Time has not dimmed the eyes of this spirited woman who, with her sister, the late Lady Cook, formerly Tennessee Claffin. the first woman broker in New York and lectured and published "Ciaffin's Weekly" in support of equal suffrage and eugenics before they both came

"I was making history when I was twenty-one." Mrs. Martin replied, "but i was a wife when little more than a child. My son was born when I was very young and I had an unusually advanced education at home. My case was exceptional."

"But what about your daughter?"
Mrs. Martin was asked, "surely she was fit to vote at twenty-ene."

"Certainly not," she replied. "Mother is right," Miss Woodhull agreed with good humor, "I knew nothing when I was twenty-one, although I was studious and had read a great deal. I question if even the modern emancipated girl is a sufficient judge of character to discriminate between political candidates."

The fame of Mrs. Belva Ann Lockwood does not rest upon her Presidential aspirations. Although she was second in the Presidential race she was first in another field of activity. that of being the first woman lawyer admitted to practice before the Supreme court. In order to obtain this privilege she had to get a bill through congress permitting women to practice law and then she worked for three

years to create a favorable sentimen toward women pleading before the highest judicial body of the land

court in the United States was open to her and never again was a woman lawyer's application denied because of her sex or because she was a married woman, as in Mrs. Lockwood's case.

Mrs. Lockwood was born in New York in 1830, and a desire for an education became her ruling passion. At eighteen she was the bride of Uriab McNeil, a young farmer, and at the age of twenty-three, a widow with a baby daughter to support. Still determined to secure an education, she worked her way through Genesee coltege and became principal of the Lockseminary at Oswego. At the close of the Civil war she went to Washington to teach and to study law, but another marriage, this time to Dr. Ezekiel Lockwood, an army chaptain, in 1868. interfered with the progress of her career. 
She was one of the early workers for equal rights for men and women and drafted and brought about the passage of a bill equalizing the pay of women in the government service with that of men for equal work. But it was perhaps her labor in the Interest of world peace which brought her her greatest fame. For 36 years she was a members of the Universal Peace union and took part in the first Peace con gress in 1885. She compiled the peace treaties of the United States, studied them and brought about the introduction of the first bill in congress for an International arbitration court, Although she was sixty years of age at the time of the Peace congress in London in 1890, she remained abroad to take a course of lectures at Oxford. At the age of eighty-two she returned to Europe to carry a peace message to the women of the world. And in 1916. a year before her death, she gave an address on the re-election of Woodrow

MAKING AN ESTIMATE OF CROP ACREAGE



"Cropmeters," machines designed to help the Department of Agriculture crop reporting service make prompt and accurate estimates of the acreage devoted to different crops, are now being used by the department in various sections of the country. OWNERS CARELSS ABOUT CAR LOOKS

Automobiles Not Always Kept Clean as Carriages Were.

In the days of the horse and carriage every owner was proud of his equipment. He would not think of riding down the street or through the park unless his horse was groomed so port schools and later of the McNell that the animal's coat looked like silk and the harness trimming glistened in the sun. Pride In Equipment Lacking.

Now that the automobile has in a large measure displaced the horse hustle and bustle of the world today, or it may be that they have grown a bit careless. Not all are careless about how their automobile looks for there still remain a number who take the same keen pride in owning an automobile that has been well groomed as they do in their own personal appearance. The vast majority, however, are content so long as the car runs.

Little by little this condition is changing and it will come about more rapidly when the general automobile public are educated to the fact that dust, grime and grease, either on the body or running gear of their machine, is an enemy to efficiency of operation. The present-day automobile gathers from out the air a film composed of oil and dirt which clings to the paint or lacquer finish and cannot be removed except with a cleanser.

Injures' the Finish.

It is impervious to water itself, though a washing will soften it up and make its removal much easier. In time this scum attacks the finish and eventually will require that the car be sent to the paint shop. On the running gear and chassis it works this seum into the moving parts and dirt being an abrasive it is only a question of time until looseness in steering and spring shackles, as well as brake rods, brings to the owner's attention the fact that his car is wearing out faster

than it should. Like other things regarding the care of an automobile, a system has been devised and patented whereby an automobile can now be thoroughly washed underneath as well as on the body, top and hood while the owner waits. The total operation takes about fifteen minutes.

Upper Hose Connection Needs Replacing Often

Motorists who have wondered why it is that the upper water hose connection needs replacing more often than the lower one only have to know their engine a little better in order to understand the reason. Circulation of water is from the pump up through the water jackets to the top of the radiator, or up through the water jackets in the same direction in the case of thermo-syphon cooling, in which a pump is not utilized. This means that the hotter water always is rising and that the water is hottest when it is passing through the top water hose to the radiator.

This heat has a disintegrating effect on the rubber hose connection. The connections at the pump receive cooler water from the radiator and generally last longer.

Brake Test Devised

Are your four-wheel brakes adjusted equally? Here is a simple way to tell: Apply the brakes both gently and vigerously about a dozen times, then stop the car and feel each brake band to see whether they seem equally hot. Allowance should be made for greater heat at the rear bands, because in some cars these brates operate before the front ones come into action. This test may keep the bands on one side of the car from burning out prema-

Scientists Striving to Find New Fuel for Auto

Acting on the oft-repeated statement that the American gasoline supply would be seriously depleted within from 10 to 25 years if consumption continues at the present rate, a series of experiments are being carried on by the Purdue university engineering experiment station regarding the carburetion of heavier fuels. These experiments are being conducted with kerosene and other foels and the data are being carefully filed for future reference.


Results of the experiments have been published in a bulletin issued by the engineering experiment station. This publication presents data on the carburetion of kerosene and provides additional information concerning the effect of fuel volatility on the carburetion problem. Its purpose also is to show how an engine operating on kerosene reacts to variations . ? ? .. strength and temperature of the mix. ture, to point out the optimum temperature for satisfactory performance and to specify the correct mixture

ratios for economy and power. The bulletin has been noted with interest by automotive men generally and also by fuel companies of the country, which are vitally interested in this work.



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

NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

Teapot Dome Lease Is Canceled-Woman Fails in Atlantic Flight.

FINAL victory has been scored by the federal government in its three years' fight to regain the valuable oil ields that were leased to others by Albert B. Fall when he was secretary of the interior. Last week the Suoreme Court of the United States vitiated the Teapot Dome lease held by Harry F. Sinclair. The decision susained the ruling of the Circuit Court of Appea's which reversed a Wyoming federal court that upheld the validity of the lease. This brings back to the government Wyoming oil lands estimated to be worth \$100,000,000, plus \$3,000,000 in cash now in the hands. of the court's receivers; \$2,000,000 worth of oll taken out by Sinclair befere suit was started and for which e must make restitution, and more han \$1,000,000 worth of oil tanks, pipe lines and other improvements con-Ducted by Sinclair, but for which the court denies him equity because of the

The court's decision last March, simlaily denouncing the Doheny lease of the Elk Hills (Calif.) naval reserve as illegal and fraudulent, restored even more valuable oil lands to the navy. A survey just completed by oil experts estimates that the Elk Hills lands contain 720,000,000 barrels of oil, or nearly three times the amount previously matted, its value is place at fully \$300,000,000. MEXICO'S latest revolutionary movement is, as predicted, effectively suppressed and Calles is more firmly in the saddle than ever, with Obregon assured of the succession to the Presidency. General Gomez and his band of followers in the state of Vera Cruz were attacked at Chualulco by loyal troops under General Escobar and utterly routed, bombing planes playing a considerable part in the engagement. Gomez and his staff officers, seeing the day was lost, fled into the hills. Felix Palavicini, a journalist who has been deported, lays all the blame for the mutiny on General Serrane, who was caught and executed. Obregon says that when he becomes President he will follow Calles' policy in compelling Catholics and other religious denominations to respect the laws, since this policy has the support of the majority of the people of the country.

YUGO-SLAVIA and Bulgaria have practically settled their row over raids by Bulgarian comitadjis or irregulars along the border, but now Poland and Lithuania are on the eve of a break which may have serious consequences. The Lithuanian government has closed Polish schools and confiscated Pollsh estates in Lithuania, and plans to declare Vilna the capital of the country, despite the fact that that city was s seven years ago. Then, last week, a number of Poles were arrested in Lithuania on charges of having plotted the assassination of President Smetona. The Polish government sent an ultimatum to Kovno threatening action unless Lithuania should radically alter its policy within one week. Marshal Pilsudski, dictator of Poland. wishes to avoid the use of force if possible, but the British minister to Warsaw reports that the situation is fraught with danger.

OVER in China the pendulum has swung back and the Shansi armies that had defeated Marshal Chang's troops and threatened to take Peking have themselves been beaten in battle and at last reports were retreating westward in considerable disorder. About 10,000 of the Shansi soldiers were captured and sent into Manchuria. The northern forces began operations for the capture of Shansi province and against Gen: Feng-Yu-hsiang in Honan province. Peking's feeling of relief was modified by the knowledge that it had been saved partly by the calling in of a horde of 15,000 Mongol cavalry, reputed to be the flercest and most cruel fighters in all

S PAIN began its return to a consti-tutional parliamentary government last week with the formal opening of the new national assembly by King Alfonso. But it was only a faint start that way, for the assembly membership is picked by the dictator, Gen. Primo de Rivera, and so seems certain to do the bidding of the directorate which he heads. Two of the women delegates, the duchess of Parcent and Countess San Luis, resigned just before the assembly opened.

SENATOR JAMES A. REED of Missouri, who stands ready to accept the Democratic Presidential nomination if Gov. Al Smith cannot get it, was endorsed as a candidate by the Missouri state committee at Sedalia, and then delivered to a big assemblage of Democrats what was considered the keynote speech for his party in the coming campaign. He denounced Republican rule as no less corrupt now than during the Harding administration and scored Mellon, Daugherty and Fall. Making a plea for unity, the senator said:

"Let us make our fight beneath banners proclaiming the right of each citizen to regulate his own personal conduct-chart his own course through life-determine his own habits and to control the affairs of his own house-

hold, free from all restraints. "If this people are to remain free,

"Let us demand: "The honest administration of gov-

R ADICAL Republican senators have been holding a series of conferences in Washington, and it was reported their purpose was to promote the Presidential boom of Senator Norris of Nebraska. But some of them issued a signed statement disclaiming any "third party" intentions and denying they planned insurgency within their party. Their purpose, said these gentlemen-Borah, Norris, Frazler, Nye and Brookhart-was to form a strong Western bloc and "get some unity of purpose and some solidarity of action" among Western senators and to impress upon the Eastern states and their representatives in congress that, as Senator Borah explained it "a large portion of the United States

lies west of the Allegheny mountains." Friends of Norris, it is said, intend to enter his name in these fourteen preferential primary states: California. Illinois, Massachusetts, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, West Virginia and Wisconsin.

MAYOR DUVALL of Indianapolis, convicted of political corruption, was sentenced last week to thirty days in jall and fined \$1,000, and disfranchised for four years. He will appeal the case and says he will not resign until this appeal has been carried through the State Supreme court. The prosecutors believed he would be forced to gult office, in which case his wife, now city controller, would succeed him. Numerous civic groups are determined to oust both the Duvalls.

FEDERAL JUDGE F. P. SCHOONof the most sweeping injunctions in the history of labor disputes, restraining the United Mine Workers of America, its officials and its members, Virtually every activity of the union against the nonunion Pittsburgh Terminal Coal corporation was forbidden. The union and its members were restrained from violence of any sort against company employees and prespective employees and against company property. Union pickets were restrained from putting their foot on company property, but were allowed to establish a single picket post on each road leading to the mines. Such pickets were cautioned against using abusive language, but were permitted the use of peaceful persuasion.

The long strikes of coal miners has been ended in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa and other Middle Western fields, the men temporarily receiving the wages called for by the Jacksonville agreement until the question of pay has been settled by commissioners to be appointed.

WILLIAM T. COSGRAVE, President of the Irish Free State, obtained a majority of six votes in the new Dall Eireann and was re-elected The followers of De Valera and the Labor party voted solidly against him, and the Redmondites refrained from voting. The chief attack on Cosgrave was delivered by Sean T. O'Kelly, a De Valera man, who declared the President was the tool of England and attacked his financial and economic policles. Next day Cosgrave announced his cabinet, which was approved by the same vote, and also announced that the Farmers' party had fused with the government party.

Famous Painter Put Heart Into His Work

In many respects the career of Titian, the Venetian artist, is without parallel in the history of art. The span of his productive life is unprecedented. He lived to be ninety-nine years old and painted steadily for nearly seventy-five years. This noted painter apparently believed that no amount of inspiration or intuitive genius is a substitute for painstaking labor. A contemporary wrote of him:

"He laid in his pictures with a mass of colors which served him as a ground-work for what he wanted to express. I myself have seen such powerful strokes swept in by him with solid pigment, sometimes with pure 'terra rossa' (red ocher)-and this served him for the half-tonessometimes with a brush full of white lead; and with the same brush dipped in red, black or yellow he picked out the lights. In four strokes he had sketched in a remarkably beautiful figure. Then he laid the picture against the wall, and left it there, often for several months, without looking at it again, and when h wanted to work at it he examined it very critically as if it were his mortal enemy, in order to discover any possible faults. Then he took away a prominence here, set an arm straight there, and got a foot into the right position. So by degrees he brought his figures to the most perfect symmetry, and then he proceeded to do the same with the next picture." -Kansas City Star.
