

NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

President Goes to Cuba and American Marines Bomb Nicaraguans.

DRESIDENT COOLIDGE left Washington Friday by train for Key West, Fla., where he boarded the battleship Texas and steamed across to Havana, Cuba, thus leaving the United States for the first time in his incumbency of the Presidential office. With him were Mrs. Coolidge and the distinguished gentlemen comprising the American delegation to the Pan-American congress. It was to participate in the opening of that assemblage that Mr. Coolidge made the journey, and his stay on the island was to be brief.

There were unmistakable signs that the leadership of the United States in the affairs of the continent was to be ontested by the delegations of some of the Latin American nations, this being precipitated by resentment against American intervention in Nicaragua. In order that the President and his delegation might not be embarrassed by criticism at home, the senate committee on foreign relations decided to postpone Its investigation of the Nicaraguan situation until after his return. Such an inquiry was called for by a resolution introduced by Senator Wheeler of Montana and a majority of the committee seemed ason stated. Protests against our course in Nicaragua have been rather frequent, the latest being in the form of a cablegram to President Coolidge from the editors of papers in Begota, Colombia.

Meanwhile American marines numbering 1,000 were being hurried down to Nicaragua from both the Atlantic and the Pacific stations and General Lejeune, commander of the corps, also went down there to look over the situntion. The announced intention to break up the rebel band led by General Sandino and give the country complete peace has not been altered. The bandits, who are said to be trained by a former German officer named Muller, are active and enterprising and have made several attempts to ambush detachments of marines. In one instance, at Somotillo a number of native troops deserted their allies and helped the rebels in an attack on a patrol commanded by Capt. Paul W. Payne of the marines. Outnumbered, Payne retreated to Villa Nueva, obtained reinforcements and returned to Somotilia, but was again driven off. A larger body of troops was rushed there from Chinandega, but the bandits and deserters had fled to the mountains. Lieut. F. C. Schilt, marine aviator, discovered about 200 bandits lying in ambush awaiting a column of marines which was marching from Quilall to Jicaro. With bombs and machine gun the Heutenant put the band to rout, killing fourteen and wounding others. Bombs dropped from another marine plane north of Quilali killed nine rebels, breaking up a concentration.

SENATOR DAVID A. REED'S committee that has been investigating the alleged Mexican documents that were published in the Hearst papers made a partial report in which were these findings:

1. There is not a scintilla of evidence that any United States senator has accepted, or was promised, or was offered, directly or indirectly, any money or other valuable thing, by any officer or representative of the government of Mexico.

2. The pretended document show ing that \$1,215,000 was withdrawn from the Mexican treasury and sent to the Mexican consul general in New York to be paid to United States senators, is not genuine, but is spurious and fraudulent and, in so far as it purports to be signed by the President of Mexico or the secretary of the treasury of Mexico, it is forged.

The committee said it had not yet been able to determine the identity of the manufacturer of the spurious docmments. Senator Reed told the sentained the papers for Hearst, and John Page, who acted for the publisher, had testified falsely, and he criticized Hearst severely.

C OLONEL LINDBERGH'S successful flights are becoming almost conctonous, and some one has said that if he did not land safely somewhere, that would be news. However, his tour still makes interesting reading and the Latin-Americans do not weary of receiving him tumultuously and heaping honors upon him. Monday of last week the lone eagle dropped down on the flying field at Panama that was built and named for him, after a four hours' fight from Costa Rica. The huge crowd almost mobbed him, and President Chiari received him warmly. For two days there were fetes, banquets, reviews and other functions, and Lindbergh took President Chiari and Vice President Duque up in an army observation plane. Then the flyer had several days, busy but more restful, in the Canal Zone. He announced that he would fly to Venezuela next, alighting at the army air field near Maracay, where President Gomez lives. Then he planned to proceed to St. Thomas, one of the Virgin islands, next to San Juan, Porto Rico, where there is an excellent army field: thence to Santo Domingo, where there also is a good marine-constructed field; then to Port au Prince, Haiti, which has the best field in the Caribbean, and then to Havana.

It was declared in Rome to be the most important Vatican document issued since the World war, and there can be no doubt that its effect will be great and widespread. It was considered specifically as a rejection of the efforts of the Anglo-Catholics of the Church of England to bring about an entente with the Catholic church. but its terms are general.

The pope declares the sole religion was revealed to the Catholic church which has maintained itself one and identical throughout the centuries.

Of religious conferences and congresses for unity to which all are invited the encyclical says: "Such attempts cannot obtain the approval of Catholics. These movements are founded on the false theory presunposing that all religions are good and meritorious; therefore all, although in a different way, manifest and signify equally that sentiment, inhern in us, to be carried to God for reverent recognition of His dominion.

"Followers of such a theory not alone deceive and err, but repudiate true religion, distorting concepts. tending little by little to naturalism and atheism, whence clearly those adhering to such theories detach themselves from the religion revealed by God. Under the appearance of good they more easily hide deception when they try to promote the unity of all

S ECRETARY OF THE NAVY WILof naval operations, appearing before the house naval affairs committee in behalf of the new \$725,000,000 construction program, told the congressmen flatly that the American fleet is now inadequate to the defense of the country. They asserted that the building of 72 vessels, including cruisers, submarines, destroyer leaders and aircraft carriers, would fulfill the sea defense needs of the United States.

While denying that the program can be considered as placing the United States in competition with other nations, Secretary Wilbur admitted that in working out American needs the size of other navies was taken into consideration. He said the program would put the United States well within the 5-5-3 ratio as far as Britain is concerned and slightly above the ratio with Japan.

Admiral Hughes said the completien of the program would give the country "reasonable security." but would not give the United States command of the sea.

R EPLYING to Secretary Kellogg's suggestion of a multilateral treaty renouncing war, the French government proposes that the ban shall be restricted to "aggressive war." This is not agreeable to our government and in a second note Mr. Kellogg shows it clings to its original stand that the treaty's declaration be against war without any qualifying or modifying definition attached, and also that other world powers be asked to unite in signing it. The new turn in the discussion is not considered by the State department to bar the way to ultimate negotiation of a treaty between France and America, and ultimately with all powers, declaring against war as a weapon in international relations.

THOMAS HARDY, dean of English literature and the last of the great Victorian writers, died Wednesday at his home near Dorchester at the age of eighty-seven, after a month's Illness. Of late years the famous novelist of Wessex had devoted himself to writing poetry, but whether any of these poems will be put into print is doubtful.

Post of Washingten, author, editor and adherent of George's single tax theories; Marvin Hughitt of Chicago, ploneer railroad builder and executive; Sara A. Article Twenty. Declarer's Play of a Declared Trump

(Continued.) WHEN dealer obtains the lead in a declared trump, the important question to be decided at once is regarding the exhausting of the adver-

saries' trumps.

This should be done when the trumps in his two hands are such in number and size that he thinks he can exhaust the opponents' trumps and retain at least one himself, and when he has good side suit cards in addition. If, however, he has but few high cards and no long side suit and has a very short suit in each hand it would be better to play these short suits until he is void of one in each hand, and then take advantage of a cross ruff by trumping one suit in each hand. This enables him to make the small trumps in each hand separately and often increases his gains by several tricks.

Frequently dummy will be short of the adversaries' suit and then it is usually wise for declarer to lead any remaining small cards of that suit from his own hand and trump them in dummy, and then exhaust trumps.

A good way to estimate the number of tricks which will be taken is for declarer to count the losing cards in his own hand and then see if there is any possible way to get rid of any of them. Small cards are not losers if there are any winning cards in dummy upon which they may be played either in following suit or in discarding.

For instance, let us look at two hands from this standpoint. Declarer is playing a heart declaration and holds the following cards: Spades, Ace and three small ores; hearts, Ace. King. Jack, and two small ones; diamonds, three small ones; clubs, one small one. Dummy has: Spades, King and one; hearts, Queen and two; diamonds, King and two; clubs, Ace, King

Declarer's trumps should all win and so should the Ace of spades; but this leaves as apparent losers three small spades, three diamonds and one club. Dummy's King of spades and Ace and King of clubs will take care of three of these seven losers. If senior holds the Ace of diamonds, dummy's King will afford a winner for one more; and if declarer can trump two small spades with dummy's trumps he will have only one or possibly two final losers. If in this deal declarer should extract trumps when he first obtains the lead he would undoubtedly lose two

ing with his two losing spades.

If declarer has a long suit in dummy he should as a rule exhaust trumps at once and then proceed to establish A burglar alarm attachment for it. If after two rounds one adversary has no more in his own hand he should lead it a third time from dummy and trump in his own hand. Then if that brings out the Queen dummy's remaining cards in the suit will be good. In following this line of play, however. declarer must be sure that he will be able to throw the lead to dummy in some other suit for if he cannot do this, dummy's good cards will be use-

Suppose declarer is playing a heart declaration and his dummy holds: Spades. Ace and ore small one; hearts three small ones; diamonds, Ace, King and four small ones; clubs, two small ones. Declarer has in his hand: Spades, King and two small ones: hearts. Ace, King. Queen and two small ores; diamonds, two small ones, and clabs. Queen and two small ones.

Senior opens with a small space. and if declarer does not consider what easy be necessary to establish dummy's suit he might play the Ace on the first trick. If he did this, then proceeded to exhaust trumps by three leads, and finally started on the diamonds only to find c e adversary hold ing three to the Queen he would lose three tricks. On the other hand, if he foresees this situation and takes the arst trick in his own hand with the Kirg, he could trump the third round of diamonds and then lead a spade to duramy's Ace and make his other three diamonds.

In using one or two of dumnies trumps for ruffing before exhausting trumps it frequently is advisable for declarer to hold up the commanding card of that suit in his own hand to he played after ruffing a small card or two To illustrate: Learts are trumps and senior leads the Ace of spades. dummy has a singleton, and declarer has the King and two small ones. Sep for would not coacinue spades, but when declarer gets the lead he may lead a small spade and trump in dum my and then exhaust trumps, taking

his King of spades afterwards, If he led his King and then a small one to trump junior would be more likely to trump over him.
