CLARENDON COLLEGE GETS AFFILIATION

Special to the Hedley Informer.
Clarendon, Texas, March 26.—Following the telegram appraising school authorities of the affiliation of Clarendon Municipal Junior College with the State Department of Education last week, is a letter giving details of the ranking of the school, together with recommendations of Inspector Reid, who made the survey.

The plan and organization of the local college and its equipment drew especial praise from the inspector and the recommendations are such that the school board here are pleased over the prospects for even a more successful term in 1928-29. The library brought specific approval, and the report set forth that Clarendon's Junior College was organized and administered on a basis favorable to comparison to any other institution of similar rank.

"The success of the college this year has been little short of marvelous," declares Secretary Powell of the board, "and every recommendation of the State Board will be met." Greater outside patronage is to be expected during the next long session, with the college's rank now secured. The Clarendon Junior College will open its doors next September with a real college atmosphere and spirit.

J. D. HUDSON

The following article, accompanied by an excellent likeness of Mr. Hudson, appeared in the Dallas Morning News of Sunday, March 18:

Jefferson Davis Hudson, 67, well known railroad man who died in Dallas, was buried in Kosse, his former home. Mr. Hudson moved to Texas from Mississippi when he was 9 years old. He began work for the Houston & Texas Central at Thornton when he was 17 years old. He moved to Kosse and was agent for the H. & P. C. for 21 years. He quit the railroad business in 1903, but in 1917 went with the Missouri Kansas & Texas and was employed as district agent until 1920. Later he went to work for the Texas & Pacific and was employed by that road until his death.

Mr. Hudson is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mary C. Hudson of Dallas; two daughters, Mrs. P. J. Williford of Houston and Mrs. L. M. Justice of Hedley; two brothers, C. C. Hudson, Thornton, and W. M. Hudson and a sister, Mrs. Texas Gilmore, of Lolita.

Mr. Hudson was known to a good many Hedley people, he having visited his daughter here a number of times. He made the last visit here but a few weeks before his death.

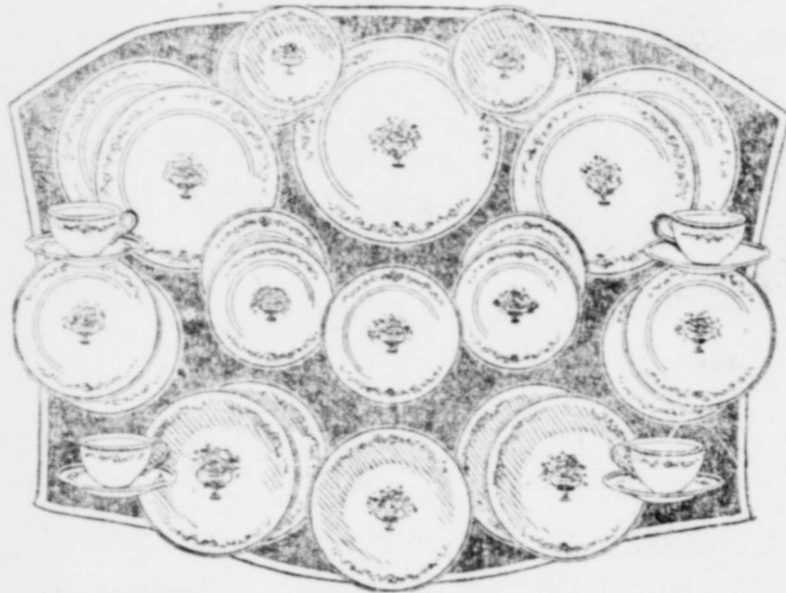
