Scattered Shots

The recent union of Egypt and Syria into the United Arab Republic has given rise to speculation that perhaps the other Arab countries may follow suit. This may be somewhat difficult, due to several quarrels of long standing, but if such a union becomes a reality, it could become a potent factor in world affairs.

The Arabic world has had a much greater influence on our civilization than a westerner might realize. During the centuries known as the 'Dark Ages' in Europe, a great Arab civilization made extensive discoveries in surgery, medicine, mathematics, philosophy, law, astronomy, art, and practically every field of human endeavor. Much of the writing of the ancient Greeks would have been lost if the Arabs had not translated it into Arabic and preserved it, to be later translated into Latin and re-introduced to Europe.

We use many words which have come from Arabic. For instance adobe, so common in the southwest. The Arab word attub, meaning brick, was brought by the Moors to Spain, and was in turn brought by the Spaniards to Latin America, gradually changing in form until it became adobe, which still means a sun-dried brick but now also means a structure built from that material. Our word algebra comes from the Arabic al-jabr, and there are countless other examples, such as cotton, damask, gauze, muslin, magazine, azure, carmine, crimson, henna, alkali, arsenic, camphor, alfalfa, lilac, spinach, lemon, lime, orange, syrup, candy, coffee, and too many more to attempt to name them in this short column.

If this column has a moral, perhaps it is that neither the Russians, Americans, British, or anyone else invented everything.

Greenbelt Dam News

A meeting of the board of directors of the Greenbelt Authority will be held at Childress next Wednesday, March 19. At this time the seven directors will post bond of \$5,000.00 each and the authority will be then completely formed. Dr. S. H. Townsend of Childress will be the President, Sam Breedlove of Quanah will be Vice President and Clifford Johnson will be Secretary.

Attending this meeting will be Colonel Freeze of Freeze and Nichols, Consulting Engineers from Fort Worth, and Mr. Crow of McCall, Parkhurst and Crow, bond attorneys of Dallas. The two firms have been associated with the authority the last few years on a contingent basis.

Probably the first business will be the coring of the dam site and the lake area to assure that the water will be held when the dam is built. The engineers had already figured the silt and evaporation. No stones are being left unturned so that when the bonds are voted they can be sold and work on the dam started immediately. It may be sooner than we think.

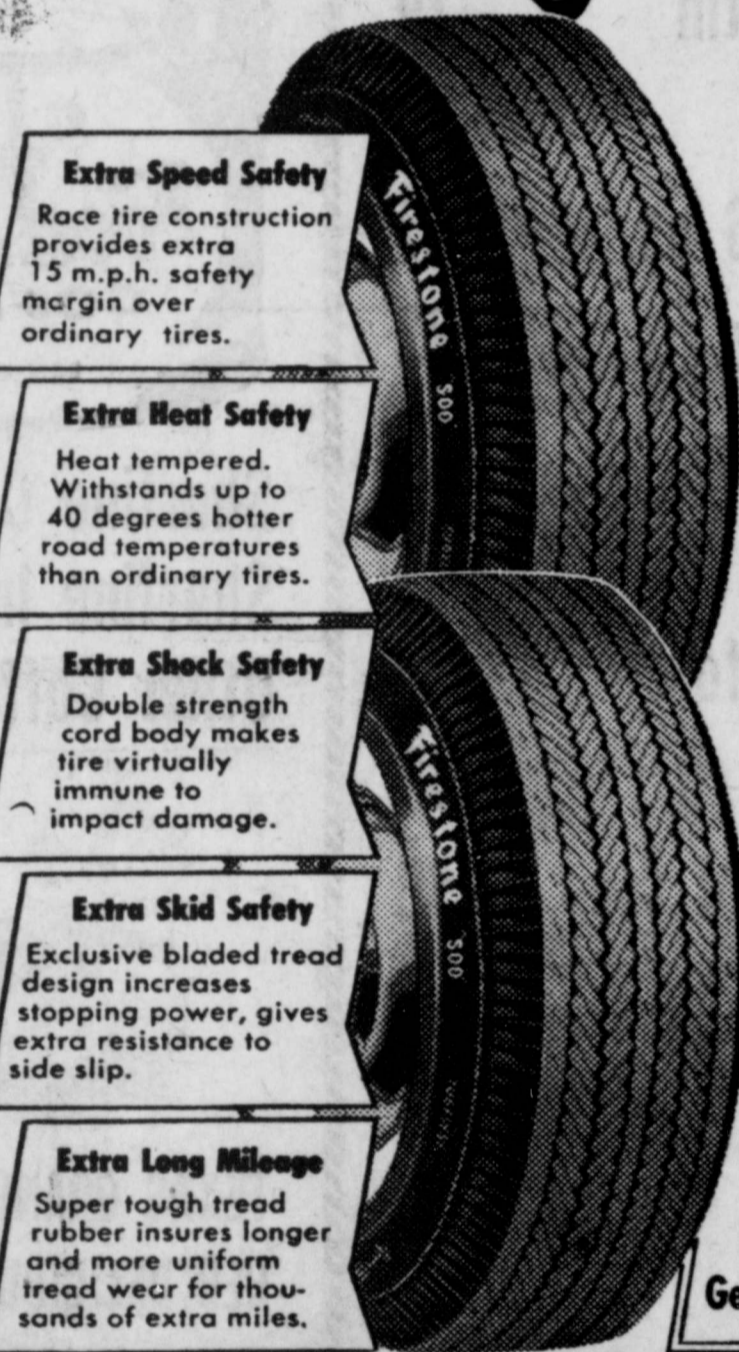

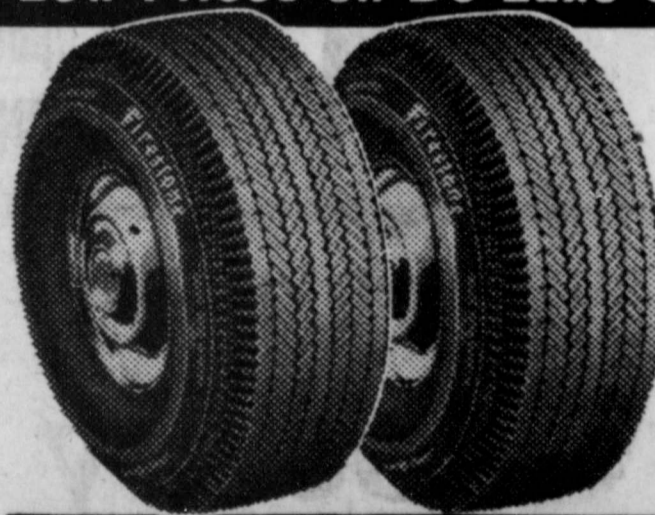
