Scattered Shots

Occasionally someone inquires about the difference in elevation between Hedley and Memphis. There is a noticeable difference, Hedley usually being several degrees cooler both winter and summer. The difference in elevation is 594 feet, Memphis being 2,067 feet above sea level and Hedley 2,661. Traveling southeast the slope down continues, with Childress being 1,877, Quanah 1,568, Vernon 1,205, Wichita Falls 946, and Fort Worth 670. Going north west, with one exception, the altitude increases. The exception is Lelia Lake, which is lower than Hedley at 2,589. Clarendon is 66 feet higher than Hedley at 2,727 feet, Claude is 3,397, Amarillo 3,676, Dalhart 3,985, and Texline is 4,694.

The highest point in Texas is Guadalupe Peak in Culberson County, 8,751 feet. This is higher than any point east of it in the United States. Second highest is Mt. Livermore in Jeff Davis County at 8,382 feet. The highest town of any size in Texas is Fort Davis, 5,050 feet. The highest railway point is Paisano, 5,078 feet, a switch station on the Southern Pacific and Santa Fe in Presidio County. The highest point on a Texas highway is a tap from State Highway 118 to McDonald Observatory on top of Mount Locke, 6,791 feet.

Many people driving along U. S. Highways 62 and 180 from Carlsbad to El Paso, think that El Capitan is the highest peak in Texas. This is an optical illusion, due to the road passing nearer El Capitan than to Guadalupe Peak, but El Capitan is 8,078 feet, almost 700 feet lower than Guadalupe Peak.

Have you been up in the air enough, or do you want to go higher? If you do, you will have to go to some state west of Texas. Come by on Friday and I will go with you. Don't forget to bring your money along, either. This high altitude air gives you a terrible appetite.

The purpose of the meeting is to discuss insect control in cotton and this will be handled by Mr. Freeman Fuller, Extension Entomologist from the Texas A&M College Extension Service. Mr. Fred Elliot, Cotton work specialist from the Extension Service at A&M College of Texas will discuss all phases of cotton production. He will also discuss spot oiling of Johnson grass in cotton. 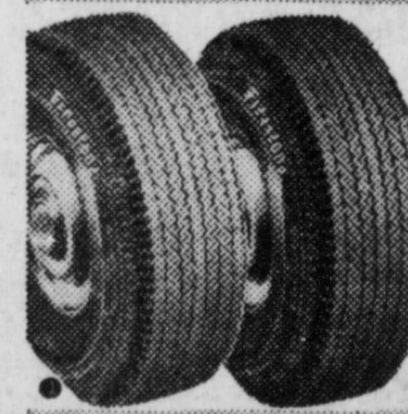

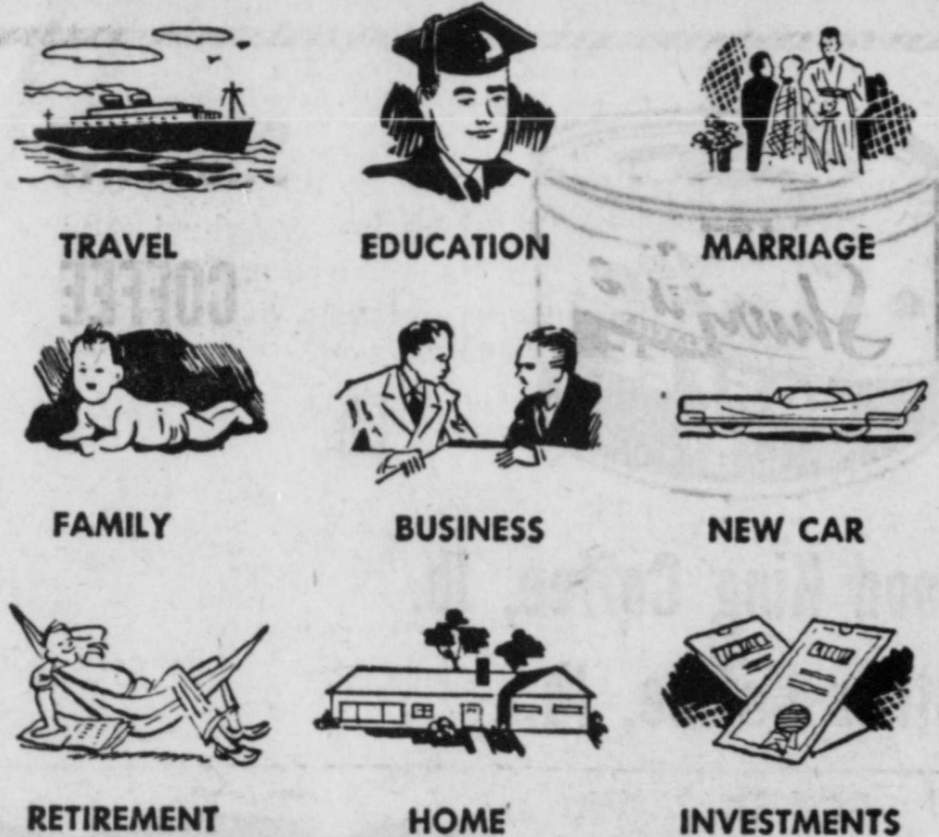
