
## Greenbelt Dam News |Mary Baker Chosen **Greenbelt** District

### The First Church

The first building to worship God in was built during the reign of King Solomon of Israel Before this they had worshipped in tents or tabernacles. The Temple built by Solomon was a magnifi cent structure Cedars from Leb anon were floated down the coast of the Great Sea to the nearest point The stones for the walls were hewn out, fitted together and then taken to the building site. Even the beams for the roof were carved and made ready to use before they were assembled at Jerusalem

Thus the building was erected without confusion and very little noise. The whole interior was lined with cedar and cypress and overlaid with pure gold. Bible scholars estimate the worth of the building in our money at 4 or 5 billion dollars


