News From Our County Agent

Donley County 4 H Club members sold three steers at the Odessa Fat Stock Show for a big price, says County Agent H. M. Breedlove. There were 200 steers in the show and Gene Floyd placed 5th and 17th in a middle weight class of 68 steers, and Richard Thornberry placed 8th.

Floyd sold one steer that weighed 907 lbs. for 52¢ a pound and the other that weighed 873 for 50¢ a lb. Thornberry sold his 892 lb. steer for 54¢ a lb. Seven steers were brought home to take to the Amarillo show on Jan. 23.

Greenbelt Dam News

All seven towns of the Greenbelt Water Authority were well represented at their monthly meeting in Childress last Tuesday night. Mayor C. H. Reid, Alderman Sam Sanders and C. L. Johnson, Secretary of the Authority, attended from here.

Marvin Nichols of Ft. Worth, Chairman of the Water Development Board, was the main speaker. He was followed by Joe Carter of Austin, Secretary of the Board and Marvin Shubert of Petersburg, West Texas' representative on the board. Senator Andy Rogers also spoke and the four answered questions in regard to the state's participation in the project and other matters.

Coring of the river where the lake is to be located will commence just as soon as it can be arranged. The Authority's engineers Freese and Nichols of Ft. Worth stated that the amount of land to be purchased, cost of the water and all other figures could be compiled in ninety days after the coring was completed. This will mean that we will be able to vote this summer. They also stated that they expected a lot of dirt moved before the two year period was up.

The First Church

The first building to worship God in was built during the reign of King Solomon of Israel. Before this they had worshipped in tents or tabernacles. The Temple built by Solomon was a magnificent structure. Cedars from Lebanon were floated down the coast of the Great Sea to the nearest point. The stones for the walls were hewn out, fitted together and then taken to the building site. Even the beams for the roof were carved and made ready to use before they were assembled at Jerusalem.

Thus the building was erected without confusion and very little noise. The whole interior was lined with cedar and cypress and overlaid with pure gold. Bible scholars estimate the worth of the building in our money at 4 or 5 billion dollars.

But Solomon made a very grave mistake, it seems, for he married

women from the idolatrous nations around him and allowed idols to be built for them to worship, so that standing next to the house of God were shrines and houses of idols made of wood or stone or metal. Instead of teaching these people about Jehovah God, he as-

sisted them in idol worship, a sin that brought shame and sorrow to his old age, and not only him but all the house of Israelites. Under the law of Moses which was in effect at that time, sins were not forgiven only rolled back a year at a time after the proper sacrifices

had been made. Today we are under the law of Christ and have an opportunity to have full pardon from all our sins. We are told in the New Testament how to avail ourselves of this opportunity. Whether we do or not is up to us.

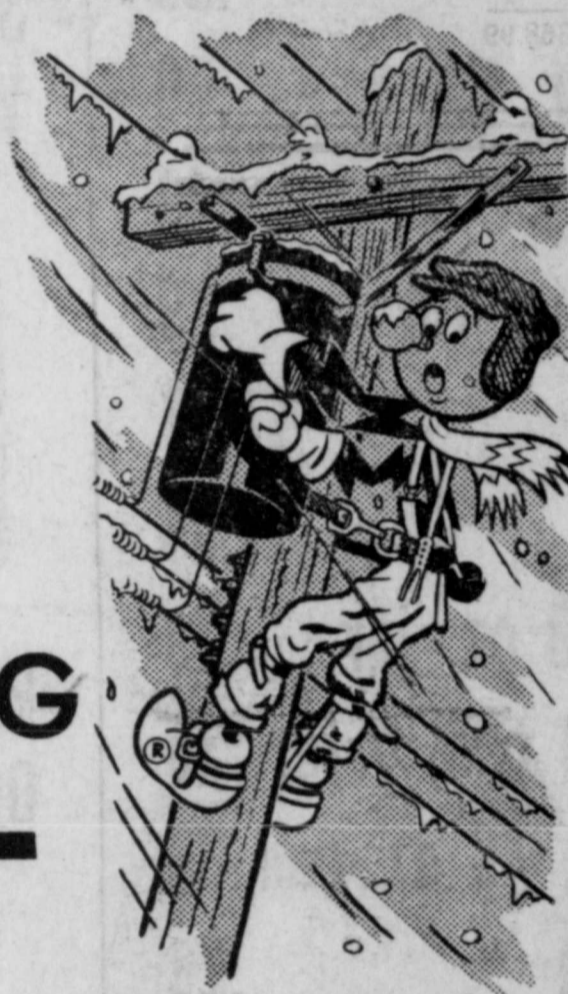

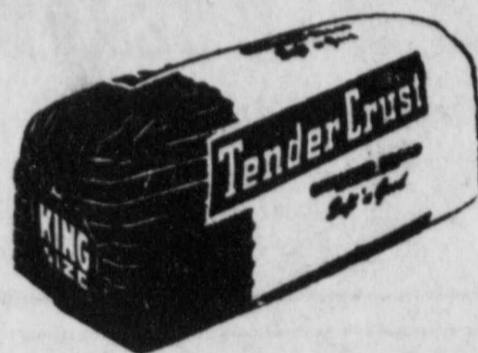

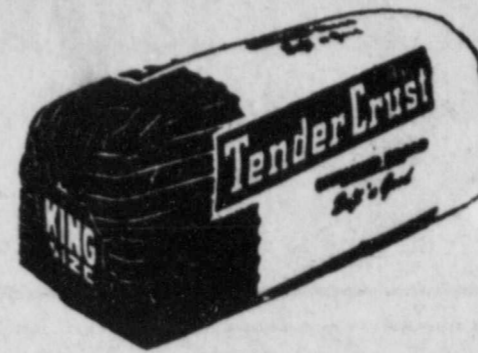
