Bank Increases Capital

The Security State Bank increased their Capital Stock from \$35,000.00 to \$50,000.00 the first part of this week. The increase was entirely by Stock Dividend, and no additional stock was sold.

The bank started with a capital stock of \$15,000.00, and has been raised twice, once in 1919 from \$15,000.00 to \$25,000.00 and in 1929 from \$25,000.00 to \$35,000.00.

Deposits are now running higher than they ever have in the history of the bank, and resources are well over a million dollars. This capital stock increase will give the bank a better opportunity to serve the growing needs of the community.

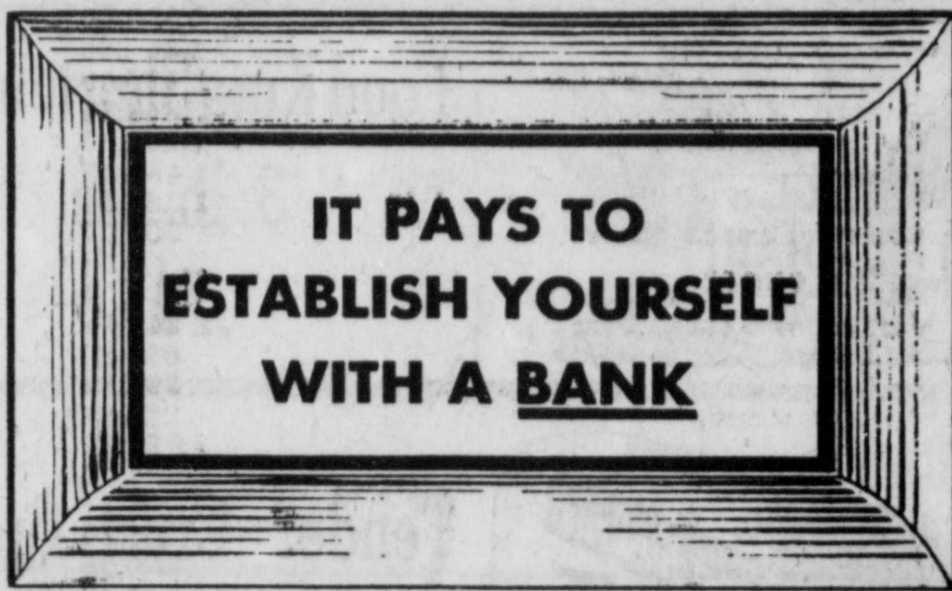
