ASC News

Our recent sandstorms have made us aware of the fact that our fields need listing or chiseling to prevent wind erosion.

Forty-two producers earned cost-share assistance for listing or chiseling in January and almost that many more have asked for the practice for this month.

Listing should be done on the sandier types of soil and the tighter land should be chiseled.

The county committee will approve this practice for the month of March only.

March 31st is the maturity date on all 1958 Wheat and Grain Sorghum Loans. Any producer who wishes to redeem his note and sell his grain on the open market or use it for feed or seed should remember that he has only until March 31st to do so.

Practices already completed under the 1959 A C P include deep plowing, terracing, the application of cotton burs and the listing and chiseling. Applications are on hand and approvals have been issued for deferred grazing of grass land, constructing earthen dams, drilling water wells, seeding grasses, constructing terraces and diversion terraces.

Those who have deep plowed some cropland are J. T. Hill, Raymond Waldrop, A. H. Bourland, F. A. Floyd, A. M. Moss, Edd Mooring, V. T. McPherson and Clyde Slavin.

O. Buford Holland spread cotton burs on some of his cropland to prevent erosion.

T. C. D'Spain is constructing two earthen dams, one at his own expense and one with cost-share assistance. Lawrence Hagy is constructing several dams at his own expense.

March 16 is the last date on which producers may make their choice of cotton allotment for 1959. Any producer who does not sign Form MQ 24A (Allotment Notice) by that date will automatically be a "Choice A" producer.

"Choice A" cotton will not be eligible for the Loan program but will be eligible for sale either to C C C or the open market.

"Choice B" cotton will be eligible for the loan or to be sold on the open market.

Twenty-six of the thirty four pigs placed high enough to make the sale. Mr. Messer was able to sell a few of the non-placing pigs at 22¢ a pound to some individuals in Houston who wanted pigs to butcher.

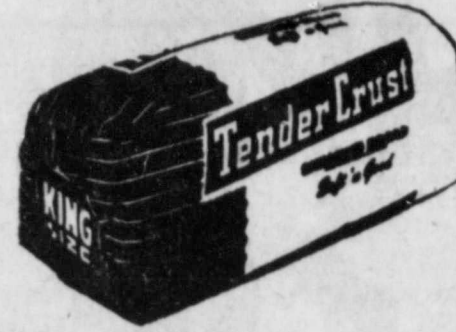
