Safe 'T' Drivers Club

Governor Price Daniel has given his official approval to efforts of a group of Dallas high school students to promote and encourage safe driving among Texas teenagers.

Two top officials of the teen-age group, known as the Texas Teen-age Safe "T" Drivers' Club, visited the Governor to induct him as Honorary Member No. 1 of the organization. They were 15-year-old Ray Hunt, President of the new club, and Miss Molly Fulton, Secretary. Miss Fulton pinned the Governor's membership button on his coat lapel.

The Texas Teen-age Safe "T" Drivers' Club collects no dues, and the only money to be spent by a new member is \$1.50 for a gold lapel button if he wishes. The whole objective is to enlist Texas teen-agers voluntarily in behalf of safe driving. Most Texas teen-agers can meet qualifications for membership in this club: possession of a valid driver's license, acceptance of the safe driving pledge on the membership card, and enrollment in a driver training course if the applicant's school offers such a course.

The official pledge to be taken by all members of the club reads as follows: "I pledge to drive safely so as not to endanger my own life and the lives and property of others. I will endeavor to influence my friends' driving actions by word and example."
