Scattered Shots

In the long and honorable history of the United States Army, there is one period which stands out as some of the hardest fighting that the Army has ever done. This is the period of the Indian wars, from the close of the Civil War in 1865 to about 1890. Among their foes were those peerless horsemen, the Comanches, whose tactics, it has been said, "have never been equalled by Bedouin, Cossack, Numidian or Tartar at his best," the Sioux, great fighters of the northern tribes, the Kiowas, who were said to have killed more white men than any other tribe in proportion to their numbers, the Cheyennes whose ability was recognized when the white man called them "the Fighting Cheyennes," the Modocs, the Nez Perces, and many others.

The Army did not by any means win all these conflicts, either. The best known loss is, of course, Custer's last stand on the Little Big Horn, but there were many other occasions when the Army, which was almost always outnumbered, came off second best. The Modoc War in the lava beds in California has been called the costliest war in which the United States ever engaged, considering the number of opponents. This war lasted from Nov. 29, 1872, to June 1, 1873, and ended with a total of 82 white men killed and about 20 Indians. The Army also lost many men in the fight against Chief Joseph of the Nez Perces, perhaps the greatest Indian general of them all. These wars with the Indians were all "little wars" yet from 1869 to 1875 the Army took part in some 200 pitched battles. From 1870 to 1887 one regiment alone in Arizona took part in 97 actions against the Apaches.

It might be mentioned that not all Indian tribes fought against the white man. Enrolled as scouts were often Pawnees, Crows, Shoshones, Arickarees, Pimas, some of the Apaches, and others. In-

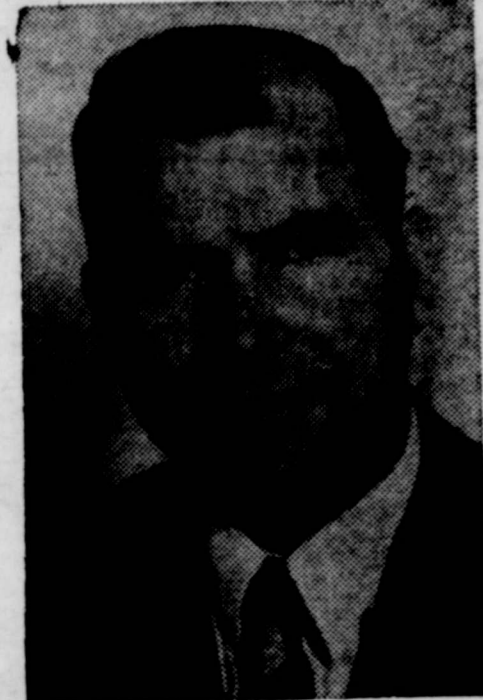
The wedding will be Saturday August 22, in the First Presbyterian Church, Plainview. Rev. Frank Travis will perform the

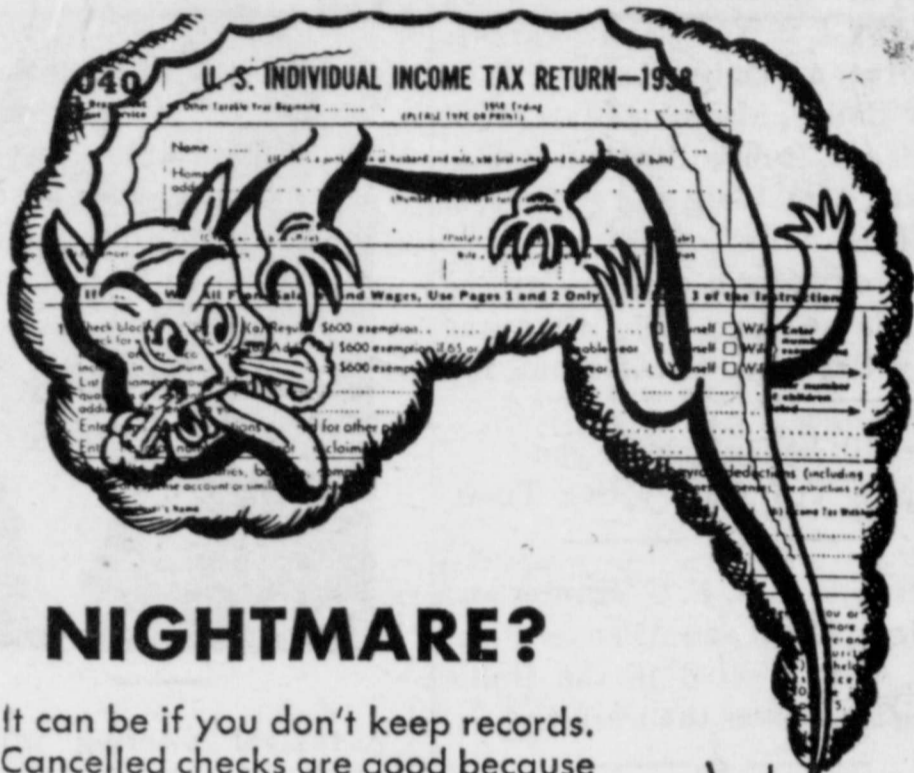

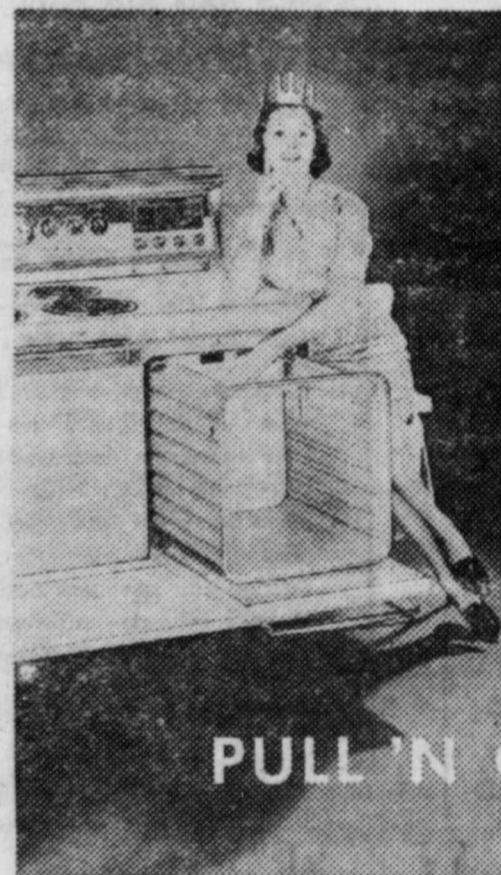

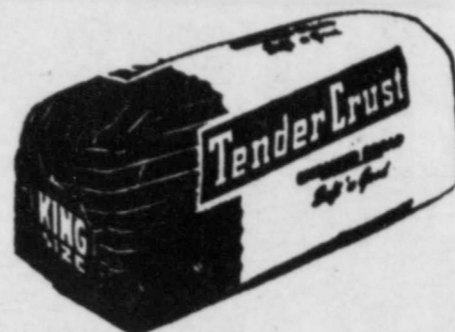
