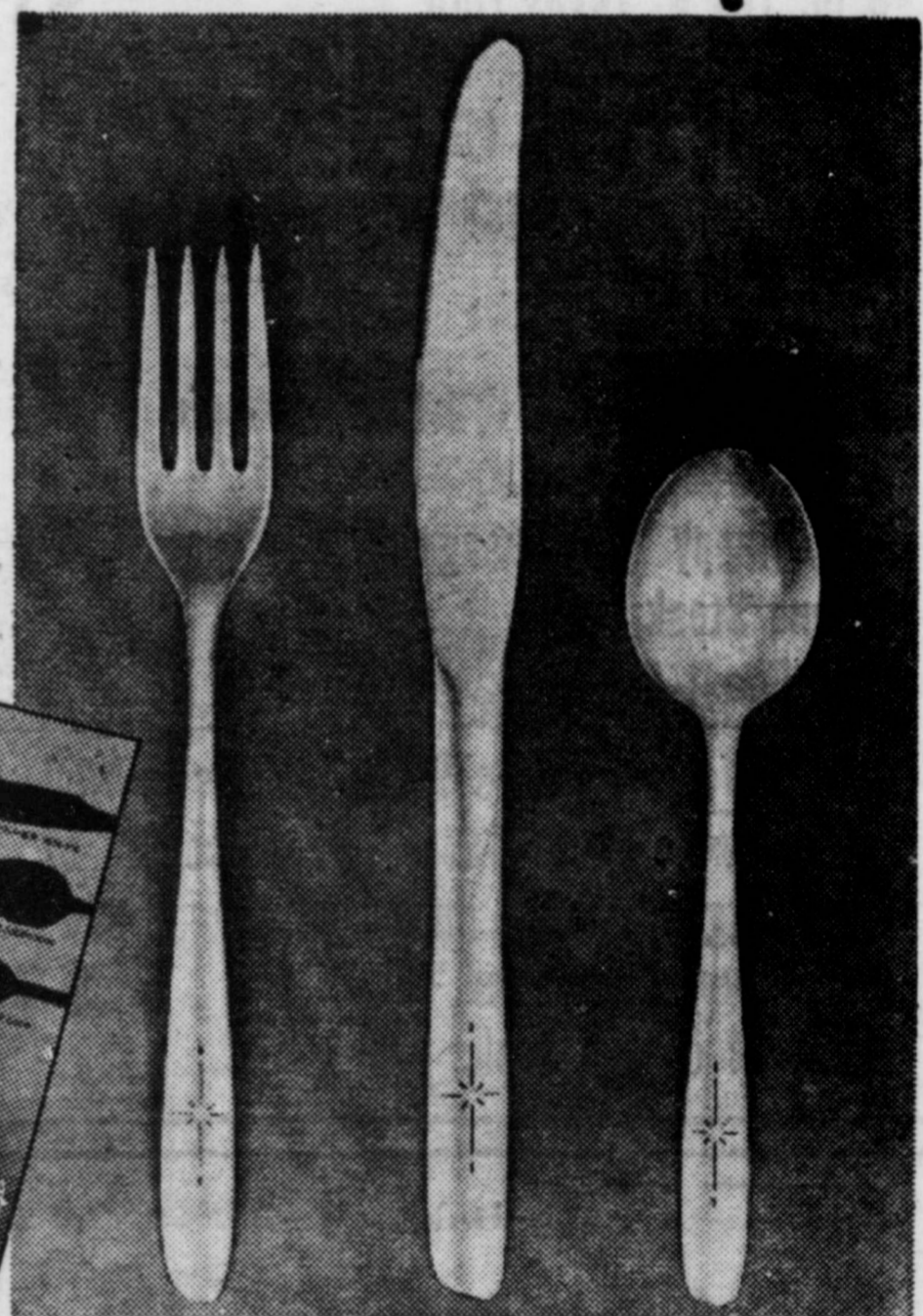

Driving Tests

Safe driving must be made a personal habit of every motorist if the slaughter on America's highways is to be curbed, Vernon Gayle Safety Director of the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department declared Tuesday as he spoke prior to conducting driving tests at Hedley High School

"Excessive speed is the greatest single cause of automobile accidents," Mr. Gayle said. In the demonstration which followed, he pointed out the conditions under which even 20, 30 or 40 miles per hour can be excessive.

Students and teachers took part in the tests which were conducted in a special equipped car.

The safety demonstration was brought to Hedley under the sponsorship of the Donley County Farm Bureau.

Diana of the Ephesians

The temple of the goddess Diana in Ephesus was one of the wonders of the ancient world. Around the temple stood a hundred and twenty great columns of purest white marble, each a gift of a king. In the temple was the image of the goddess, who was thought to have fallen to earth from the sky. Great numbers of people from many lands came to worship this idol, in a perpetual festival of vice. Craftsmen in gold and silver made fortunes selling small images of the goddess to people to carry to their homes. The preaching and teaching of the apostle Paul in Ephesus caused an uproar and near riot as always happens when error is exposed by the truth of God's word. For Paul taught of a living God and gave no credence to this idol made of stone. Some belief in miniature idols of one kind or another and so called good luck charms, has been carried down through the ages, and exists even today. 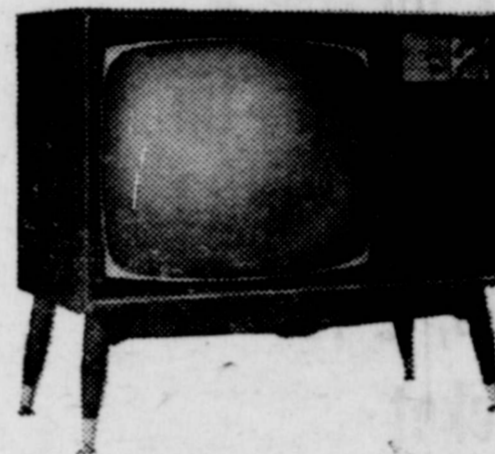

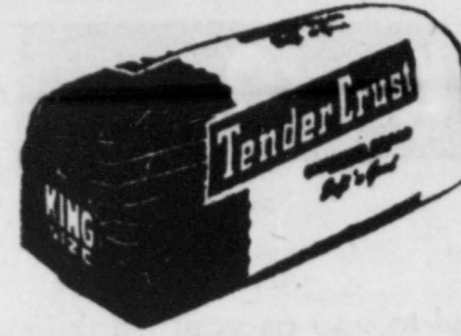
