## Cotton Festival

It is both pleasant and unpleasant to write about the Ninth Annual Hedley Cotton Festival held here last week end. Friday was a very gratifying day, one of the best Fridays the Festival has ever had, which of course makes it even more discouraging to think of what a day Saturday would have been had the weather permitted.

We were very happy to have both State Senator Andy Rogers and Congressman Walter Rogers speak to the crowd on Friday morning. The Old Settlers had a really big day, 184 signing the register as having lived in Donley County 30 years or longer. Mrs. Mattie Beach received a gift as the oldest lady present, Tom Bain as the oldest man present, Tom Owens of San Bernardino, Calif., for having come the farthest distance, and Mrs. W. I. Rains for being co-founder of the organization. Honest Jess and his Cavaliers and the Quail High School chorus put on a fine program as well as local singers.

Also taking part in the Friday morning program were the local schools. In the afternoon the kids pet and novelty parade was most attractive, with many clever and imaginative ideas carried out. Cotton John and his crew were also present, and assisted at the old fiddlers contest Friday night. Winning prizes among the old fiddlers were Richard Stotts first, Mack Graham second and Sam Morgan third.

Saturday was naturally a most disappointing day. Most of the bands which were scheduled to come did not do so, for which they cannot be blamed, and no parade was held. Prospects were very good for the biggest parade the Festival has ever had, until the weather interfered. Festival officials and everyone concerned appreciate very much that the Amarillo Air Force band, the Wellington high school band, the R O T C. drill team from West Texas State, Canyon, the Khiva Temple Drum and Bugle Corps from Amarillo, the Maverick Club from Amarillo, Lions District Governor Ralph Thomas, and Willis Hawkins, 18th District Commander of the American Legion, came on in spite of the weather. Some of these were unable to perform under the circumstances and what program there was took place in

the school auditorium.

The highlight of the Festival Saturday was, as usual, the queen coronation Saturday night. Mary Finchum was elected Festival Queen, and Judy Saunders and Dolores Messer were Royal Princesses. A very nice total on the ticket sales showed that these girls had done some really fine work in ticket selling. Lions District Governor Ralph Thomas crowned the queen, and a most enjoyable program, directed by Myrtle Reeves, was put on by Vee Latimer, Melissa Cooke, Kitty Cooke, the Cottonettes, and Bonnie Gaye Black and her Twirling Gayettes.

Many attractive windows had been arranged for the Festival. Trusting that we did not overlook anyone, we noticed them in Moffitt Hardware, City Grocery and Market, Moreman Grocery and Locker, Pickett Grocery, Wilson Drug, Hedley Variety, Johnson Dry Goods and Cherry Drug. In addition the FFA boys sponsored a nice agricultural display in the Hedley Feed and Seed, and there was a fine needlework display in the bank directors room and a flower show in the postoffice sponsored by the Garden Club.

## Fire Prevention

Mention of Fire Prevention Week was crowded out of last week's paper by the Cotton Festival, but we think that a few remarks could still be made in this connection. Fire prevention is, of course, a year round job. One week in the year merely calls attention to this job, but efforts in that line should never be relaxed.

Your fire department has done all that it can do to get your fire insurance rate lowered. A recent letter from the State Board of Insurance points out that further reductions in fire insurance costs in this community will depend, not on the fire department, but on all the people. In other words, the key rate definitely lower than before, but the actual cost of your insurance will depend upon the amount of credit or charge earned by the town. The lower our fire losses, the lower your insurance cost will be.

So keep in mind that every fire in Hedley costs not only the family or business involved, but also every family and business in Hedley, and do your best to prevent any fire, and to report a fire which does occur as quickly as possible to the fire department.

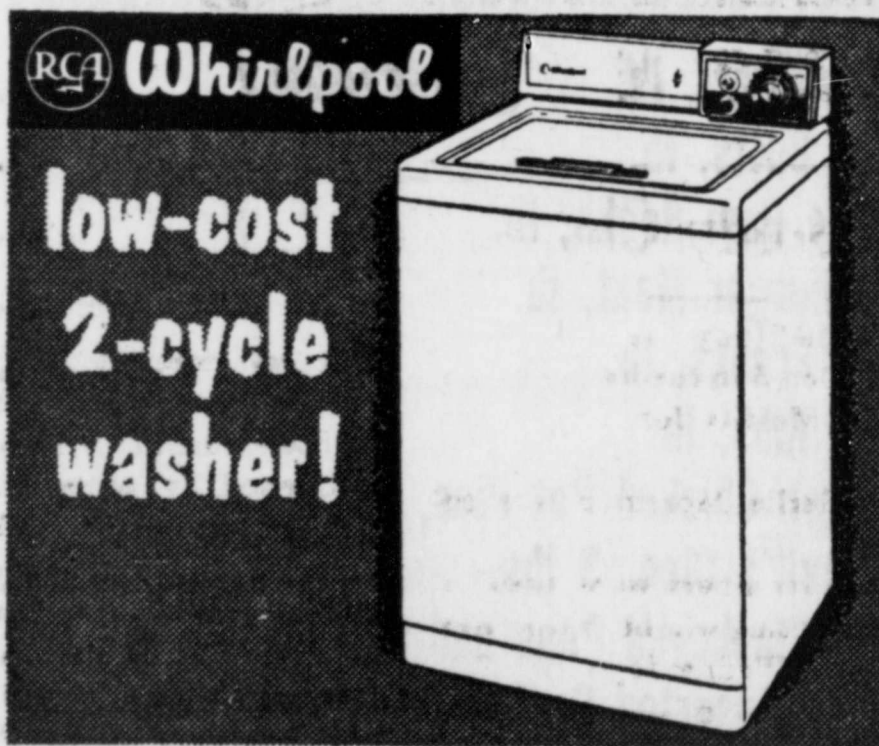

"The thing that bothers most of us in America," he says, "is not so much the high cost of living as it is the cost of high living."

Farmers are providing America's food at costs actually lower than 30 years ago. In 1958, one hour's factory work would buy two pounds of steak or 16.8 pints of milk. In 1929, an hour's work would buy 1.2 pounds of steak or 7.8 pints of milk.

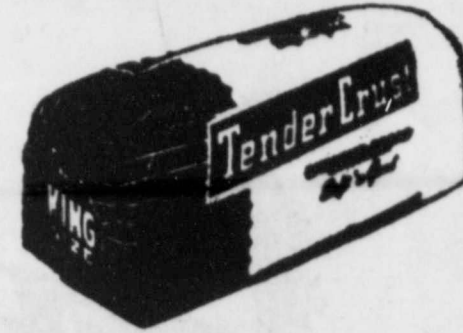
