Greenbelt Dam News

An inspection of the old and new proposed sites for the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority has been made by the head engineer and the dam planning engineer of the Department of Interior both from Denver, and the regional geologist from Austin, according to information received from John Thompson, Assistant Regional Director from Amarillo.

The information was received by Dr. S. H. Townsend, president of the Authority.

The old site has been eliminated by the core drilling.

The new site, which is about two miles down river from the old site will take approximately 2,000,000 less yards of dirt to fill, Thompson told Townsend.

A reconnaissance appraisal of the costs of the dam at the new site will be made and, assuming the foundation is good, this information will be made available the latter part of January, 1961.

If these studies are favorable, then core drilling will be done at this site so that we can proceed in an orderly manner to the completion of the project.

Contrary to what many think all of the above and much more must be done at the site of the dam to make the project a permanent installation, according to Townsend.

The Texas Water Development Board, which has \$200,000,000 to loan water projects such as the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, is still vitally interested in the Greenbelt Water Project, according to a wire received Saturday from Marvin Shurbet of Petersburg, a member of the Board.

The wire was received by Dr. S. H. Townsend, president of Authority.

The wire follows: "As the West Texas member of the Texas Water Development Board, I again assure you and assure you and other citizens in the area of the Board's interest in the Greenbelt Project. The Greenbelt Authority has priority for loan when your plans are completed. Project is vital to area's economy and essential to protect Texas' interest in waters of the Salt Fork of Red River. "You can expect our full cooperation in this important undertaking."

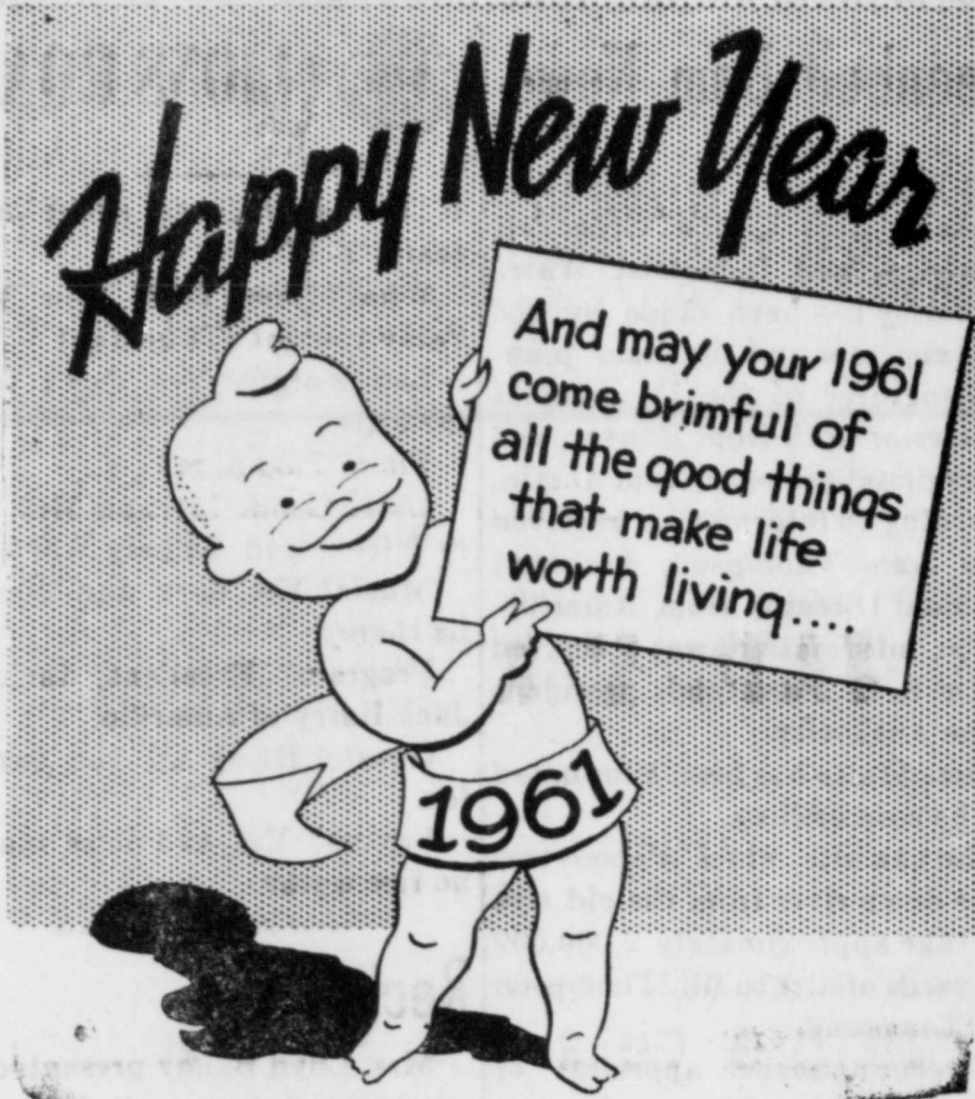

Order for Directors Election

The State of Texas
County of Donley
On this the 24th day of October, 1960 the Board of Directors of Donley County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 convened in call session with the following members present, to wit:

Rayburn Smith, president, R. W. Hester, secretary, Virginia Browder, Mike McCully and Jack Harris.
and the following absent, constituting a quorum, and among other proceedings had by said Board of Directors was the following:

Whereas, on the next ensuing second January, being the 10th day of January, 1961, there will be elected 2 directors for this District.

Whereas this Board by order dated the 9th day of December, 1954, established the procedure for candidates who desire to file for said election;

Therefore, Be It Ordered By The Board Of Directors Of Donley County Water Control And Improvement District No 1:

That an election be held in said district on the Second Tuesday in January, the same being the 10th day of January, 1961, for the purpose of electing two directors to the Board of Directors of said District.

That said election shall be held at the following place, in said District, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election.

1. For Election Precinct No. 3 at Virginia Browder's Residence in Donley County, Texas, within said District with Virginia Browder as Presiding Judge, and J. A. Eppers, Clerk.

The following named persons have duly filed as candidates for election in accordance with the above mentioned order for election procedure in Directors Election passed by this Board, and their names shall be placed on the ballot for said election in alphabetical order as follows:

Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order once each week for three consecutive weeks in a news paper of general circulation published in the County in which this District is located, or if none is published in said county the nearest thereto, the first publication shall be at least 21 days prior to the date of election, and not more than 35 days prior thereto. Im-

mediately after said election has been held, the officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereof in triplicate, one being retained by the Presiding Judge, one delivered to the President of this Board, and one delivered to the Secretary The ballot box and other election records and supplies shall be delivered to the Secretary at the office of the District and be preserved as provided by law in said office except the stub box shall be delivered to the District Clerk for this County.

The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Board voted Aye:
