## Proposed Bill Would Aid Water Projects

Legislation to broaden the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and enlarging its program of State Assistance to finance local water districts and authorities has been introduced in the Texas Senate.

Senate Bill 4, co authored by Senators Andy Rogers of Childress and George Parkhouse of Dallas would allow the Texas Water Development Board to lend up to \$15,000,000 on any one project approved by the Board. Such loans could finance an entire project if it did not cost more than \$15,000,000 or the same amount of larger projects.

At present the Board can loan a maximum of only \$5,000,000 on any one project or  $\frac{1}{3}$  of the total project, whichever is the smaller.

Indications are that this legislation will become law as Governor Price Daniel, the Statewide Water Committee, Texas Water Development Board, the State Board of Water Engineers and many legislators have already recommended that such legislation be passed.

If S B 4 becomes law, the water projects now under consideration for the southeast corner of the Panhandle could be financed entirely from the Water Development Board Funds. Such projects would include the dams and water projects now proposed by the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Authority composed of Quanah Paducah, Wellington, Childress, Memphis, Hedley, Clarendon and the Collingsworth County Water District.

Release of Cotton Acreage and Request for Additional Acreages

If you do not intend to plant your cotton allotment it will be to your advantage to release it unless this will be your third successive release in which case your allotment will be lost for 1962. The last day to release your cotton allotment is April 14th. If you desire additional acreage from released allotments, if any, you must file your request by April 14th. Remember, that if you do not plant at least 75% of your allotment, or release, if eligible, your base will be reduced for 1962. For further information please contact

### Work Progressing On Dial System

Hedley came another step closer to dial telephone service last week, as the installation of central office equipment was begun in General Telephone's new local exchange building.

A two man crew from Leich Electrical Company began installation of the modern all relay dial equipment which will be put in use in May.

General Telephone district manager, Roy L. Brewer of Memphis, also reported that outside plant crews are busily preparing cable and open wire facilities for the "cutover."

Hedley is also scheduled for a new numbering plan which will be placed in effect at the time of the dial conversion. At that time all local telephone numbers will consist of seven digits

Brewer stated that this system is being initiated by all companies to conform with the Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) plan already in use in some cities

"The direct distance dialing plan allows telephone users to place long distance calls without assistance from an operator," said Brewer

Brewer indicated that the DDD system would really "come into its own" during this decade, and direct long distance dialing for the majority of our nation in in the "not too distant future"

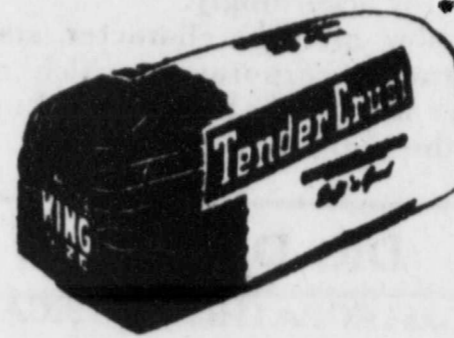
