Rural Phone Lines To Be Underground

Telephone service will come to rural residents in the Hedley area in a unique manner, not by conventional pole line method but underground.

This rural telephone project is being worked in conjunction with Hedley's coming conversion to dial telephone operation.

General Telephone Company district manager, R. L. Brewer of Memphis, indicated that the dial conversion proceedings are "on schedule." The central office equipment, which will provide the mechanical means for Hedley's new dial system is being installed, and necessary outside plant repair work and replacement in and around the city is underway.

The new method of providing rural service is appropriately termed "plowing in" cable. The process involved does just what the term implies. Contractors began "plowing in" the rural cable some three weeks ago. Brewer said the cable laying unit consists of a huge plow which not only provides the ditch, but serves as a path for the cable which is fed down into the ditch from a reel mounted atop the plow. The ditch, which is plowed at varied depths along rural roads, is back

Road Designated

Austin, Texas, Feb. 24—The Texas Highway Commission today designated a Ranch to Market Road in Gray and Donley Counties. It will extend from a point at or near the intersection of State Highway 273 and U. S. Highway 66 at McLean, south to a lateral county road in Donley County approximately five miles south of the Gray-Donley County Line. Total distance of the road will be 8.5 miles.

The designation of the road will enable preliminary work to proceed on the location and procuring of right of way by the counties involved. The Commission expressed the intention to build the road by increments, financing it in a future program of work.

The State Highway Engineer was directed to coordinate the project with the possible future construction of a lake on the Salt Fork of the Red River, reporting to the Highway Commission at such time as definite information may be available to permit the Commission to consider the further extension of this designation to properly serve the Hedley area in Donley County.

filled soon after the cable is laid.

As the rig reaches a spot adjacent to a subscriber's residence, a loop is formed in the cable, and a pedestal mounted alongside the road. The pedestal provides a "meeting place" for connecting wires ditched from subscribers' dwellings to the cable loop.

Brewer indicated that this method of providing rural phone service is becoming increasingly popular within the telephone industry, due primarily to a noticeable decrease in the amount of circuit trouble as compared to the conventional aerial cable or open wire construction.

Austin—Several of the more important issues of this session are coming more clearly into focus as committee meetings progress and the tax picture takes a change.

Governor Daniel dropped his proposal for a payroll tax this week, believing there was too much opposition sounded out before the measure ever was formally introduced.

Among the two other major proposals, the sales tax has apparently drawn more support than proponents of the state income tax could muster. However, it is still very early so far as taxes are concerned and most members feel they must study the structure and situation much further to see if there is any other possible solution before these last resort taxes.

THE REA IN HB 2

This bill has caused considerable

interest, and appears to cause controversy in determining how far it will affect cities.

Basically it provides for REA co ops to retain their service in areas annexed by expanding cities. I would oppose it if it actually allowed any cooperative to move into a city where a central station service is available. I believe the final draft of the bill will not allow this.

Just as I have opposed the federal government usurping rights of the states, I believe that local control of these annexed areas in the cities might be the best solution.

I only wish that our towns were growing enough that this would be a problem in our district. Without annexation of new areas there really is no great conflict between the REA and the private power companies.

New Car Tags On Sale City Election

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer reminds Texas motorists that the renewal period for motor vehicle license plates takes in the months of February and March. The 1961 plates have black letters and numbers on a white background.

Greer stressed the importance of registering all vehicles in the county of residence, since the penalty for operating a vehicle without home-county plates is the same as for no plates at all. Also, a portion of all fees remains in the home county to benefit the local community.

Motorists are also reminded that they must take their certificate of title and their 1960 licence receipt when they go to obtain 1961 plates

Please take notice that a City Election will be held at the City Hall in Hedley on the first Tuesday in April, 1961 the same being the 4th day of April, for the purpose of electing three aldermen. The two candidates receiving the first and second highest number of votes will be elected for two years, while the man receiving the third largest number of votes will be elected for one year.

Any citizen who is a qualified voter of the City of Hedley who wishes to enter his candidacy for this office must file his application with the City Secretary on or before the 4th day of March.

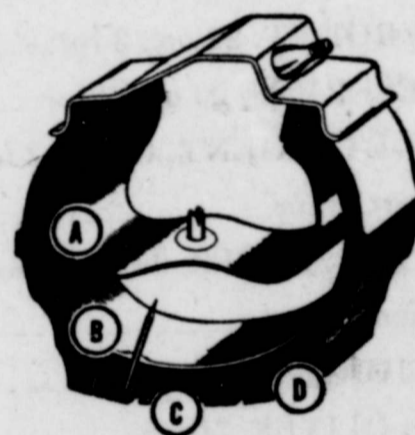
