Funeral services for Mrs. T. R. Moreman, who passed away Wednesday of last week in the home of her daughter, Mrs. O. B. Stanley of Abilene, were held Thursday morning at St. Paul Methodist Church in Abilene. Dr. John Donaho, pastor, officiated, assisted by Dr. C. A. Long, assistant pastor. Burial was in the Clarendon cemetery Thursday afternoon.

Mrs. Moreman was born HESSIE ALICE MILLER Jan. 28 1872 in Nashville, Tenn. She was the last surviving of 11 children of the late Rev. and Mrs. Thomas Miller.

She moved to Texas with her family in 1880 where her father served as pastor of churches in Sherman and surrounding towns. She attended school in Sherman and graduated from Kidd-Key College. She was teaching art in Kidd-Key when she married Thomas R. Moreman Oct. 17, 1893.

They moved to Bonham and lived there until 1896 when they moved to Indian Territory and filed on land in Greer County. Seven years later they returned to Texas, purchased land in Donley County and established Moreman Hardware and Furniture Co. in Hedley.

In 1944 after Mr. Moreman's death, Mrs. Moreman moved to Abilene and established her home on Hickory St. She spent the last few years with her daughters, Mrs. C. B. Bell of Houston and Mrs. Stanley.

A member of St. Paul Methodist Church in Abilene, Mrs. Moreman was class mother of the Builders Class. She was a past Worthy Matron of the Order of the Eastern Star, keeping her membership in Hedley.

Besides her husband, one son, Ralph, preceded her in death. She is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Cleo E. Shults of Oklahoma City, Mrs. Bell of Houston and Mrs. Stanley of Abilene; one son, Ray A. Moreman of Hedley; six grandchildren, Capt. O. B. Stanley Jr. of Washington, D. Kite Flyers Warned

Local children were warned today against flying kites near electric wires by C. A. Pitts, local manager for West Texas Utilities Company.

He suggested an open field away from electric wires and busy streets, as the ideal place for kite-flying. "It's dangerous to fly kites in the streets or anywhere near poles and wires, partly because of traffic hazards and partly because kites may come in contact with electric lines," the WTU manager said. Serious trouble may result if the kite becomes entangled in electric wires.

"If a kite gets caught in electric wires, a child may receive an electrical shock, or at best may lose his kite," Pitts warned. He emphasized, however, that kite flying can be completely safe if a few simple rules are followed.

The WTU manager made his pleas for safety as warm temperatures and steady breezes signaled the beginning of the spring kite-flying season.

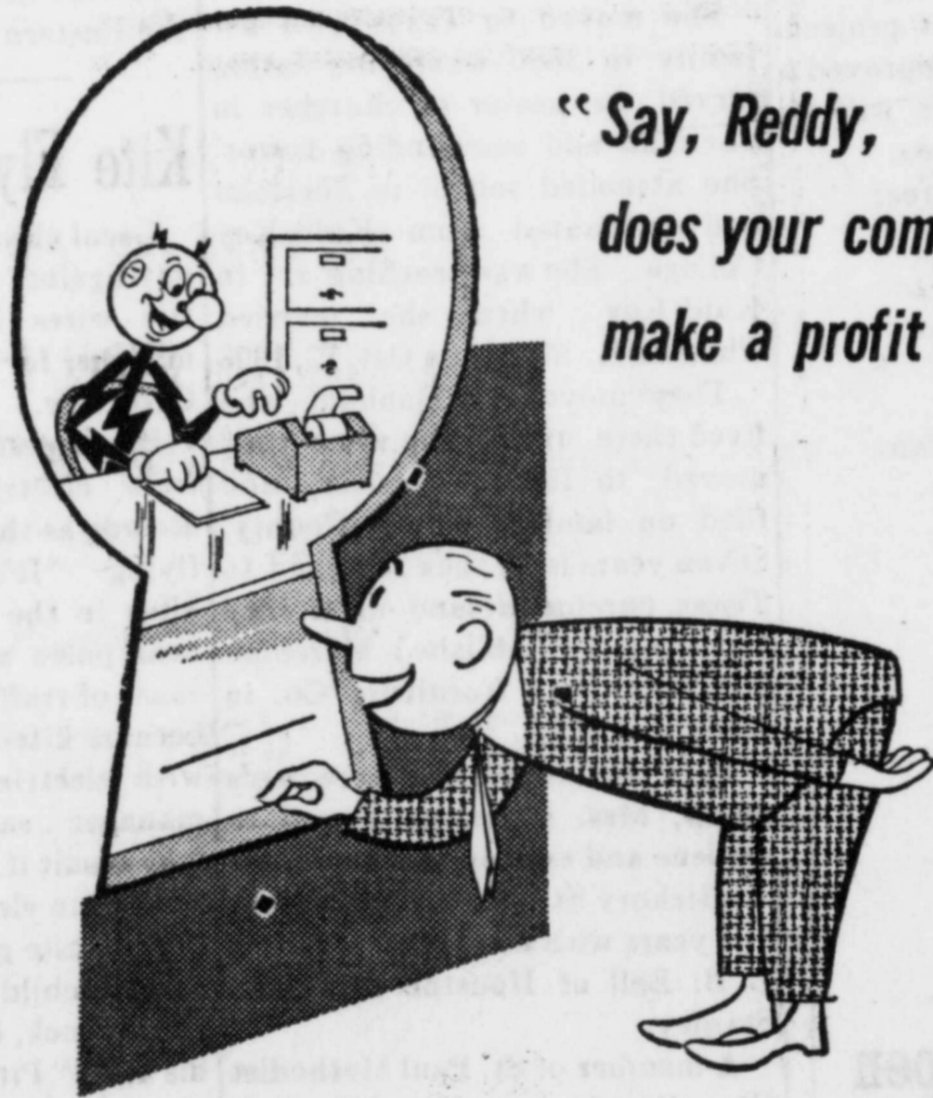

Greenbelt Dam News FHA Area Meeting

The biggest boost ever given the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority was the signature of Gov Price Daniel last week when he signed the bill allowing the Texas Water Development Board to loan up to \$15,000,000 on water projects.

That signature made into law a recently passed bill by the State Senate and House of Representatives giving the Texas Water Development Board the authority to finance municipal water projects up to \$15,000,000.

"It assures the best financing for the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority when it is voted by the people," said Dr S. H. Townsend, president of the Authority.

When the Water Development Board was created by Constitutional Amendment two years ago, it was limited in participating in loans above \$5,000,000 or one third of the cost of a project, whichever was less.

"That meant that the Greenbelt which has been estimated at a cost of around \$9,000,000 could have borrowed \$3,000,000 with the help of the state and would have had to go into the open market for the remainder," Dr Townsend said.

"It could have meant several thousands of dollars in higher interests," he added.

Under the new law, the state can participate in the entire project, which will mean lower interest.

Several officers of the Greenbelt have made trips to Austin, the last on Feb 14, to testify before a subcommittee of the Senate on the bill State Senator Andy Rogers of Childress was one of the co sponsors of the bill.

At the present time there are amendments before the legislature which will strengthen the Authority as soon as they are passed.

"Since the Greenbelt Authority's status has been among the top projects of the Water Development Board, its success is almost assured if member towns vote to build the dam, filter plant, and pipelines to the member cities," reported Dr. Townsend.

Members of the Greenbelt Authority are Paducah, Childress, Hedley, Clarendon, Memphis, and Quannah.

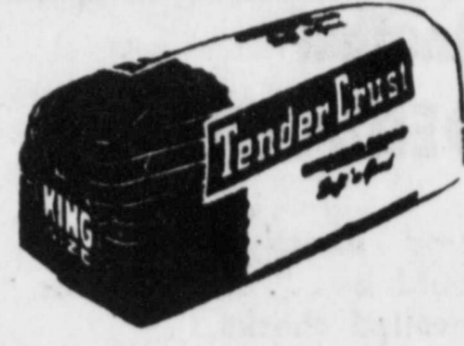
