School Election

An election will be held at the City Hall in Hedley on Saturday, April 1, to elect school trustees for the Hedley school district. The ballot will include W. B. Wiggins and Harold White for re-election, and Earl Wheatly, who will be a candidate for the place being vacated by Luther Owen Thompson, who is retiring from the board. There are three to elect as Hedley trustees.

Also on the ballot will be candidates for the county school board A. G. Alexander, the incumbent, will be a candidate for re-election as county board member from Precinct 3, and Ellis Chenault of Lelia Lake is also seeking this office. On the ticket for county trustee at large will be R. M. Saunders of Hedley and according to unofficial sources, John Gillham of Clarendon.

Greenbelt Dam News

John Thompson, Asst. Regional Director of the Amarillo Office of the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation, called Clifford Johnson, Mayor, last week.

Mr Thompson stated that there would be much activity around the dam site for the next two or three weeks. First, there will be a crew to stake out the places to be core drilled, then the core drilling contractors will inspect the site, submit their bids, then the actual core drilling.

It is called the Little Gyp site and is located in Collingsworth County about 1½ miles east of the Donley County line. Deadline Nears For New Car Tags

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer reminds Texas motorists that the renewal period for motor vehicle license plates takes in the months of February and March. The 1961 plates have black letters and numbers on a white background.

Greer stressed the importance of registering all vehicles in the county of residence, since the penalty for operating a vehicle without home-county plates is the same as for no plates at all. Also, a portion of all fees remains in the home county to benefit the local community.

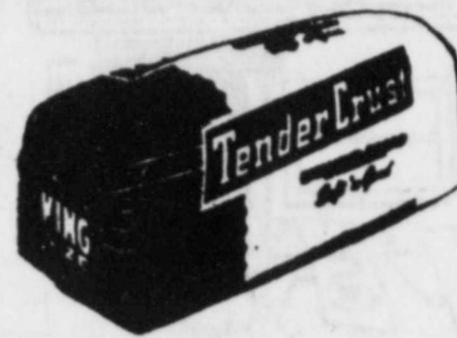
