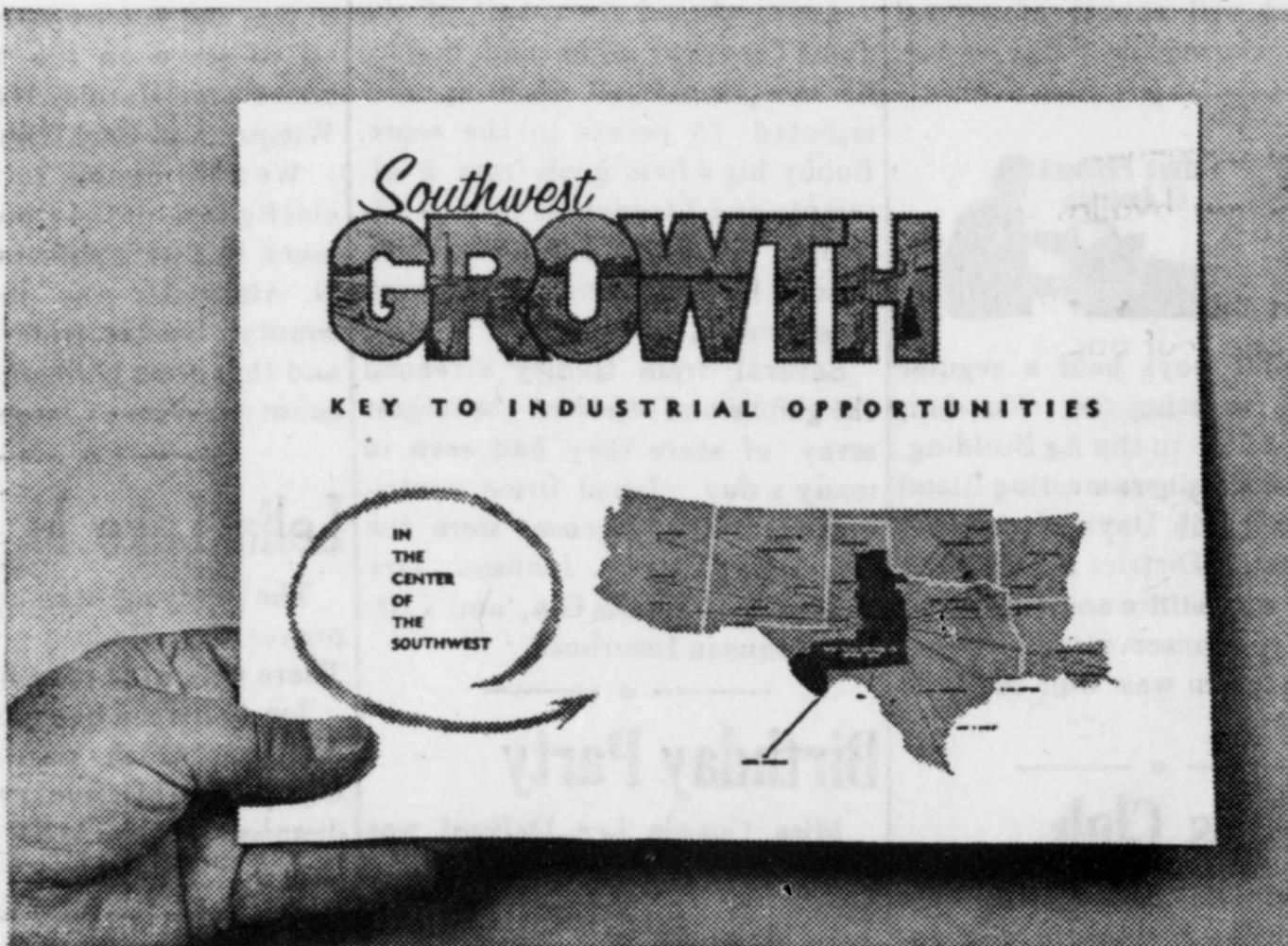

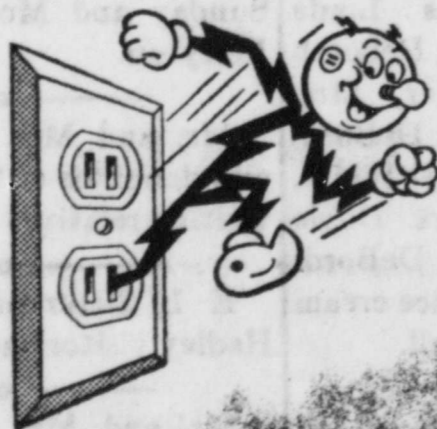

Deadline Near For Vehicle Inspection

The time is almost up for vehicle inspection and only a little over half of the vehicles in this region have been inspected, according to Capt Alan Johnson of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Dept. of Public Safety

Motorists are reminded that the inspection law prohibits inspections being made when it is raining or the streets are wet. So, it is possible that wet weather could prevent inspections these last few days

Johnson stated "There will be no extension of the April 15 deadline for inspection" Anyone operating a motor vehicle after midnight April 15 without displaying a 1961 inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law and subject to a fine not to exceed \$200 plus court cost.

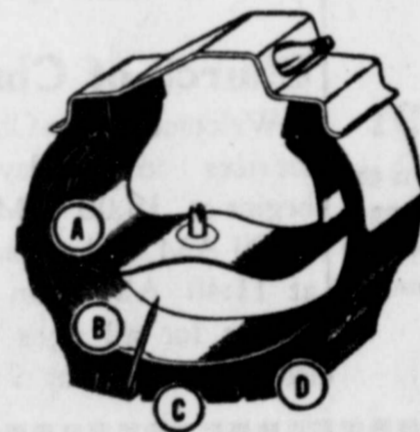
