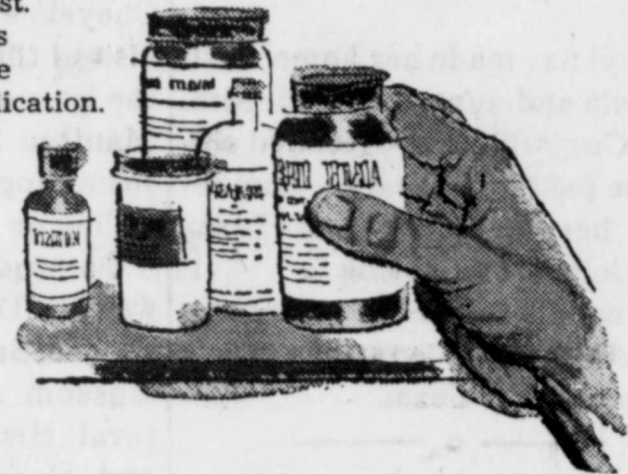

ASC News

The grain sorghum base acreage on farms signed through May 31 is about 35% of the preliminary base of 31,093 acres for grain sorghums for Donley County.

The corn base acreage on farms signed is about 79% of the average 1959 60 corn plantings of about 88.0 acres.

For all farms signed, advance payments permitting about half of the payments to be made this spring come to about \$41,153.97. We estimate that total payments will probably be more than double the value of the advance payments.

The 1961 grain program provided payments to farmers in the form of certificates for diverting corn and grain sorghum acreage to conserving uses. Producers received grain or the cash equivalent of grain for their certificates. Diversion of corn and grain sorghum acreage from production this year is expected to achieve a better balance between production and utilization of these grains. Payments to producers will maintain their income this year.
