General Tel Wage Agreement Reached

Communications Workers of America and General Telephone Company of the Southwest reached final settlement on a new one year contract today, July 20. Affected are 2,767 employees throughout the five-state area of the Company's operations.

Final agreement came about on the closing date of the old contract which ran to midnight of July 20, 1961. The primary term of the new contract runs from July 21, 1961, to July 21, 1962. The negotiations commenced June 5, 1961, and were continuous during the period except for a two week recess in June that was necessitated by pressing Union business.

The major issue was wages, and the new contract includes a general wage adjustment for all of the employees in the bargaining unit. Resulting wage increases range from 2 cents an hour to 13 cents an hour generally depending upon the employee's job classification and length of employment service. The Company estimates that the wage adjustment averages 5.5 cents an hour for the bargaining unit, and that it will increase the Company's annual payroll costs by some \$349,999.

Other changes in the contract were largely concerned with improvements and clarifications to contract language to promote the day-to-day application and understanding of the contractual provisions. Improvement was made in service assistant's differential pay, and central office clerk payments during temporary or relief assignments. Also, agreement was reached that call-out emergency assignments on holidays will be paid for a minimum of two hours, the same as previously established for emergency call-outs on non-holidays.

Official signing of the new contract will take place next week after all the separate agreements reached have been reproduced in to a formal document. The officializing will be by E. H. Danner, President of General Telephone Company of the Southwest; Frank A. Lenberg, Director of Personnel for the Company; D. L. McCowen, Director of the Union's District No. 6, and L. A. Sykora, C. W. A. Representative.

L. A. Sykora and Frank Len-

berg, Chief Negotiators for the Union and the Company, respectively, stated that while the bargaining was more or less intense, the negotiations were conducted in an amicable atmosphere. Both expressed satisfaction that, for the first time in many years, negotiations had not gone beyond the contract anniversary date in the reaching of final settlement.

The Union's bargaining committee included L. A. Sykora, C. W. A. Representative; B. J. Limmroth, President, Local 6180; H. R. Wright, Testboardman, Sherman, Texas; J. W. Bishop, Storekeeper, Brownfield, Texas; and R. H. Fisher, Central Office Repairman, Broken Arrow, Okla.

The Company's bargaining committee included Frank A. Lenberg, Director of Personnel; G. T. Sims, General Plant Manager; L. L. Porter, General Traffic Manager; W. H. Thomson, General Commercial Manager; D. E. Van Ness, Treasurer; C. W. Howard, Assistant Controller; and A. L. Fenner, Personnel Services Supervisor.

All of the negotiations meetings were held at San Angelo, Texas. This is the headquarters for General Telephone Company of the Southwest which serves some 322,000 telephones through 261 exchanges in the five state area of Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana. C. W. A. has represented employees of the Company, including other former companies previously merged with General Telephone Company of the Southwest, for many years.

Haskins To Coach At Texas Western

Don Haskins of Dumas has been named head basketball coach at Texas Western University at El Paso. Haskins took his Dumas team to the state semifinals at Austin last year in his first year at Dumas, and had great success at Hedley before going to Dumas.

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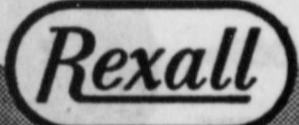

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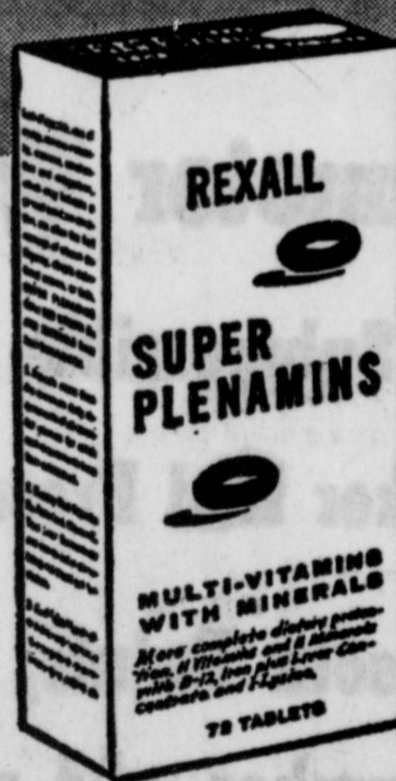

Farm Facts

"Farmers must be getting rich," the city housewife too often complains when she goes to pay for her food at the supermarket check-out counter.

The facts are, however, that the farmer's part of her food dollar has actually declined, that an hour's pay will buy more food today than it would a few years ago, that the farmer is caught in a "cost-price" squeeze, and that his net income is much lower than that of the average non-farm person.

Farmers average well below the minimum wages for most workers and still less than average industrial wages. In fact, the farmer's income is about half that of his city brother.

During 1958, the hourly income for farm labor and management was 97 cents, while workers in manufacturing industries received \$2.13 per hour.

Average net income per person of the farm population from all sources was \$1,066. This included \$298 received for work off the farm, the value of products con-

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sumed on the farm, and the rental value of the farm dwelling. By comparison, the average non-farm person's net income amounted to \$2,066. This is \$1,000 a year more.

The farm person's net income has risen 25.2 per cent from the 1947-49 average, while the non-farm individual's rose by 39.6 per cent.

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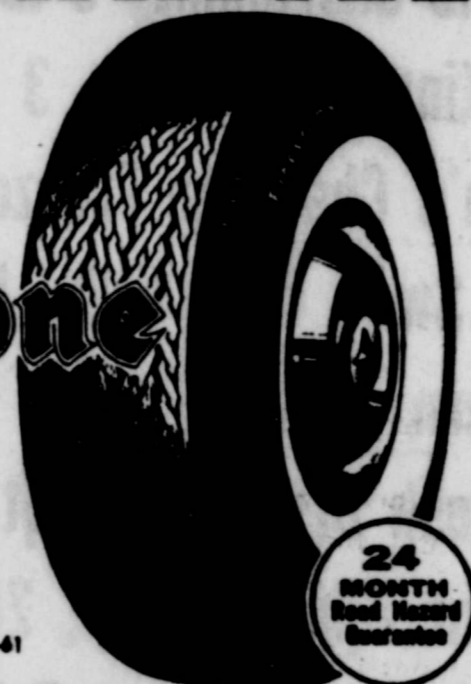
