Farm Bureau News

The Donley County Farm Bureau will hold its annual chicken barbecue at 6:30 p. m. Sept. 8 at the school house at Lelia Lake. Holly Wood, president, says that a big crowd is expected and a good program, with Senator Andy Rogers and Rep Will Ehrle as the speakers.

The only requirement for the barbecue is for everyone attending to leave a half chicken per person in your party at the Homen Lockers in Clarendon or the Moreman Lockers in Hedley. These must be left by 6 p. m. Sept. 7. Chickens are to be cut in half and not frozen.

Everyone is invited whether you are a member of Farm Bureau or not. Just leave one half chicken person at the designated place before the closing time.

Tax On Subscriptions

In accordance with the provisions of the new Texas sales tax, the Informer will have to collect the sales tax on all subscriptions within the State of Texas. Subscriptions to points outside Texas are not taxed.

Since we did not learn the details of this tax in time to give our subscribers what we consider a fair warning, through the month of September only we will absorb the tax ourselves. In other words, during September only, the subscription price for the Informer will remain at \$2.00 in Donley County and \$2.50 outside Donley County. On Oct. 1st the price will go to \$2.04 in Donley County and \$2.55 elsewhere. So if you want to save the tax when you subscribe, do it this month.

Please do not misunderstand this offer. The tax on these subscriptions will be paid, but if you subscribe during September, we will pay it for you.

CJC Night School

Dean Oliver J. Abel of Clarendon Junior College advises that the school will again offer the Adult Education Program, which is commonly called Night School, to enable adults of this area to take courses leading toward a college degree, teacher certification, or vocational competency.

A wide variety of courses will be taught, the only requirement being a minimum of ten persons taking any particular course. Subjects offered include Business Administration, Bible, Math, Government, Chemistry, Biology, Art, History, Education, English and Speech.

Registration for these classes will begin on Sept. 18 at 7 p. m., and classes will begin the evening of Sept. 25 at 7 p. m. Each class will meet one night per week.

Farmers of Donley County are being urged to take part in the election of their local Community ASCS Committee.

Mr. W. H. Cooke III, Chairman Donley ASCS County Committee points out this annual election is one in which all eligible farmers should feel a duty to participate.

The Community ASCS Committee to be elected consists of three regular members and two alternates. The chairman and vice chairman of the elected committee will serve as delegate and alternate delegate to the county convention where the county ASCS committee will be chosen.

Any person may vote in the community election who is eligible

to participate in any program administered by the county committee. There are some limitations on voting. Each voter is entitled to only one vote on any one ballot. If a voter has an interest in a farm or farms in more than one community in a county, he or she may select the community in which he or she wishes to vote, but the vote may be cast in only one community of the county. In case of partnership farms, the vote may be cast by either partner, and a corporation's vote may be cast by any authorized officer of the corporation.

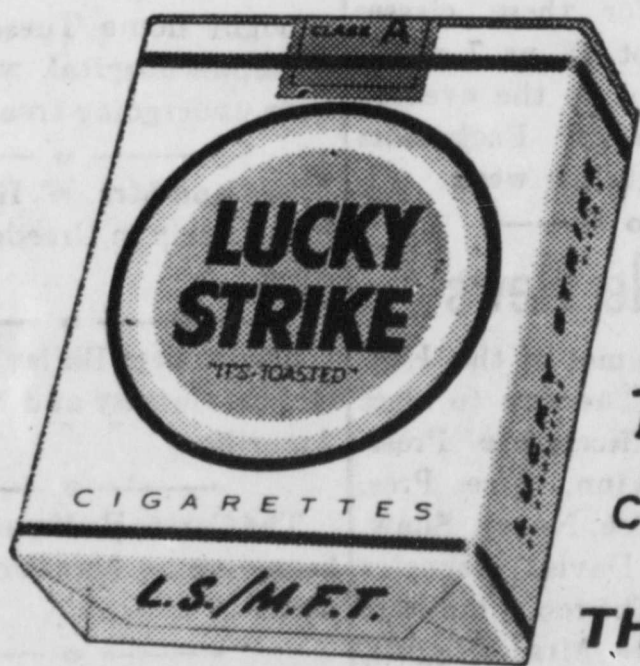

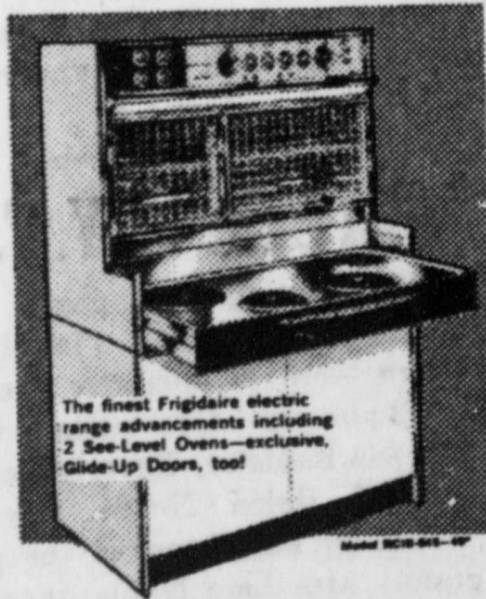

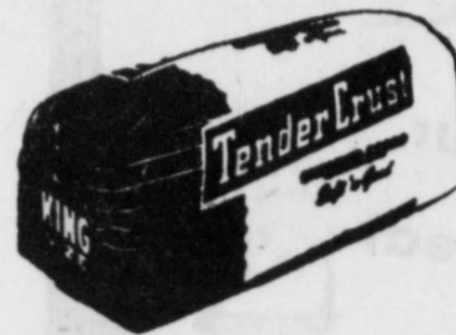
