Brush Fires

The Hedley Civil Defense unit made a run to a brush fire north of town Friday afternoon, and another Sunday afternoon. The two took some five hours of fire fighting to overcome.

The Hedley area is so dry at present that conditions are right for some very serious fires. Every resident of the area is urged to be extra careful with trash burning and such activities until conditions improve.

Vehicle Inspection

Less than thirty per cent of the registered vehicles in this area have been safety inspected for 1962, according to Patrolman Gwyn Fowler, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

With the April 15 deadline for having vehicles checked rapidly approaching, this means there are approximately 2200 vehicles in Donley County remaining to be inspected by the five approved inspection stations available.

Many motorists are going to find long lines awaiting them as the deadline draws nearer, due to the inspection stations not being able to cope with this large number.

The patrolman urged drivers to have their vehicles inspected as soon as possible to avoid this last minute rush. In addition, he reminded drivers that this time of the year is noted for adverse weather conditions which prevents the inspection stations from checking the vehicles.

"Passenger cars are inspected for brakes, lights, reflectors, horn and windshield wipers; while commercial vehicles are inspected for the above plus additional items required by law," Patrolman Fowler said. "All motorists not displaying a valid 1962 inspection sticker by April 15 will be in violation of state law."

Saunders Garage is the official inspection station for the Hedley area, and there are four in Clarendon.

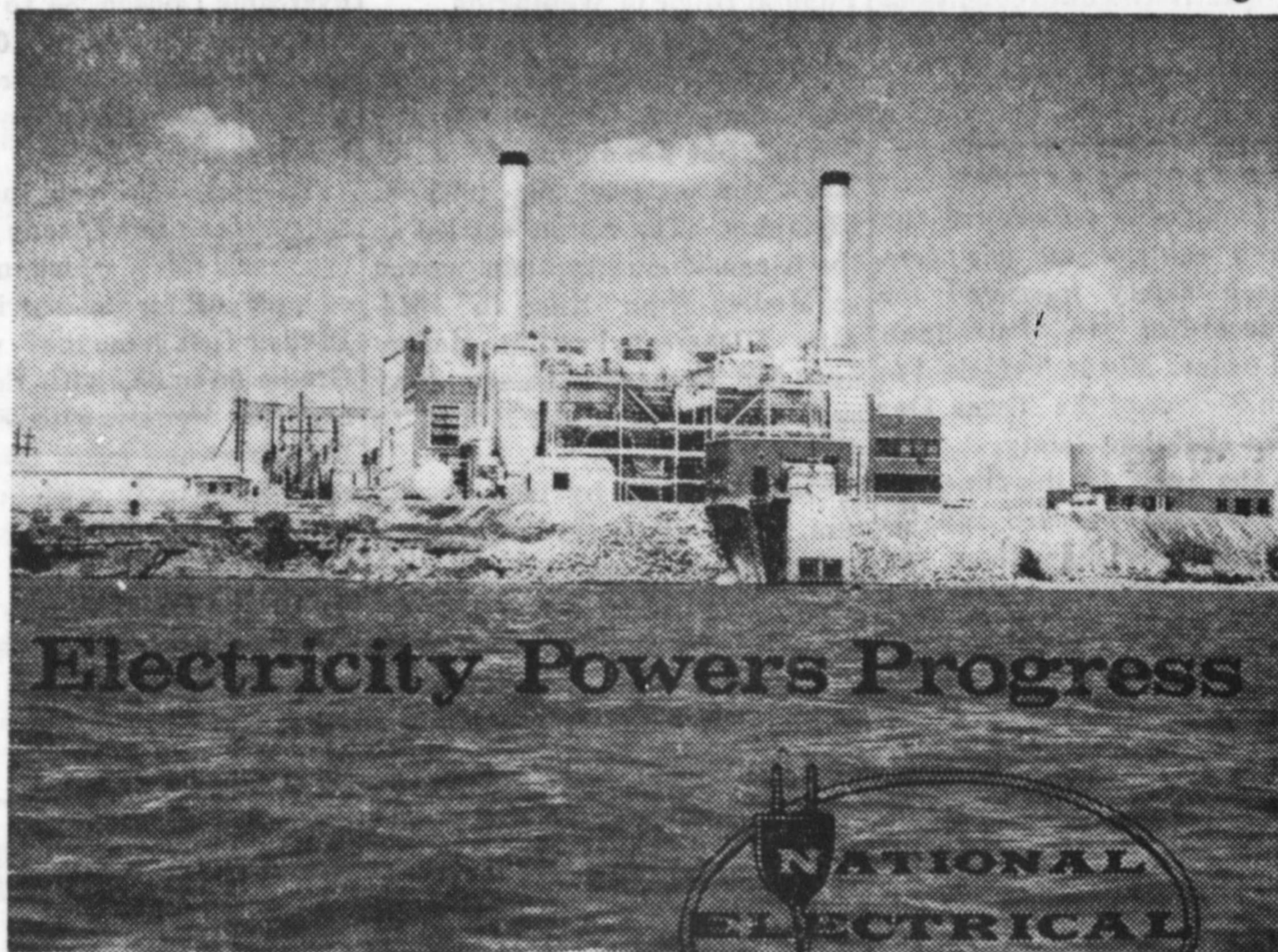

Pre-measurement For 1962 Cotton Applications for pre-measurement of 1962 cotton allotments are being taken. The cost of pre-measuring has been set at 10¢ per allotment acre, 9¢ per mile round trip to the farm, 15¢ per stake used in staking off the measured acres, \$8 50 for first plot and \$3 00 for each additional plot. The final date for applying for pre-measurement is March 30, 1962.

If you do not intend to plant all of your 1962 cotton allotment, please release it to the county committee and it will be reappportioned to other farms in the county. This will not only help the farmers temporarily that receive the additional allotment, but it will help you in the future by maintaining the cotton history for your farm at its maximum. The final date for releasing cotton is April 13, 1962. To be eligible to share in any cotton acreage released, you must make a written application in this office not later than April 13, 1962. The released acreage will be reappportioned not later than April 27th.

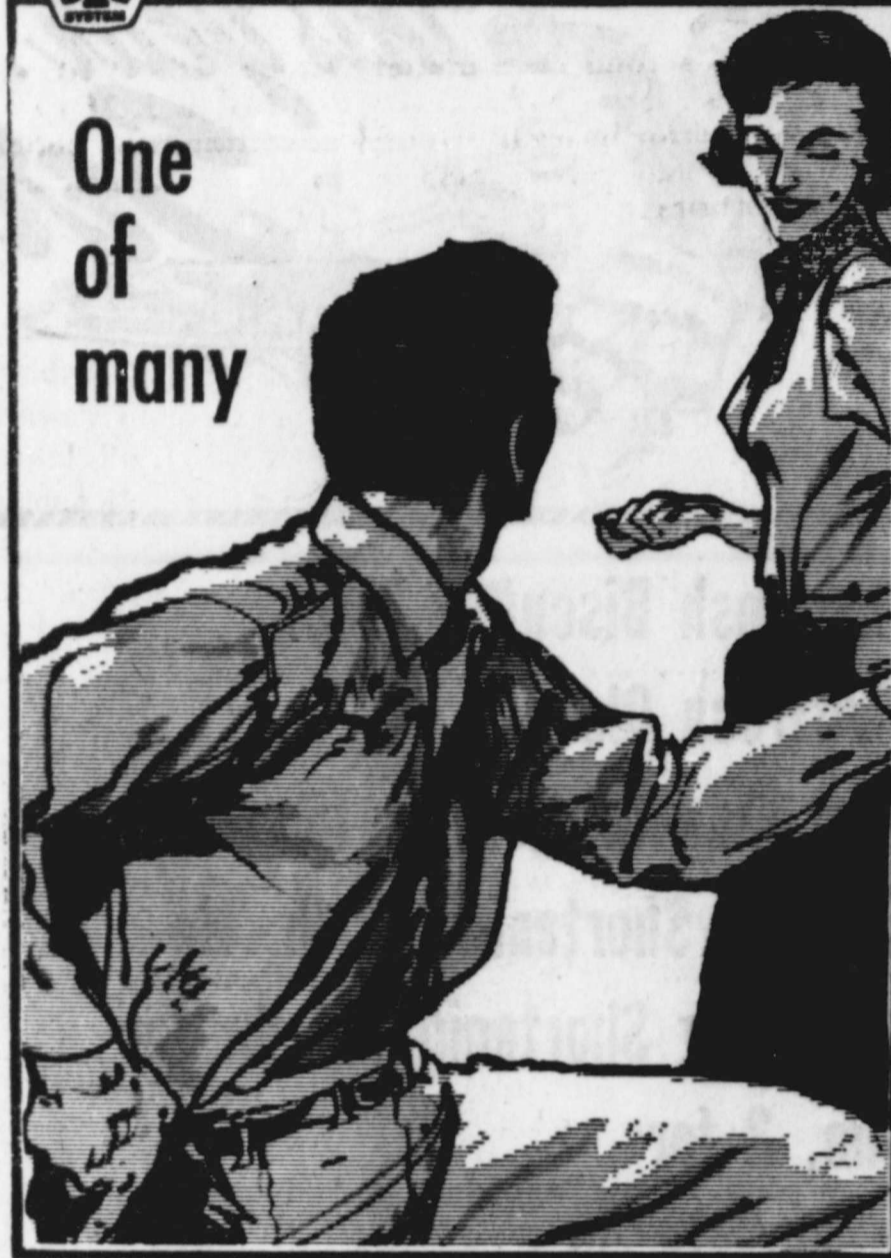

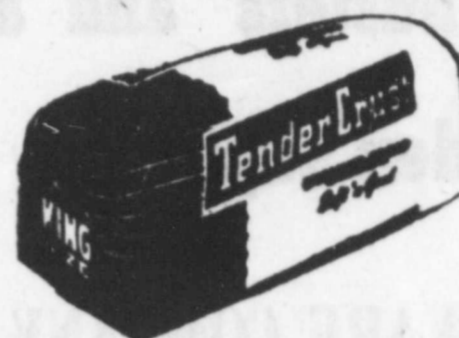
