Greenbelt Dam

A new application for a loan from the Housing and Home Finance Agency has been made by the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority.

This action was taken by the board of directors, representing Paducah, Childress, Quanah, Memphis, Clarendon and Hedley, in an effort to obtain the necessary funds to proceed with preliminary planning for a dam on the Salt Fork of Red River in Collingsworth County.

The application requests a loan of \$59,000 which would be sufficient to allow engineers to complete studies necessary to begin construction of the dam.

This will replace an application made earlier this year for a more extensive survey. Realizing the importance of the water problem to the six cities involved and to the development of West Texas, directors submitted the new application in an effort to speed up planning procedures.

Directors agreed on a plan whereby the construction of the dam would get underway sooner, then when actual demand for the water by member cities becomes a fact, the treatment plant and distributive system could be constructed under another financially favorable plan.

The government loan is not a grant, but funds made available through the government for development purposes. There is no interest charged by the government, but the total amount becomes due and payable upon completion of the project.

Prior to making the new loan application, directors consulted with Si Freese and Jim Nichols, consulting engineers for the Freese Nichols and Endress engineering firm of Fort Worth.

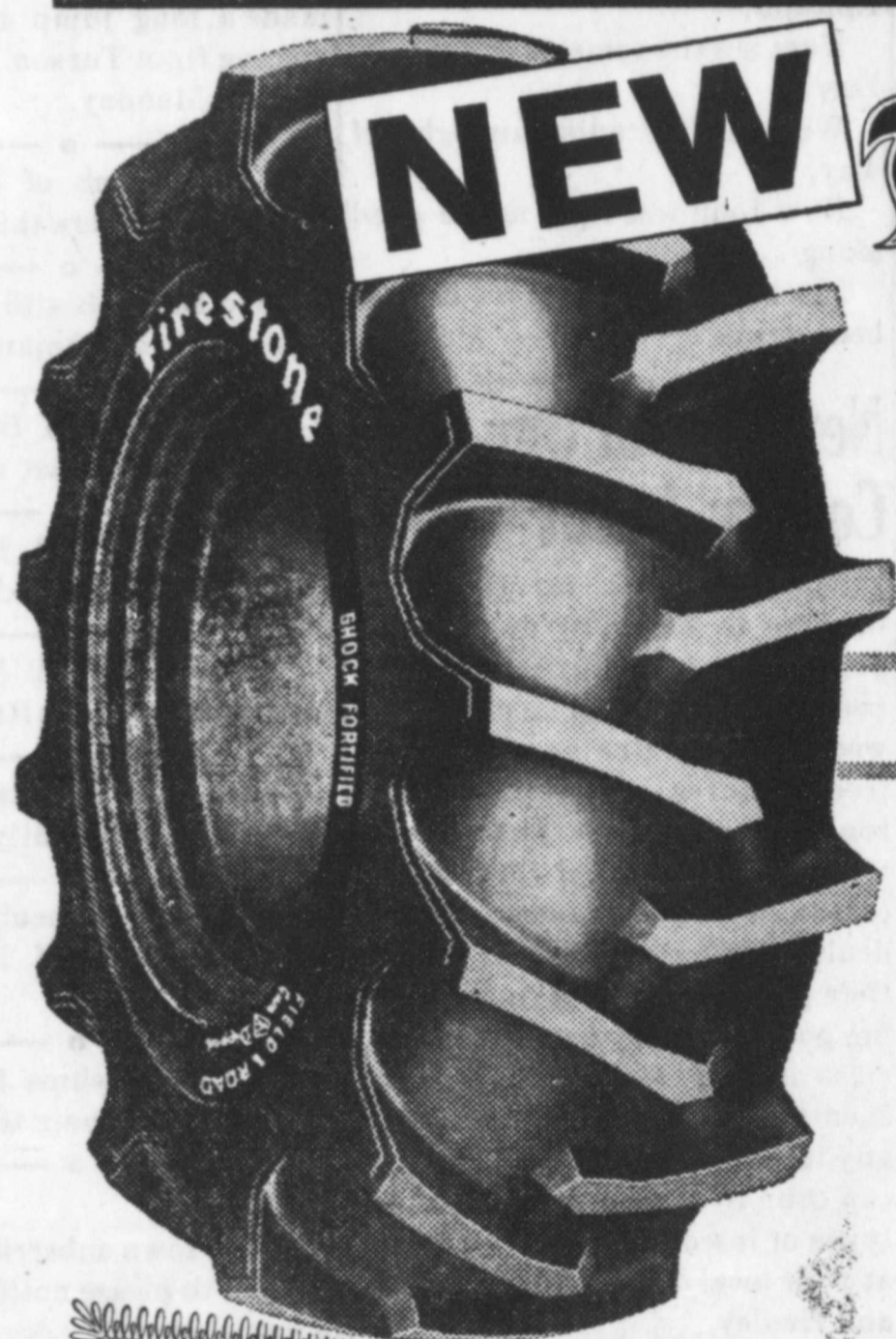
