## 11th Cotton Festival Is Big Success

All the Hedley Cotton Festivals have been quite successful, but the Eleventh Annual Festival held last Friday and Saturday was perhaps the greatest success yet. The weather was beautiful and the Festival crowd was believed to be the largest yet. The Festival was also a great success in a financial way, the ticket sales on the sale of cotton reaching a total of \$1,759.02 including donations.

## Parades Are Good

Two very nice parades featured the Festival Saturday. The kiddies parade Saturday morning was one of the best ever. The kiddies and parents spent a great deal of time and effort, and their fine showing is certainly appreciated. Unfortunately the list of entries and winners was mislaid so that we are unable to give a complete account.

The grand parade Saturday afternoon had a very gratifying number of bands and other entries with some really beautiful floats. First prize winner among the bands was Memphis High School with Matador Drum and Bugle Corps second and Groom High School third. In class A floats the Sodalitas Club won first, Moffitt Hardware second and Security State Bank third. In Class B the American Legion was first, 1919 Study Club was second and Garden Club third. In Class C, the Yellow Rose of Texas was first, Moreman Grocery second and Village Drunk third. The entire parade as usual was one of the best parades in this entire area. The order of parade was lost in the rush, so that it cannot be given in detail. The parade was televised and was given over KGNC Saturday night and Monday morning, thanks to Hedley's good friend Cotton John.

## Farm Facts

The word "corn" is used to describe the cereal that may happen to be the major crop in an area. In England, for example, it refers to wheat. In other countries it may mean barley or oats.

Corn, as we know it in this country, originated in the Americas and was unknown elsewhere until Columbus reported its discovery in Cuba. Now scientists, through the use of radioactive carbon to measure the age of vegetation, have established that corn was being grown in South America as far back as 1000 B.C. and in North America in 2000 B.C.

The Mayas, Aztecs, and Incas of Latin America cultivated corn and it was a staple item in their diet. It was grown by the mound dwellers in the Mississippi Valley and the cliff dwellers of the Southwest.

Popularity of the grain spread rapidly after it became known in Europe, and today corn is found all over the world. In acreage planted it ranks second only to wheat.



It grows equally well in Canada, Russia, and in the tropical climates of South America. Corn is being harvested somewhere every month in the year. The U.S., however, produces more than half the world's crop.

## Openings in DPS

Monthly examinations are now being given to fill the 154 vacancies in the uniformed services of the Texas Department of Public Safety, according to Major Harry Hutchison, Regional Commander of this Region for the Texas DPS.

The cities in this region where the entrance examinations are given include Lubbock, Amarillo, and Wichita Falls. December, 1962 will be the last date for entrance examinations to be given for entrance in the next student patrol school, a sixteen week training period which will begin at the Department of Public Safety Law Enforcement Academy in Austin in February, 1963.

The salary while in training will be \$331 per month and will increase to \$395 or \$412 per month upon graduation, depending on the nature of the patrolman's assignment.

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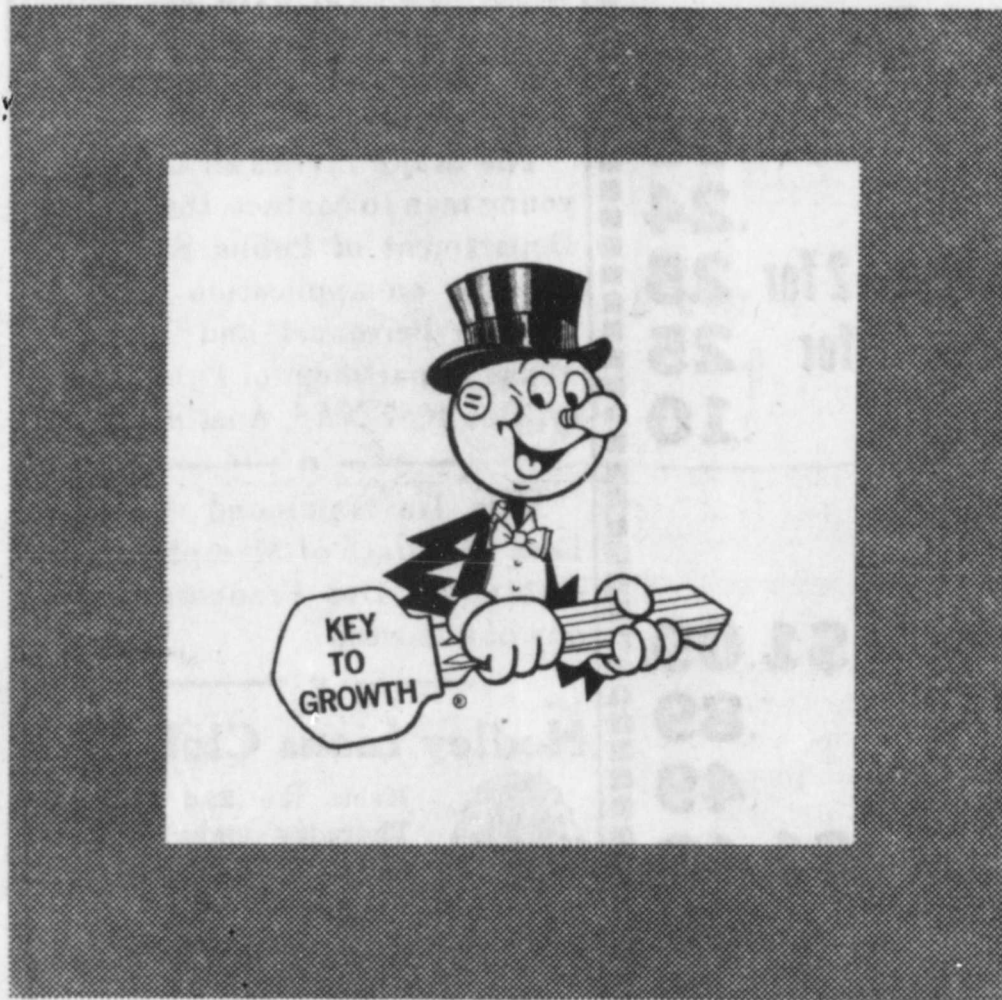

We were happy to have as guests Mesdames Kenneth Brinson, Hazel Shields, W. B. Wiggins and James Evans.

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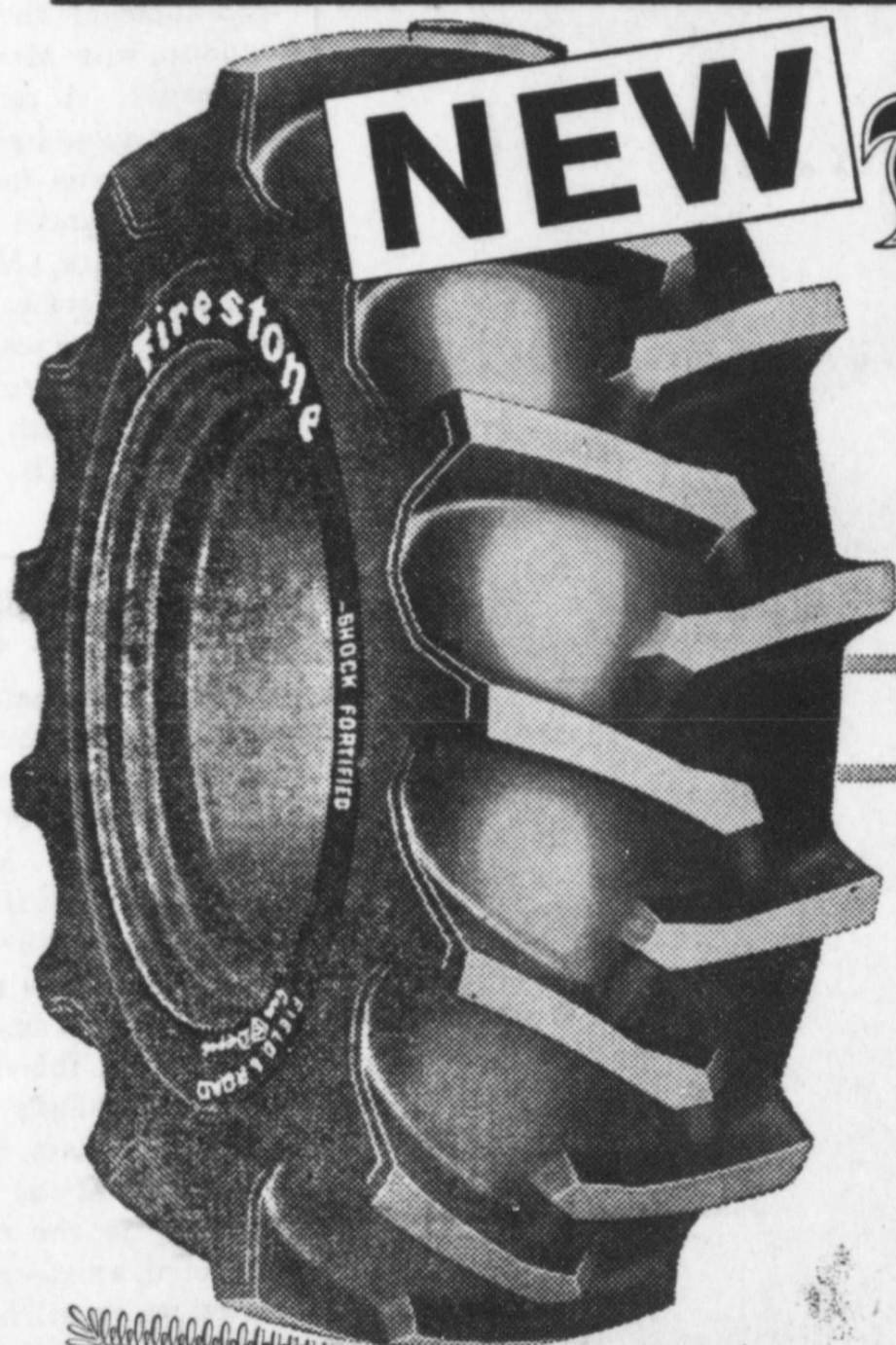
