## Education Week

"The concept of free public education for all the children of all the people is fundamental to our American way of life," according to Mack A. Bush chairman of the Hedley American Education Week committee.

"Anyone who advocates that our schools and colleges put their entire emphasis on the exceptionally talented, at the expense of the average student, should be reminded of the concept that has helped build our nation to its present greatness," he continued.

Mr. Bush made these comments in announcing that the 42nd annual American Education Week will be observed in Hedley Nov. 11-17.

"Education Meets the Challenge of Change" will be this year's theme for AEW programs and projects.

American Education Week is sponsored by the National Education Association, American Legion, National Congress of Parents and Teachers, and U. S. Office of Education.

The basic AEW purpose is to make every American aware of the important role education plays in a democracy, and to help him realize that good schools and colleges are, to a very large degree, his personal responsibility.

"In this age of great technological and sociological change, many aspects of American education are changing to meet the new challenges," Mr. Bush said. "However, most Americans want their schools and colleges to educate all children to the limit of their talents and abilities. All citizens must be encouraged to do their utmost. Their individual futures and that of our nation depend upon their doing so."

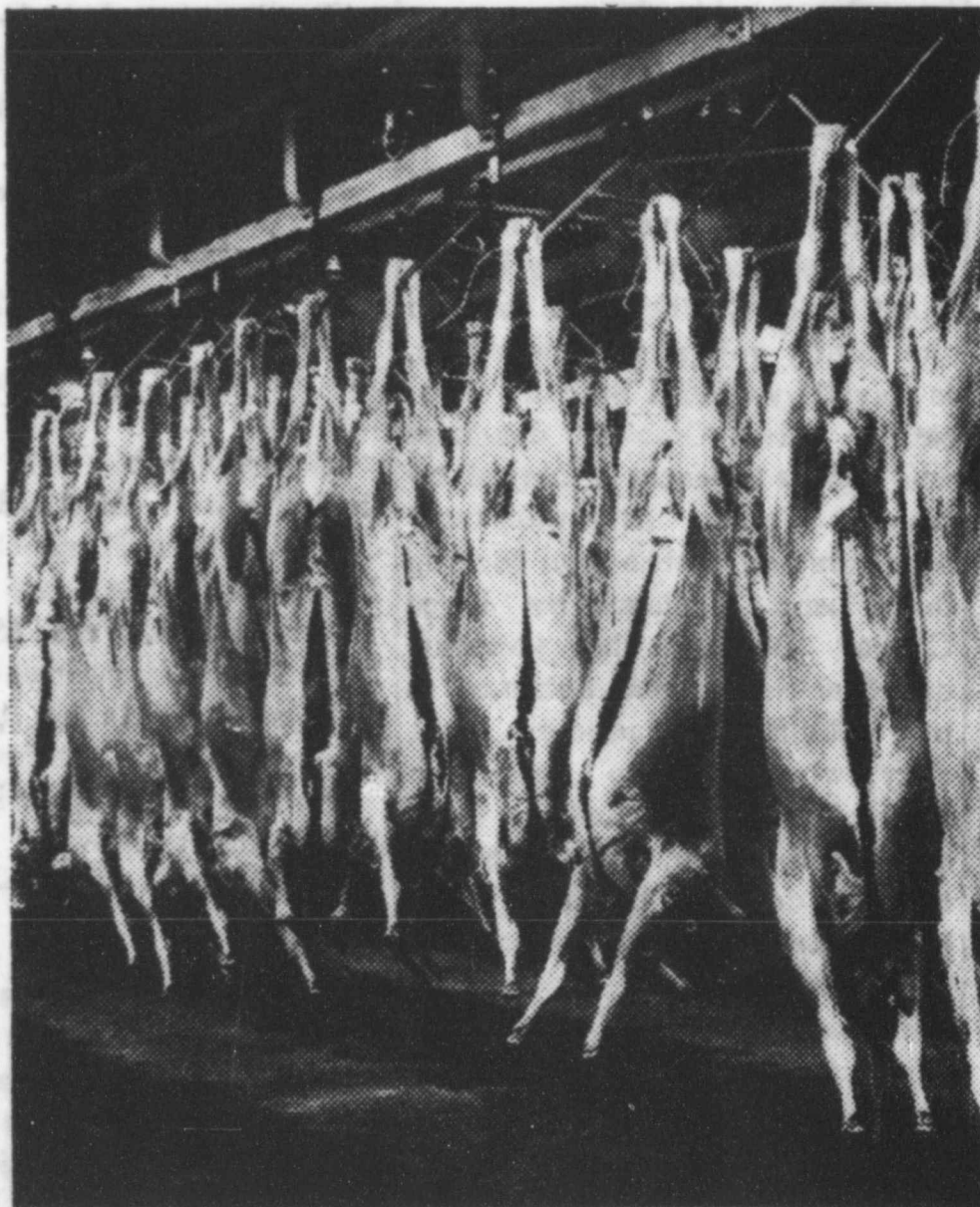

## A. S. C. News

### Grazing Feed Grain And Wheat Diverted Acres

Beginning Nov 1, 1962 most of the acreage diverted under the 1962 Feed Grain and Wheat Stabil. program will be released from program restrictions on grazing.

Diverted acreage on which grain or oilseed crops have matured in 1962, must not be grazed.

### 1963 Cotton Acreage Allotment Reduction

I am sure that you have already heard on the newscast where there will be a sizeable reduction in the cotton acreage allotment for 1963. We have not received an official notice to this effect but are of the opinion that the 1963 cotton allotments will be somewhat smaller than in the past year.

### Soil Bank Program

Farms that have CR land that will expire at the end of 1962, may sign an agreement to extend this acreage for one year if they desire to do so. All the land on the farm with respect to which the conservation reserve contract expires on Dec. 31, 1962 is eligible except:

1. Land determined by the County Committee to be in such physical condition that it will not return to crop production in the absence of this program

2 Land for which the ownership has changed since Dec. 31, 1960. We urge you to contact this office as soon as you can so that we can explain the payment and answer any questions and complete an agreement

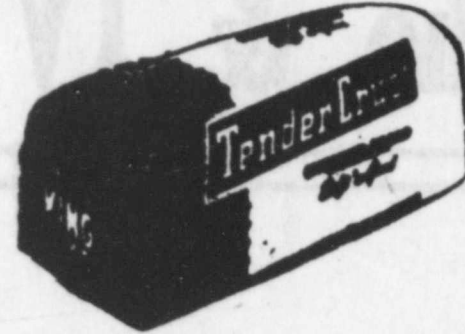
