Court Approves Western Route For McLean-Hedley Road

At the Commissioners Court meeting last Tuesday, Frank Murray made a motion which favored the western route for the road from McLean to Hedley, which was seconded by Clarence Reynolds, H. L. Riley also voting favorably. Hedley and the entire county should appreciate very much this action by the Court.

The complete text of the motion made by Murray is as follows:

"WHEREAS the Texas Highway Department has forwarded to the Commissioners' Court of Donley County an instrument asking for the agreement of the Commissioners' Court to provide a right-of-way and fencing if the Texas Highway Commission enters an order for a location on highway No. RM 2695, from State Highway 203, 6 miles Northeast of Hedley, North approximately 2.5 miles and thence in a Northwesterly direction to the end of RM 2695, a total distance of approximately 8 miles, generally known as the Easterly Survey; and,

"WHEREAS the Commissioners' Court of Donley County has never understood that such extension of RM 2695 would be located on such an Easterly route but that the same would be located in a Westerly direction to begin and end in the immediate area of Hedley, Texas; and,

"WHEREAS the Commissioners' Court of Donley County deems it would be more advantageous for the extensions of RM 2695 to be located on the Westerly Survey as already surveyed and recommended by the several respective Highway engineers so that such RM 2695 begins and terminates at the immediate area of Hedley, Texas; and,

"WHEREAS Donley County, Texas, will be able to furnish a right-of-way with a minimum width of 120' and right-of-way for such drainage facilities as may be required such title to be in the name of the State of Texas, with the County moving all obstructions and encroachments except standing timber and further doing the fencing, as may be required for a location of RM 2695 on the Westerly Survey as presently sur-

"WHEREAS the Commissioners' Court of Donley County does not feel that it can or should furnish the required right-of-way on the Easterly survey as aforesaid.

"NOW THEREFORE be it resolved that the Commissioners' Court of Donley County, Texas, respectfully declines to furnish the required right of way on the Easterly Survey on Highway No. RM 2695, from State Highway 203 6 miles Northeast of Hedley, North approximately 2.5 miles and thence in a Northwesterly direction to the end of RM 2695, a total distance of approximately 8 miles; and be it further resolved that the Commissioners' Court of Donley County, Texas, respectfully requests the Texas Highway Department to enter its order making a location for RM 2695 according to the Westerly survey as surveyed and recommended by the several respective Texas Highway Department engineers to begin and terminate in the immediate area of Hedley, Texas."

Farm Facts

When explorers came to the New World they found the Indians using tobacco in much the same way it is used today. Since that time, tobacco production has spread to many countries.

The United States, however, has long been the leader in tobacco production. Total output in 1960 amounted to more than 8.8 billion pounds, with the U.S. accounting for more than 1.9 billion and China for about 1.8 billion.

India, Russia, Brazil, Turkey, and Japan are among other countries growing large tobacco crops.

North Carolina is by far the largest tobacco producing state. The 1961 crop in the Tarheel State totaled almost 844 million pounds, compared with 391.3 million for Kentucky, 153.4 million for Virginia, 151.8 million for South Carolina, and 137.6 million for Georgia.



Cigarettes took 1,212 million of the 1,487 million pounds of leaf tobacco used in the U.S. in 1960. Consumption amounted to 484.4 billion cigarettes, or 3,908 per person (15 years of age and over).

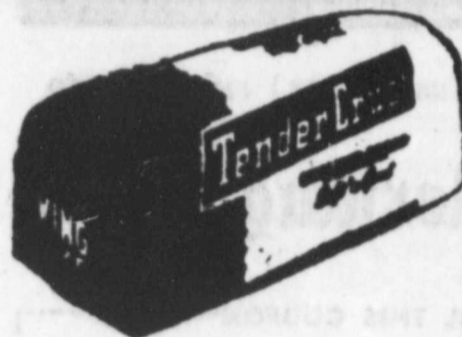
