Greenbelt Dam

All seven cities of the Greenbelt Water Authority were represented at the Authority's meeting at Childress last Wednesday night. Also present were Judge Otho Dent of the State Water Control Board, Col. Si Freese, engineer for the Greenbelt Water Authority, and Mr. Wolverson, engineer for the Collingsworth County Water Control District. Representing Hedley were Clifford Johnson and Roy Hunter.

The Collingsworth County district renewed their proposal that the Greenbelt Authority work with them. Dr. S. H. Townsend, president of the Greenbelt, stated that the Authority was ready to go along with them when they came up with further water tests as to quality and quantity of the water and costs of the project.

Delegates and directors of six of the seven cities conferred with Col. Freese and stated the towns wanted and needed the water. Col. Freese said that he expected construction to start within a year and water within two years.

Two dam sites are now being explored, staked out and core drilling will begin immediately. One is north of Hedley and about two miles east downstream, and the other is about five miles upstream from this site. Either of the sites will furnish plenty of good water, he stated.

In studying the science of agriculture, these Future Farmers are striving to improve this great industry for the welfare of all citizens.

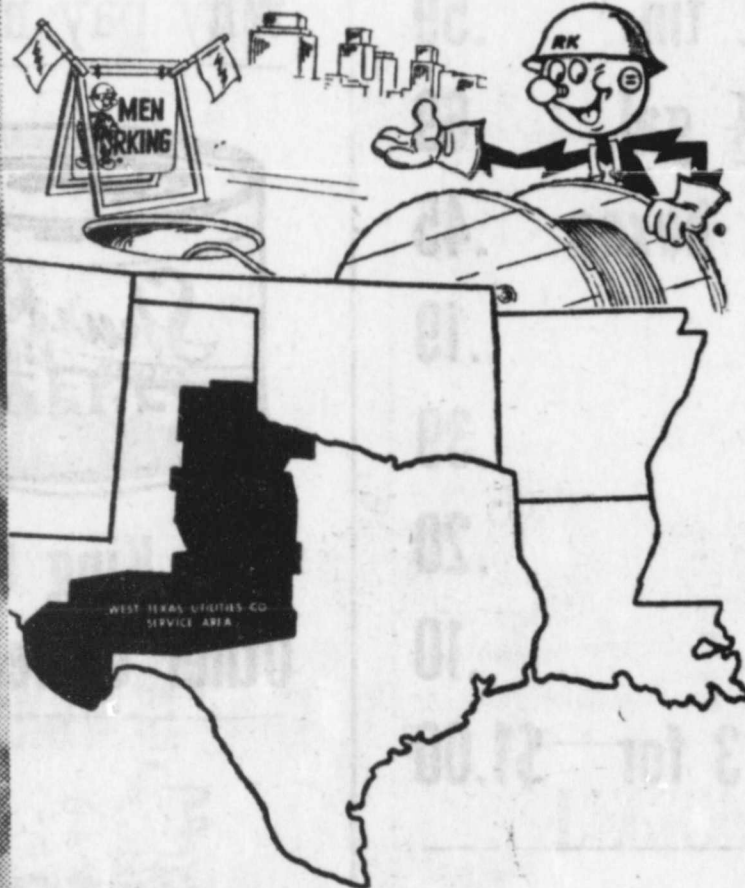
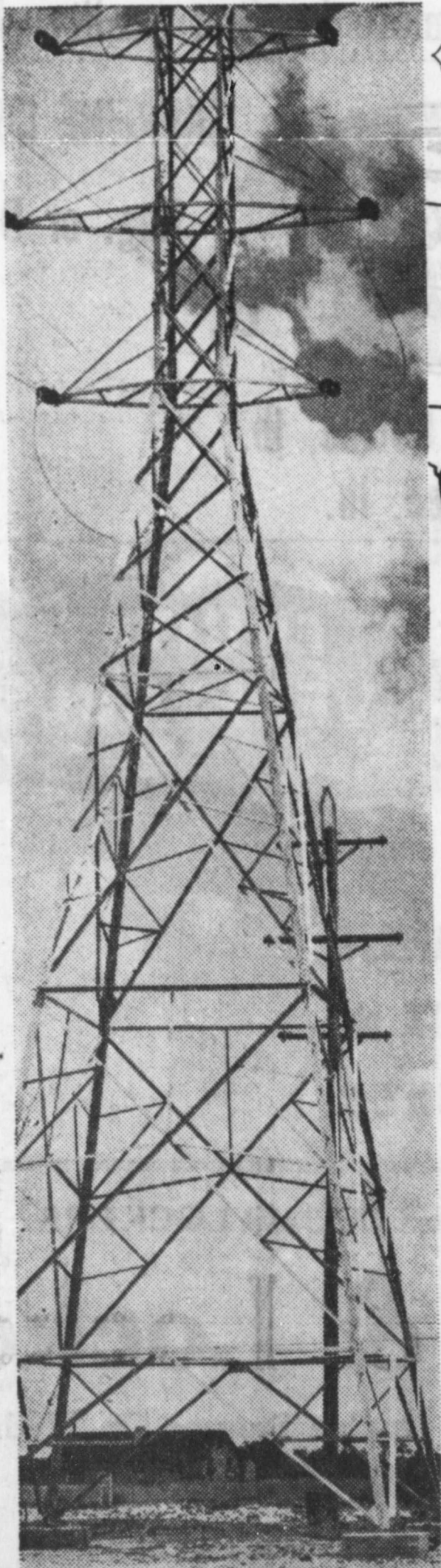

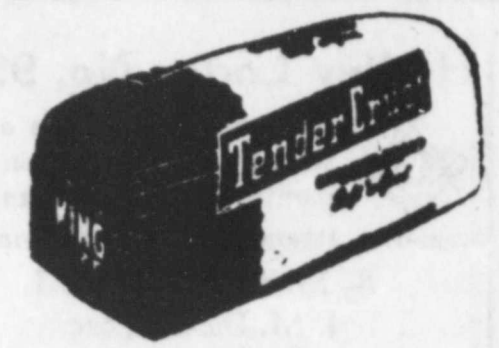
