Farmers in Donley County are reminded that community elections of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation farmer-committeemen will soon be taking place.

A farmer will be eligible to cast a ballot for the men he wants to represent him on the committee if he is participating or is eligible to participate in one or more of the ing. national farm programs administered locally by the farmer-committeemen Such a person is eli. gible to vote in the committee Receives Discharge election if he or she is of legal voting age and a farm owner tenant, or sharecropper, or, if not of legal voting age, in charge of the farming operations on an entire farm. Programs administered by the ASC County and Community committees include the Agricultural Coaservation Program, acreage alloments, marketing quotas, commodity loans, the Feed Grain Program, the National Wool Program, farm storage facility loans, and others as assigned by the Secretary of Agriculture. In Donley County, the elections will be held by mail on September 12, 1963. Votes will be tabulated publicly on September 17, 1963 The elections will choose three community committeemen and two afternates.



Boys Ranch Rodeo

The largest crowds in the history of the famed Boys Ranch Rodeo are expected at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch over the Labor Day weekend, Sept. 1 and 2, when the 312 boys now being cared for hold their 15th annual event.

To accommodate the holiday crowds, the rodeo arena seating capacity has been expanded with the construction of 81 new conerete reserved boxes made possible by the Ranch's neighbor, the Texas Sand and Gravel Company, donating materials The older boys of the Ranch worked on much of the construction as part of their vocational training The new boxes will provide front row seats for more than 500 spectators with four, six and eight seats in a box:

The Boys Ranch Rodeo is the only rodeo of its kind in the nation in which boys are the only contestants Riding professional rodeo stock, they attract larger crowds each year with more than 7000 attending last year's two performances It is fast-moving entertainment as older boys ride bucking broncs, Brahma bulls and steers while the younger Ranchers take on the calves. All of the boys have some part in the rodeo

A rapid sale of reserved box seat tickets is expected by Boys Ranch officials and advance orders are being taken at the Ranch's headquarters in Amarillo The reserved box seats are \$2 50 which includes all admission charges. General admission will be \$1 50 for adults and 75¢ for children and servicemen in uniform Proceeds from the rodeo will be used for the Ranch's expansion program.

The history of barley is almost as old as that of agriculture. It is believed to have originated in Asia and to. have been grown in Egypt nearly 70 centuries ago. The cereal is mentioned in the Bible and mythology and dates back to 3500 B.C. in Mesopatamia, 3000 B.C. in Europe, and 2000 B.C. in China.

Barley has the shortest growing season of any cereal and because of this can be grown in the cool climate of Norway or in hot, dry Morocco.

Although used primarily for livestock feed in the United States, barley is an important item in the human diet in parts of Africa and Asia.

Since antiquity, barley has been used in the brewing of

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PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51-a and 51-b-1 of Article III so that the same shall consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to (1) citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, (2) needy persons who are at least eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and (4) needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility for such assistance; repealing the Constitutional limit on the amount paid out of state funds to individual recipients of Old Age Assistance and Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing that the amounts for such assistance payments shall not exceed the amounts that are matchable out of federal funds for such purposes; providing that the amounts expended out of state funds for such purposes shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000); providing for the acceptance of fi-nancial aid from the Government of the United States; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 51-a and 51-b-1 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amend-ed, and the same are hereby amended, so that the same shall hereafter consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a of Article III, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein con-tained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may by the Legislature be deemed ex-pedient, for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported in-stitution, while such inmate; pro-vided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is match-Government of the United States for able out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such re-cipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds. "(2) Needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently dis-abled by reason of a mental or physi-cal handicap or a combination of phy-sical and mental handicaps and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation; provided that the Legislature shall feasible for vocational rehabilitation; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that no individual shall receive as-sistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiv-ing Old Age Assistance. Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely statepermanently in any completely state permanently in any completely state-supported institution; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual re-cipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on be-half of such recipients shall not ex-ceed the amount that is matchable ceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds. "(3) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years: provided that no such

bility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"(4) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that the Legislature years; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence require-ments for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipi-ent shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance margine amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"The Legislature shall have the "The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Govern-ment of the United States such fi-nancial aid for such assistance as such Government may offer not in-consistent with the restrictions here-in set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount match-able out of federal funds; and pro-vided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per year out of state funds for such assistance shall never exceed Sixty Willion Del shall never exceed Sixty Million Dol-lars (\$60,000,000).

"The Legislature may enact ap-propriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection, under such limita-tions and restrictions as may be deemed appropriate by the Legislature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitution-al Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amend-

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance pay-ments to the (1) needy aged, (2) needy individuals who are perman-ently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind and (4) needy children; auth-orizing the Legislature to set up res-idence to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the payment of assistance grants on the purpose of paying such assistance grants: providing that the amounts expended out of state funds on be-half of individual recipients shall half of individual recipients shall not exceed the amounts that are matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amounts expended per year out of state funds for such assistance pay-ments shall never exceed Sixty Mil-lion Dollars (\$60,000,000)." lion Dollars (\$60,000,000)." PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 62 of the Con-stitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing all pol-itical subdivisions of Jefferson County, Texas, to provide retirement, dis-ability and death benefits for all ap-pointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County; providing for the neces-sary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 62 of Art-icle XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new subsection (c), reading as follows:

"(c) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Dis-ability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointed officers and em-ployees of all political subdivisions ployees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; or said political subdivision may elect to join the County Retirement Sys-tem of Jefferson County; provided that same is authorized by a ma-jority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the in-come of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (71/2%) of the compensation paid to each such per-son by the political subdivision.


ON THE BALLOT al subdivision within said county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the pay-ment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and providing that the recipients of bene-fits for any other pension retirement fund or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, com-tributed by the political subdivision is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other. pension aid."

Section 2. The foregoing Consti-tutional Amendment shall be sub-mitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1964, at which election each ballot shall have print-ed thereon the following words:

"FOR the addition of subsection (c) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after-approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointive officers and employees of said political sub-divisions."

"AGAINST the addition of subsec-tion (c) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jeff-erson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Re-tirement, Disability and Death Com-pensation Fund covering all ap-pointive officers and employees of said political subdivisions."

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

One person ate an average of about 172 pounds of fruit per year during 1910-14. Today the average person eats about 200 pounds of fresh fruit equivalent yearly.




