Slow Drivers Warned

Austin—Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today the new speed law effective Aug. 23 specifically makes it a violation to drive a vehicle so slow as to impede traffic.

He said that before enactment of the new law it was necessary for a police officer to warn a driver impeding traffic to speed up or get off the road before filing a charge.

"Under the new statute, as we interpret it, whenever a driver is driving slower than the normal and reasonable movement of traffic and thereby impeding that traffic, he will be committing a violation for which he may be charged in court," Garrison said.

Openings On Highway Patrol

Austin—The Texas Department of Public Safety announced today there are approximately 100 vacancies available in the Highway Patrol force for which men between the ages of 21 and 35 may apply by September 14.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS director, said applications will be accepted from qualified men for a training school which begins November 19 at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin. He urged them to submit applications early to insure time for processing.

Boys Ranch Rodeo

The largest crowds in the history of the famed Boys Ranch Rodeo are expected at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch over the Labor Day weekend, Sept. 1 and 2, when the 312 boys now being cared for hold their 15th annual event.

To accommodate the holiday crowds, the rodeo arena seating capacity has been expanded with the construction of 81 new concrete reserved boxes made possible by the Ranch's neighbor, the Texas Sand and Gravel Company, donating materials. The older boys of the Ranch worked on much of the construction as part of their vocational training. The new boxes will provide front row seats for more than 500 spectators with four, six and eight seats in a box.

The Boys Ranch Rodeo is the only rodeo of its kind in the nation in which boys are the only contestants. Riding professional rodeo stock, they attract larger crowds each year with more than 7000 attending last year's two performances. It is fast-moving entertainment as older boys ride bucking broncs, Brahma bulls and steers while the younger Ranchers take on the calves. All of the boys have some part in the rodeo.

A rapid sale of reserved box seat tickets is expected by Boys Ranch officials and advance orders are being taken at the Ranch's headquarters in Amarillo. The reserved box seats are \$2 50 which includes all admission charges. General admission will be \$1 50 for adults and 75¢ for children and servicemen in uniform. Proceeds from the rodeo will be used for the Ranch's expansion program.

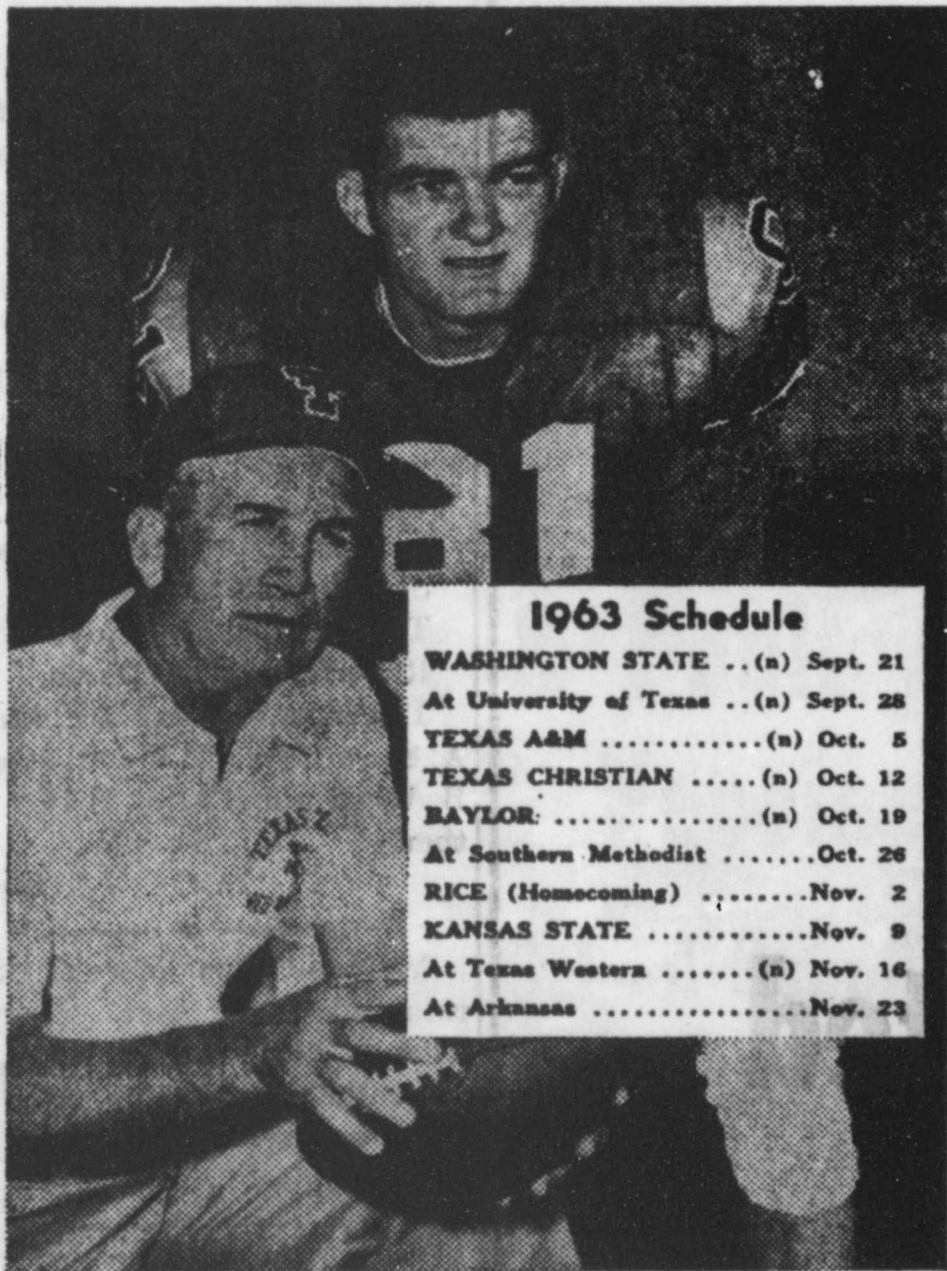

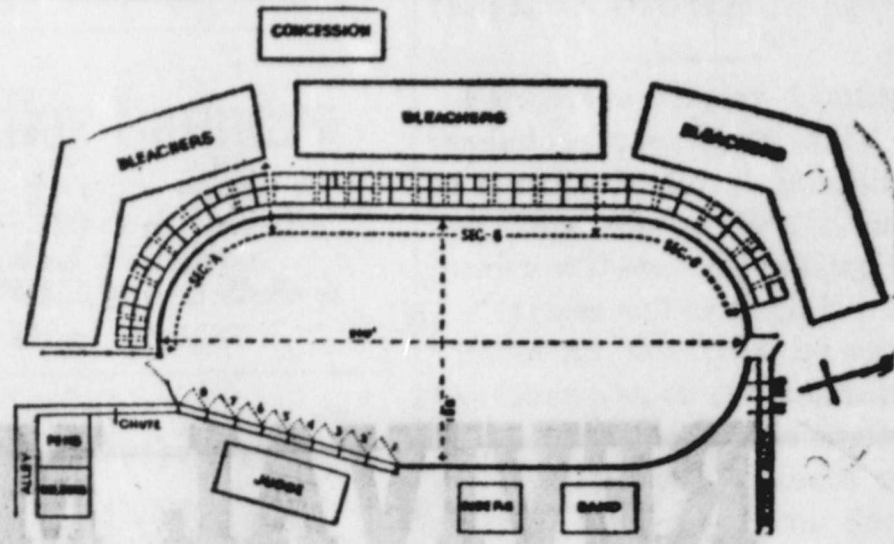

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Donley county during the month of July, according to Sergeant J. W. Wilson, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area. These wrecks accounted for two persons injured and property damage in the estimated amount of \$2 155.00. The rural traffic accident summary for this county from January through July of 1963 shows a total of 19 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were one person killed and 11 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$13,843 00.

A. S. C. News

Farmers in Donley County are reminded that community elections of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation farmer-committeemen will soon be taking place.

A farmer will be eligible to cast a ballot for the men he wants to represent him on the committee if he is participating or is eligible to participate in one or more of the national farm programs administered locally by the farmer-committeemen. Such a person is eligible to vote in the committee election if he or she is of legal voting age and a farm owner, tenant, or sharecropper, or, if not of legal voting age, in charge of the farming operations on an entire farm.

Programs administered by the ASC County and Community committees include the Agricultural Conservation Program, acreage allotments, marketing quotas, commodity loans, the Feed Grain Program, the National Wool Program, farm storage facility loans, and others as assigned by the Secretary of Agriculture.

In Donley County, the elections will be held by mail on September 12, 1963. Votes will be tabulated publicly on September 17, 1963. The elections will choose three community committeemen and two alternates.

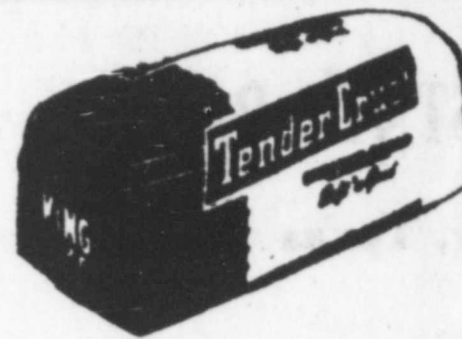
