Greenbelt Dam

City Secretary M. O. Weatherly, City Councilman Gene Allison and our Authority Director Clifford Johnson met with the Greenbelt Water Authority at Childress last Tuesday night. It was a very optimistic meeting.

A resolution to amend the Authority's water rights was passed allowing the Authority to sell surplus water for irrigation. This will be submitted to the Texas Water Board on or about Oct. 14. This will not affect the interested cities' usage for municipal and industrial use as they come first.

Hedley, Clarendon, Childress and Quanah will vote Sept. 28 on the contract to buy water from the Authority. Paducah and Crowell plan to vote in October.

The first four cities named will pay 30¢ or less per 1,000 gallons for filtered and treated water delivered into their water tower. Paducah and Crowell will pay 37½¢ per 1,000 gallons. If Memphis or some other water user of like size buys water from the Authority the rate could be reduced 2½¢.



Slow Drivers Warned Rowe Cemetery

Austin—Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today the new speed law effective Aug. 23 specifically makes it a violation to drive a vehicle so slow as to impede traffic.

He said that before enactment of the new law it was necessary for a police officer to warn a driver impeding traffic to speed up or get off the road before filing a charge.

"Under the new statute, as we interpret it, whenever a driver is driving slower than the normal and reasonable movement of traffic and thereby impeding that traffic, he will be committing a violation for which he may be charged in court," Garrison said.

NOTICE OF ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF DONLEY
CITY OF HEDLEY

TO THE RESIDENT, QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF HEDLEY, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID CITY AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Hedley, Texas, on the 28th day of September, 1963, on the proposition and at the place more particularly set forth in the resolution adopted by the City Council on the 5th day of September, 1963, calling said election, which is substantially as follows:

RESOLUTION
CALLING AN ELECTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF DETERMINING WHETHER THE CITY COUNCIL SHALL BE AUTHORIZED TO ENTER INTO A CONTRACT WITH GREEN BELT MUNICIPAL AND INDUSTRIAL WATER AUTHORITY FOR THE PURPOSE OF SUPPLYING WATER TO THE CITY OF HEDLEY.

WHEREAS, the City is in urgent need of an additional water supply which may be obtained by contract with Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority;

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEDLEY, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held in said City on the 28th day of September, 1963, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION

"Shall the City Council of the City of Hedley, Texas, be authorized to enter into a contract with Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority for the purpose of supplying water to said City and for the operation by said Authority of the City's water production, water supply and water supply facilities, as authorized by Chapter 342, Acts of the Fifty First Legislature and other applicable laws?"

2. That said election shall be held at the City Hall within said City, and the following named persons are hereby appointed as officers of said election:

Henry Moore, Presiding Judge,
Ross Springer, Assistant Judge,
Mrs. Opal Evans, Clerk,
Mrs. Alice Johnson, Clerk.

3. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 342, Acts of the Fifty First Legislature, and only qualified electors of the City who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be permitted to vote at said election.

4. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

PROPOSITION
"FOR THE WATER CONTRACT"
"AGAINST THE WATER CONTRACT"

Each voter shall draw a line

through one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

5. If this election results favorably to the making of said contract, the City Council will pass an ordinance prescribing the form and substance of said contract and directing its execution. A proposed draft of such contract is on file in the City Secretary's office for public inspection. Failure of other cities in the Authority to authorize such contracts with the Authority shall not impair the authorization conferred by this election upon the governing body of this City.

6. A substantial copy of this resolution signed by the Mayor of said City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice shall be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided in said Chapter 342, Acts of the Fifty First Legislature, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the general election laws.

Farm Facts

Per capita consumption of processed vegetables (on a fresh equivalent basis) may exceed consumption of fresh vegetables in 1961, the U. S. Department of Agriculture notes.

Consumption of processed vegetables has been rising in the past few years and that of fresh vegetables has been falling. Fresh vegetable consumption fell off 15 per cent from 1947-49 through 1957-59. Use of processed vegetables increased 23 per cent.

Consumption of canned vegetables increased 13 per cent and that of frozen vegetables more than doubled. Per capita consumption of fresh vegetables totaled about 101 pounds in 1960 and that of processed vegetables was about 99 pounds (fresh equivalent).

The most striking change in the ten-year period was in the increased popularity of frozen vegetables. Use of frozen vegetables, excluding potatoes, increased from 4 per cent of total vegetable consumption to about 8 per cent, and all major frozen ve-

tables shared in the growth. Over-all per capita consumption of commercially produced vegetables remained stable, at around 200 pounds a year.

She lived in Hedley for many years before moving to McLean in 1940. She was a member of the First Christian Church of Hedley.



Map Shows Greenbelt Dam Location






