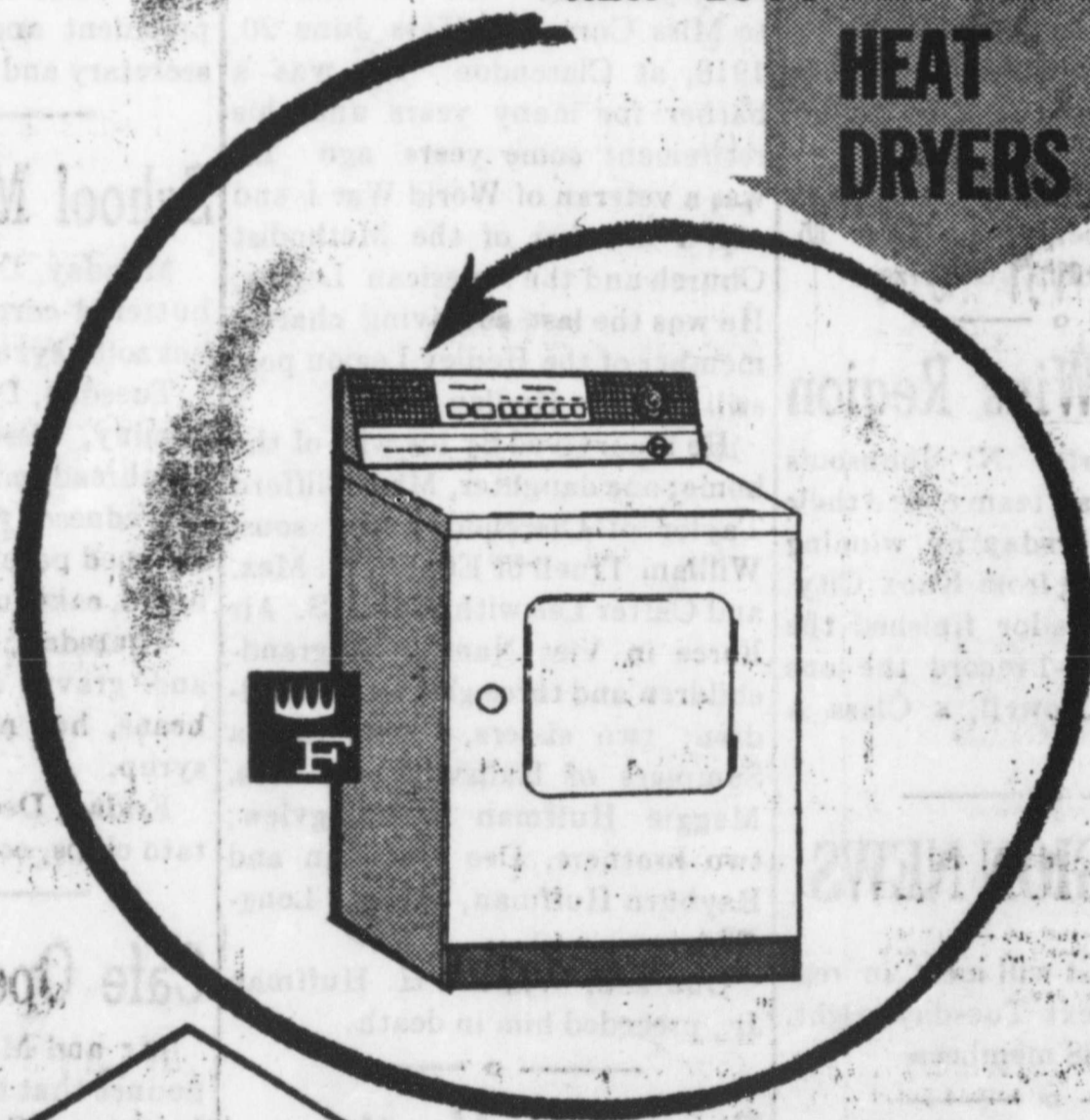

Polling place for F and G Communities for the cotton referendum Tuesday, Dec 10, will be the West Texas Gin in Hedley. The polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m.

1. If at least two-thirds of the growers who vote in the referendum approve of quotas, then the quotas will be in effect for the 1964 upland cotton crop, marketing penalties will apply to any 'excess' cotton produced on a farm, and price support at a level within the range of 65 to 90 percent of parity will be available to farmers who comply with their farm acreage allotments.

2. On the other hand, if more than one-third of the growers who vote oppose the quotas, then there will be no quotas and no penalties applicable to the 1964 upland cotton crop, and price support to farmers who comply with their farm acreage allotments will be available at 50% of parity, as directed by law.

Allotments are not affected by the outcome of the balloting. They will remain in effect whether or not quotas are approved, as a means of determining eligibility for the available price support.

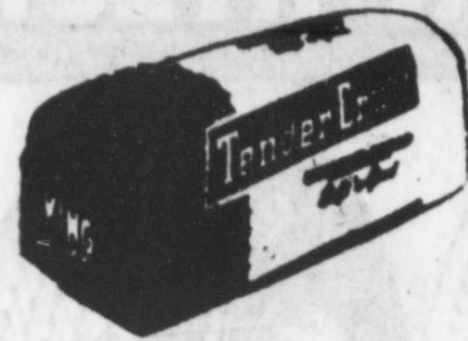
