Charles L. Reynolds Announces Candidacy For District Attorney

Charles L. Reynolds, County Attorney of Childress County, Texas, today announced his candidacy for the office of District Attorney of the 100th Judicial District, subject to the Democratic primary. The 100th Judicial District is composed of Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley and Hall Counties.

Mr. Reynolds, a native of this area, has practiced law in Childress, Texas, for the past ten years, the last seven of which he has been county attorney. He is married to the former Nelmarie Parman and they have two sons, Charles Jr., 12, and Parman, 11. Mr. Reynolds attended the University of Maryland and received his bachelor of laws degree from Southern Methodist University in Dallas. He is a member of the First Baptist Church in Childress, a past president of the Childress Rotary Club, a member of the American Legion Cox Furr Post No. 65, Veterans of Foreign Wars David W. Brown Post No. 2512, State Bar of Texas, and the 100th Judicial District Bar Association.

In making his announcement, Mr. Reynolds stated he felt his experience in prosecuting criminal matters as a county attorney well qualified him for the office of district attorney, and it is on this experience that he is asking for consideration of his candidacy. He remarked that he would make a special effort to meet the people of the 100th Judicial District in his campaign, and would welcome any inquiry about his candidacy.



You must expect to obtain more than 50% of your income from the production of agricultural commodities from this farm, excluding the estimated return from the production of the requested allotment to be eligible.

Custom work will be done for those desiring the same.

The Xerox 914 Copier Machine, the one you see advertised on television, is generally accepted as being the most efficient copying machine in use today. This machine retails for \$29,500, and one of these is located in the office of the Greenbelt Abstract and Title Company and is available for custom use. New Texas Almanac

Many new features in the 1964-1965 Texas Almanac, just published by The Dallas Morning News, have been added to material that has made this 106-year-old publication the "Encyclopedia of Texas."

Texas' increasing urbanization is emphasized in special pages containing photographs and comparative statistics for 21 metropolitan areas.

Maps of 254 counties and data on all counties and cities of Texas have been brought up-to-date, including population and other figures from the 1960 U. S. Census. New features are a County Economic Index, and maps showing leading Texas counties in production of crops and livestock.

Texans who like to brag will find ample ammunition in two pages showing the rank of Texas among states, and in proportion of the United States total, in leading categories.

Election returns, the text of the Constitution of Texas with amendments adopted through 1962, a list of wet and dry counties, maps of Texas Senatorial, Representative and Congressional Districts, lists of state, county and municipal officials, and other information are found in the discussion of politics and elections.

Water, soils, plant life, weather, wild life, minerals, employment and labor, manufacturing service industries, and hundreds of other topics are summarized in the 688 pages.



Farm Facts

Every now and then a farmer runs across a bull or steer that is so mean he feels like shooting him. Some farmers do—with a tranquilizer dart that tames the unruly animal. It thus protects both man and beast.

The dart is a plastic syringe encased in metal and loaded with nicotine. It's fired from a special air rifle that loads like a single-shot shotgun and is powered by a compressed air cartridge.

Farmers, ranchers, zoo keepers, veterinarians, and big-game hunters use the rifle. They can fire it from as far as 75 yards away and score an effective hit, but best results are obtained from a distance of about 35 yards.

When the dart strikes the animal, a small compressed air cartridge is activated and the nicotine is injected into the bloodstream. In a few minutes the bull will stagger and then drop to the ground, paralyzed. Then the farmer can administer medicine that the animal may need.

The treatment is relatively painless for the animal. It appears to suffer little, either



from the dart or from the dose of nicotine. Within an hour's time, the bull will be grazing contentedly as if nothing had happened, and science will have helped the farmer solve another knotty problem.


