Alewine Promoted

Mississippi State Employment Service, Farm Placement Department—Beginning the new year, Ralph W. Alewine Jr. became Chief, Farm Placement Department, of this Agency, succeeding Ira O. Welborn, retired.

Mr. Alewine, although young, has had 17 years of experience with the Agency. He has been Employment Interviewer, Veterans Employment Representative, Field Representative, Clearance Placement Specialist and Chief of Technical Services. In the field of clearance for several years, he was actively concerned with the movement of agricultural as well as non-agricultural labor. In his latest assignment as Chief of Technical Services, he has headed up the Agency's participation in the Rural Areas Development program, including a large share in the preparation of Overall Economic Development Plans for most of the counties in Mississippi.

He is intimately acquainted with much of the State, having served the Agency at Sardis, Aberdeen, Indianola, Clarksdale, McComb, Hazlehurst and Louisville, in addition to nearly six years in the State Office. For one school term, he taught and coached baseball and basketball teams at Coffeeville.

He was born at Hedley, Donley County, Texas, a little town east of Amario, in the Panhandle. After high school at Hedley, he studied at Howard Payne College at Brownwood, Baylor University and then at Mississippi College. He served three and a half years as an Ensign in the Navy, and now is a Lieutenant Commander, U. S. Naval Reserve.

If you have any extra cotton which you are not planning to plant in 1964, please come to the office and release it to be reapportioned to other producers. You will not only be helping other producers but you will also be protecting your allotment.

Also, if you wish an increase in your cotton allotment from any released acreage we may have to reapportion, be sure and come to the county office and make your request on the proper form.

January 24—Final day for filing application for new growers cotton allotments.

January 31—Final day for filing application for payment on shorn wool and unshorn lamb.

January 31—Final day to make application for commodity loans.

February 17—Final day to disburse commodity loans.

February 10—Feed Grain sign-up begins.

March 27—Feed Grain sign-up closes.

March 31—Final day to redeem commodity loans.

Readers of the Memphis Democrat were interested to observe the following item in their 40 Years Ago column last week:

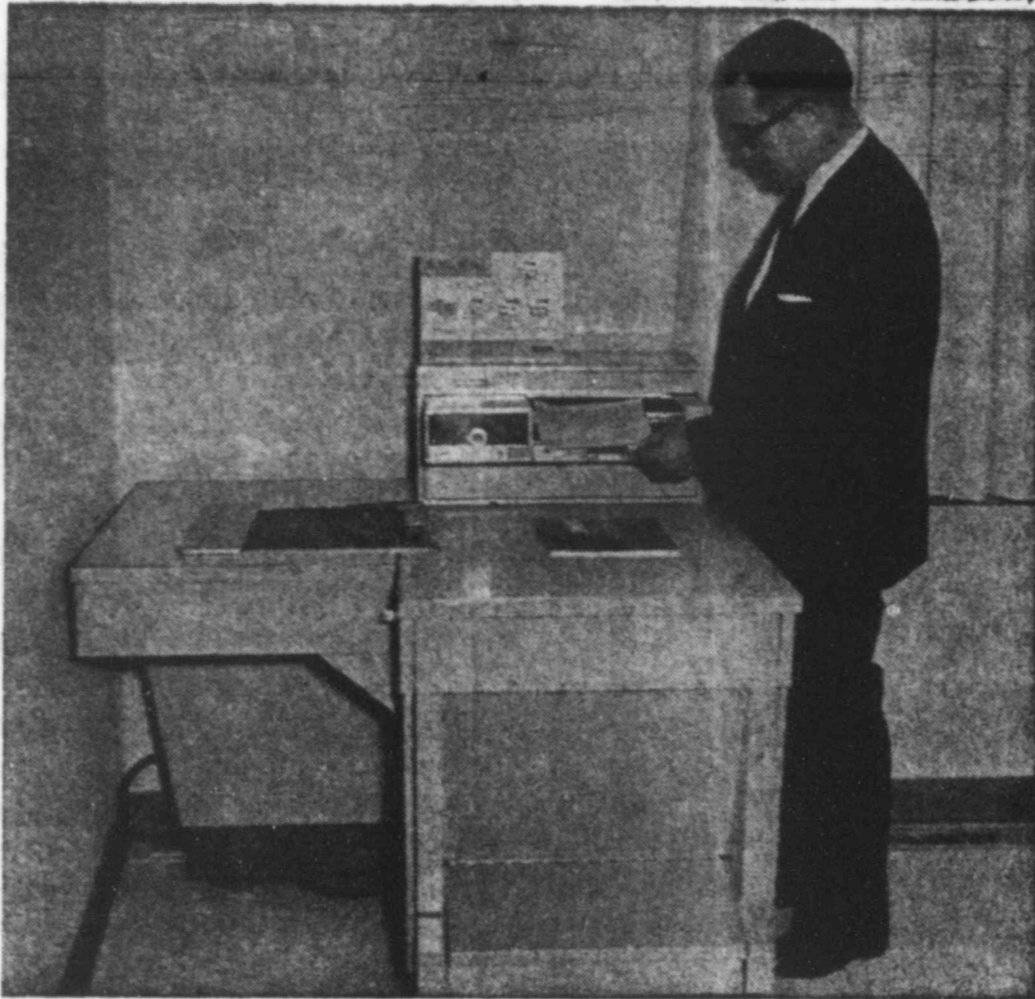

You must expect to obtain more than 50% of your income from the production of agricultural commodities from this farm, excluding the estimated return from the production of the requested allotment to be eligible.

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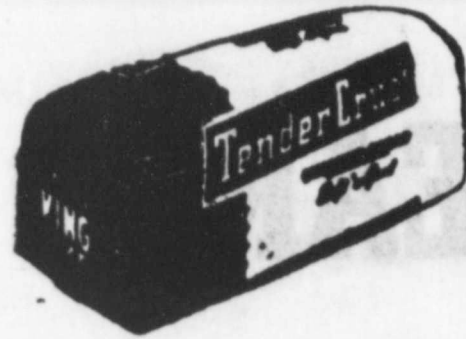
