Bill Lowe Announces Candidacy For County Attorney

Bill Lowe, who has practiced law in Clarendon since 1949, has announced his candidacy for reelection to the office of County Attorney of Donley County.

"The people of Donley County will be employing their county's legal advisor and criminal prosecutor at the general elections this year, and I would like to be their County Attorney," Lowe stated. "I feel that my record as County Attorney shows that I have been successful in my duties to the people of this county, and that I am now more capable and experienced to perform the requirements of the many duties imposed upon a County Attorney. I have always appreciated the confidence that the citizens of this county have placed in me during the time that I have been their County Attorney, and I shall be grateful for their continued support."

"The duties of County Attorney as legal advisor to the Commissioner's Court and prosecuting the criminal cases over which I have jurisdiction, have always come first. I shall continue to devotedly fulfill all the responsibilities as County Attorney expected by the people."

"I am proud of my record as your County Attorney. I will do my best to serve faithfully, honorably and with dignity and respect the office and the people of this county," Lowe stated.

Bill Lowe is a graduate of Clarendon Public Schools and Clarendon Junior College. He received his B. B. A. degree from The University of Texas in 1946, and his Law Degree from the Law School of The University of Texas in 1949. He is a member of the State Bar of Texas, and is past President of the 100th Judicial District Bar Association and is serving at this time as its Secretary and Treasurer.

Lowe has devoted extensively of his time to civic, community, and county progress. He is a past president of the Clarendon Lions Club and is at this time its program chairman. He is also Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Cub Scouts and is serving as a Director of the Salvation Army in this county. He has

Greenbelt Dam

The officers, directors, attorneys, engineers, bonding company officials, State Senator Andy Rogers and others met with the Finance Committee of the Texas Water Development Board at Austin last Thursday. The member cities of Clarendon, Childress, Quanah, Crowell and Hedley were represented. Clifford Johnson and Jack Hoggard represented Hedley.

The State's participation of \$2,100,000 in the dam and reservoir, which is half the cost, and the purchasing of the \$8,200,000 Revenue Bonds was discussed. The committee made some very helpful suggestions and asked that a few minor amendments be made to the application. They seemed to be very favorable to our project.

Some were present from Wellington and Paul Spillman and Dan Henard were their spokesmen. They stated they would enter a protest at the Feb. 12 meeting. At this meeting the Texas Water Commission will act on transferring the Authority's water rights from the old dam site to the present site. Their contention was that the Authority was holding more water rights than needed and that Collingsworth County needed the water for municipal use and irrigation.

Friday morning the Texas Water Development Board met and considered the report of the Finance Committee. Since there would probably be a protest they deferred action on our application until after the Feb. 12 meeting. We hope to have large delegations from all member cities at this meeting.

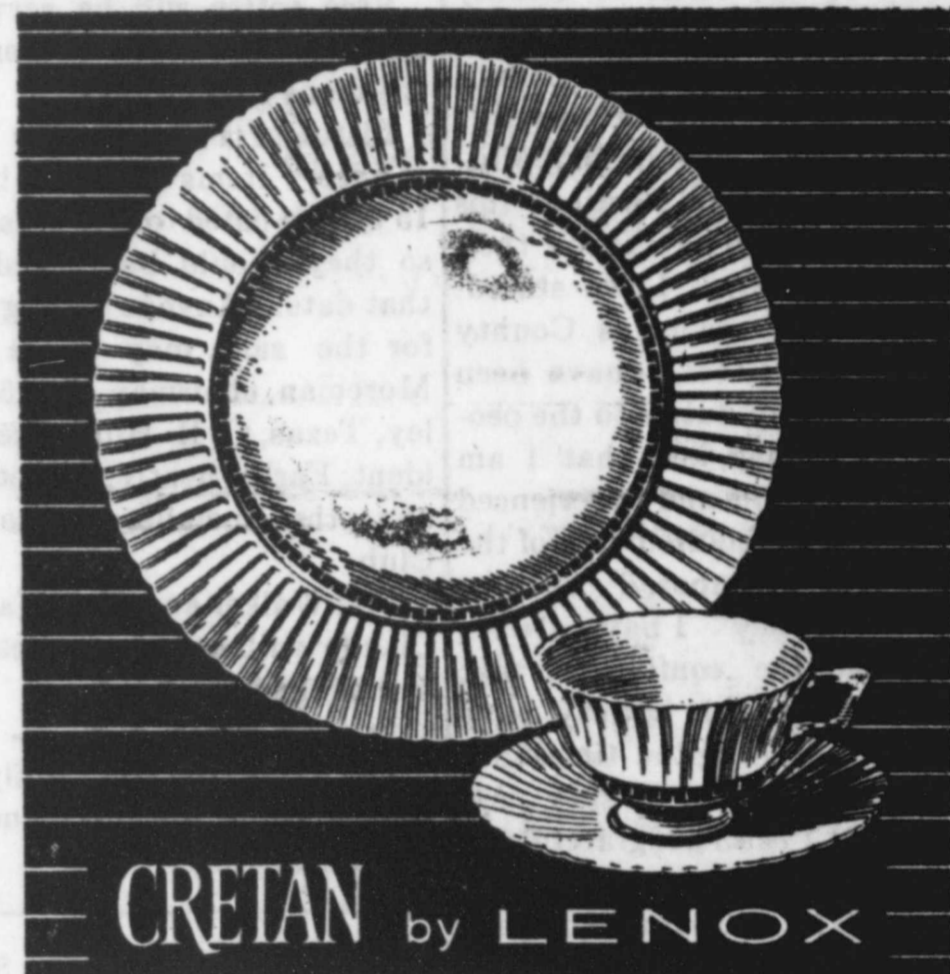

Farm Facts

Every now and then a farmer runs across a bull or steer that is so mean he feels like shooting him. Some farmers do—with a tranquilizer dart that tames the unruly animal. It thus protects both man and beast.

The dart is a plastic syringe encased in metal and loaded with nicotine. It's fired from a special air rifle that loads like a single-shot shotgun and is powered by a compressed air cartridge.

Farmers, ranchers, zoo keepers, veterinarians, and big-game hunters use the rifle. They can fire it from as far as 75 yards away and score an effective hit, but best results are obtained from a distance of about 35 yards.

When the dart strikes the animal, a small compressed air cartridge is activated and the nicotine is injected into the bloodstream. In a few minutes the bull will stagger and then drop to the ground, paralyzed. Then the farmer can administer medicine that the animal may need.

The treatment is relatively painless for the animal. It appears to suffer little, either



from the dart or from the dose of nicotine. Within an hour's time, the bull will be grazing contentedly as if nothing had happened, and science will have helped the farmer solve another knotty problem.

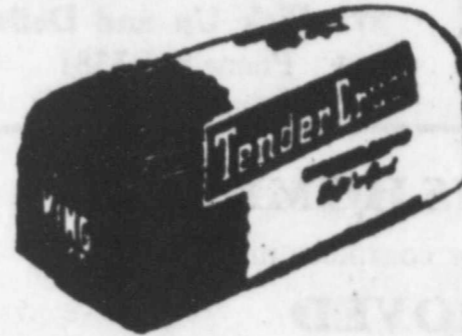
