Second Primary

Record breaking interest was shown in the second primary here last Saturday, 492 votes being cast, only 4 less than in the first primary. In the Hedley box for Congress Joe Pool received 258 votes and Robert Baker 106. For Sheriff Truett Behrens received 260 votes and Bill Cornell 192. For Commissioner Junior Hill received 294 votes and Frank Murray 162. This count is for the 459 votes actually cast on Saturday, and does not include 33 absentee votes in the Hedley box.

Lelia Lake gave Cornell 57 votes and Behrens 44, Hill 70 votes and Murray 31.

The latest unofficial total we managed to secure for the county gave Cornell 1 069 to Behrens 674, and Hill 384 to Murray 198.

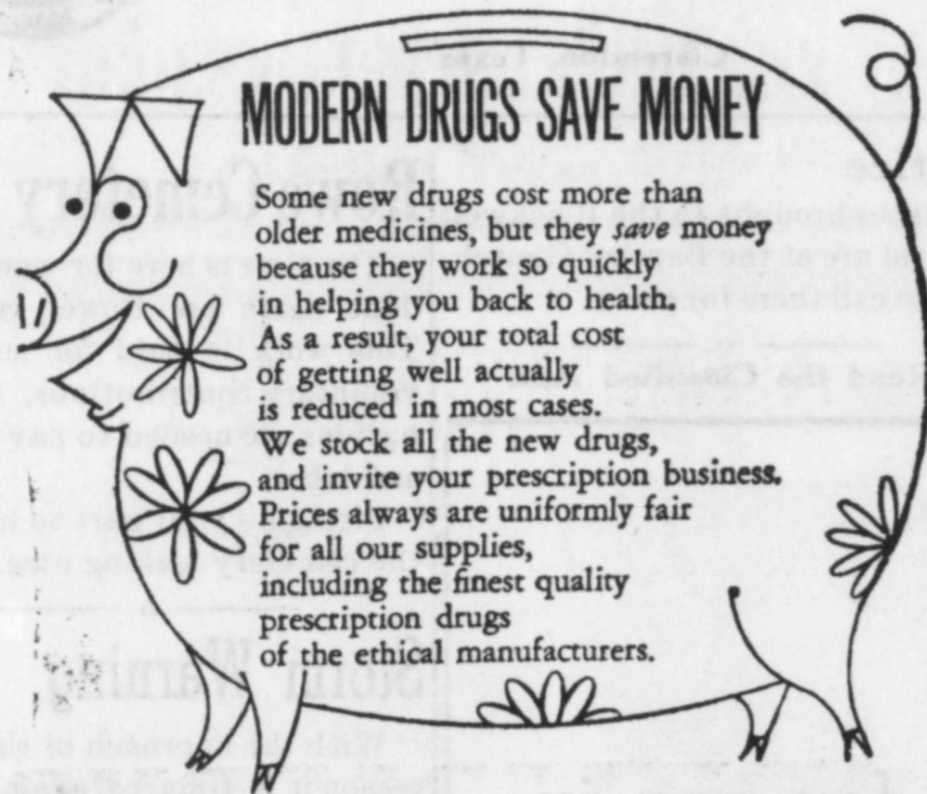

News From Our County Agent

This time of year farm people and town people are asking, "What can I use for red spiders and flies in the evergreen shrubbery?" This will also apply to ants around the house and other insects.

County Agent Flip Breedlove says that two of the best sprays to use around the house for the above purpose are Malathion and Isotox. These two sprays should be mixed exactly as the directions call for on the containers, and always remember that all sprays are considered poisonous. Always keep the wind blowing away from you, and when you get some on your skin, then use soap and water to remove.

Malathion is a good spray for the control of aphids on plants. This is especially true on alfalfa, says the county agent. If you need any information on the use of these sprays call Breedlove's office.

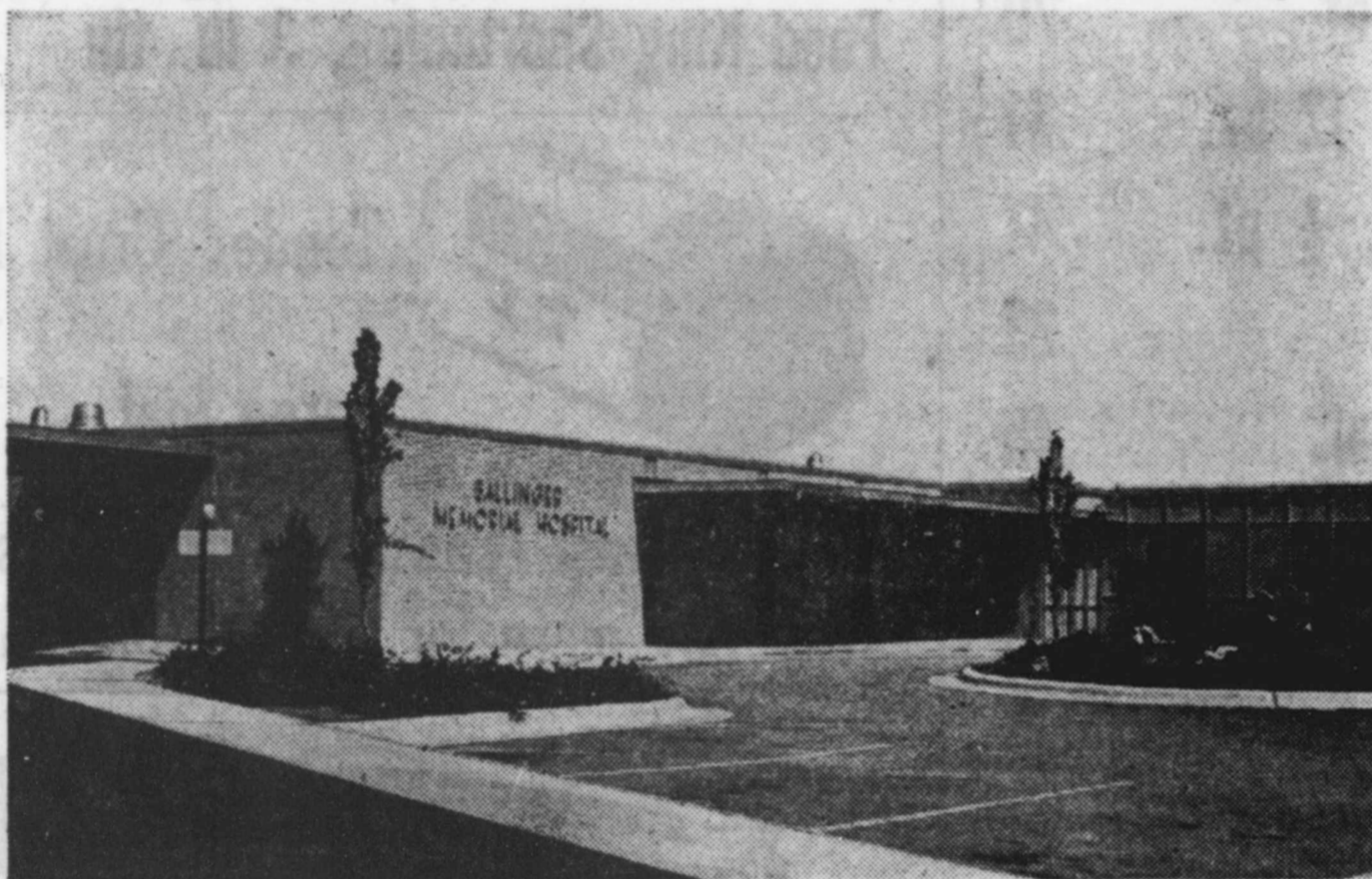

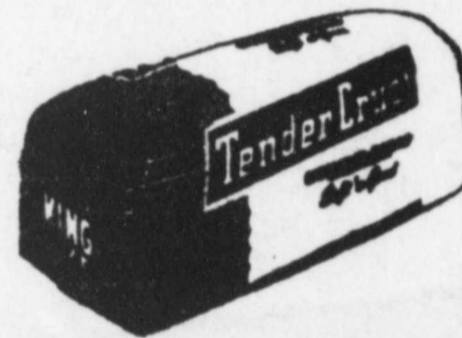
