School Bond Issue

There have been many questions asked concerning our forthcoming bond issue and the financing thereof. I would like to thank everyone for the interest which has been shown toward our school, as it in dicates that the people of Hedley community want to have the best school possible.

Some of the questions asked me are as follows:

Aren't we likely to lose our school because we are getting so few students?

In the school year 1962-63 there were 1,460 Independent and Common School Districts in Texas. Hedley had more students than 515 of these districts So it seems very unlikely that we will lose our school based on number of students alone This past year our enrollment was 169 We are now qualified through the state, to be reimbursed for the salaries for 10 teachers. We hire one teacher above this quota whose salary is paid by local tax money. We would have to drop to an ADA (Average Daily Attendance) of 106 before we would lose another teacher. (p 53 handbook)

How much increase in local taxes would we need to finance our present bonds and the new bonds if

Our present valuation is \$1,700; 000 and our present rate is \$1,50 per \$100 valuation, which brings in approximately \$25,000 In order to stay within she state law, we will have to increase our valuation to \$4,000,000 On a \$4,000. 000 valuation our rate would need to be \$1,25 to be able to pay off our bonded indebtedness and operate our school. This will be approximately a 93% increase in our over-all local taxes

Will each individual know, before the bond election, exactly what their taxes will be if the bond issue carries?

Yes. The firm of McMorries & Co. who have just recently completed a complete re-appraisal of our school district will meet with anyone wishing to see their results on August 17. The board of equalization will meet the following day August 18. This will give everyone an opportunity to see exactly how much valuation has been placed on their property. His wife preceded him in death





Time was when a cotton farmer thought he was going great if he could grow a bale to the acre. Standard weight. of a bale of lint cotton, not counting its wrappings, is 478 pounds. The average yield across the Cotton Belt rose from 254 pounds in 1945 to 448 pounds in 1960.

Dell City is 90 miles east of El Paso in the center of an irrigated cotton-growing area where the average yield is more than two bales per acre.




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This 4-H Operator Uses:



The 4-H Tractor program has trained well over a million youths to drive safely, handle the big machines and keep them in working order year around. The project is planned and supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service. In this state and five others, educational aids and awards are provided by the Humble Oil & Refining Company.

With today's big investments in farm equipment, it is vital that tractors are adequately maintained and put to maximum use, points out 4-H Club leaders. A breakdown could mean financial loss on crops.

There is always plenty to do in this project, even for the beginner. The program is divided into four sections. The first year participation acquaints the member with the tractor and safe rules for operation.

Second year members learn to operate the tractor and what it takes to keep it going. Care of battery, spark plugs, cooling system and tires is taught. Operating costs, including fuel and lubrication also are studied.

"Improving Your Skills" is the title of the third unit. This emphasizes highway safety, power take-off, brakes, power transmission, winter care and ownership costs.

The fourth year and advanced unit goes into detail on machinery care such as servicing and maintaining tillage tools, planters, harvesters and sprayers. By the time 4-H'ers have completed the fourth year, they usually have assumed responsibility for not only the farm tractors, but other machinery as well.

Over the years thousands of young 4H farmers have been recognized in various ways for doing a superior job. The program sponsor this year again will provide an expense-paid trip to the National 4H Club Congress in Chicago for the state winner. College scholarships worth \$500 each will be awarded to the top 12 members across the nation. They will be designated by the Extension Service.



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
