Greenbelt Dam

Director Clifford Johnson and Andy Anderson, president of our bank, attended the meeting of the board of directors of the Greenbelt Water Authority at Childress last Thursday night.

Funds from the sale of the \$4,100,000 Water Authority bonds will be distributed soon. The funds will be deposited in the banks of the member cities until used.

The cities of Estelline, Kirkland, Goodlett and Carey plan to use water from the Authority. It is not known yet whether enough water will be produced from Lake Creek to handle these towns until the reservoir on the river is in operation.

Bids on the pipe line construction from Hedley to Quanah were opened Tuesday. They will be canvassed by the board of directors and the contract let within the week.

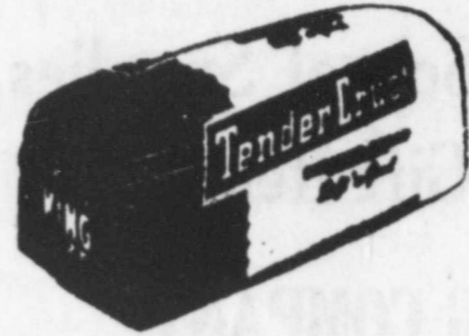
