Greenbelt Dam

R. H. Fulton of Lubbock was the apparent low bidder on the "first phase" of the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority's project for a pipe line from Lake Creek to Quanah. The bid of the Lubbock firm was \$3,041,302.20.

Jim Nichols of the engineering firm of Freese, Nichols and Endress stated that this bid was about \$200,000 under their estimate. Total estimated costs of this project were \$4,100,000 which includes various fees, land purchases, etc.

The contractor announced that the firm will complete the pipe line from Lake Creek to Quanah by June 1, 1965.

Matador Picked

We note in last Sunday's Amarillo News that Matador has been picked in a poll of District 6-B coaches to win their district again.

Coached by Hedley's Charley Johnson, the Matadors have won five consecutive district championships, including three regional crowns as well. Last year's record was ten wins to one loss.

Charley has ten lettermen returning, including seven regulars. Many of the regular linemen were lost by graduation. Main strength of the Matadors was said to be depth in the backfield and power, and the chief weakness an inexperienced line and lack of speed.

Vehicle Inspection

Austin—Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that the time has arrived for Texas motorists to have their vehicles inspected again.

Garrison said Sept. 1 marked the beginning of the 1965 vehicle inspection period as prescribed by the Public Safety Commission. As in previous years, the period will end on April 15, 1965.

"This means that between now and April 15, 1965, more than 5,200,000 Texas registered vehicles will have to be inspected at the 5,200 official inspection stations in Texas," he said.

Garrison urged motorists to have their vehicles inspected in the routine visits to garages for ordinary maintenance and repairs and thereby eliminate the necessity of having to wait in line at a later date for an inspection sticker.

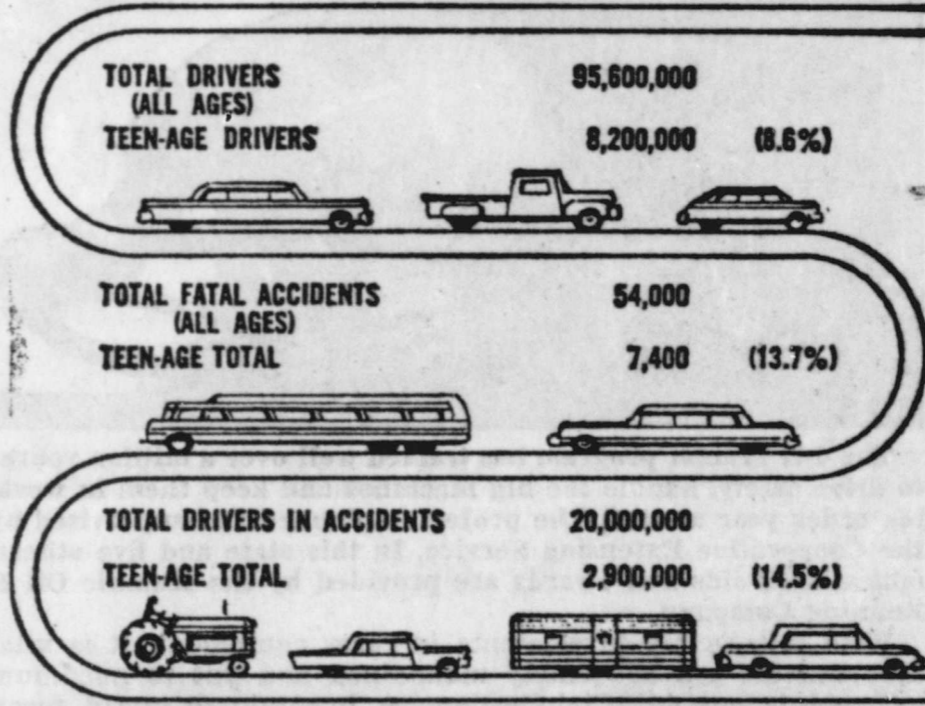

4-H drivers aim to curb teen-age accidents



Motor vehicle accidents are the leading cause of death among persons under 25. Young drivers have the highest accident and death rate of any other driver age group. These appalling statistics are the concern of 4-H boys and girls enrolled in the National 4-H Automotive program conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service.

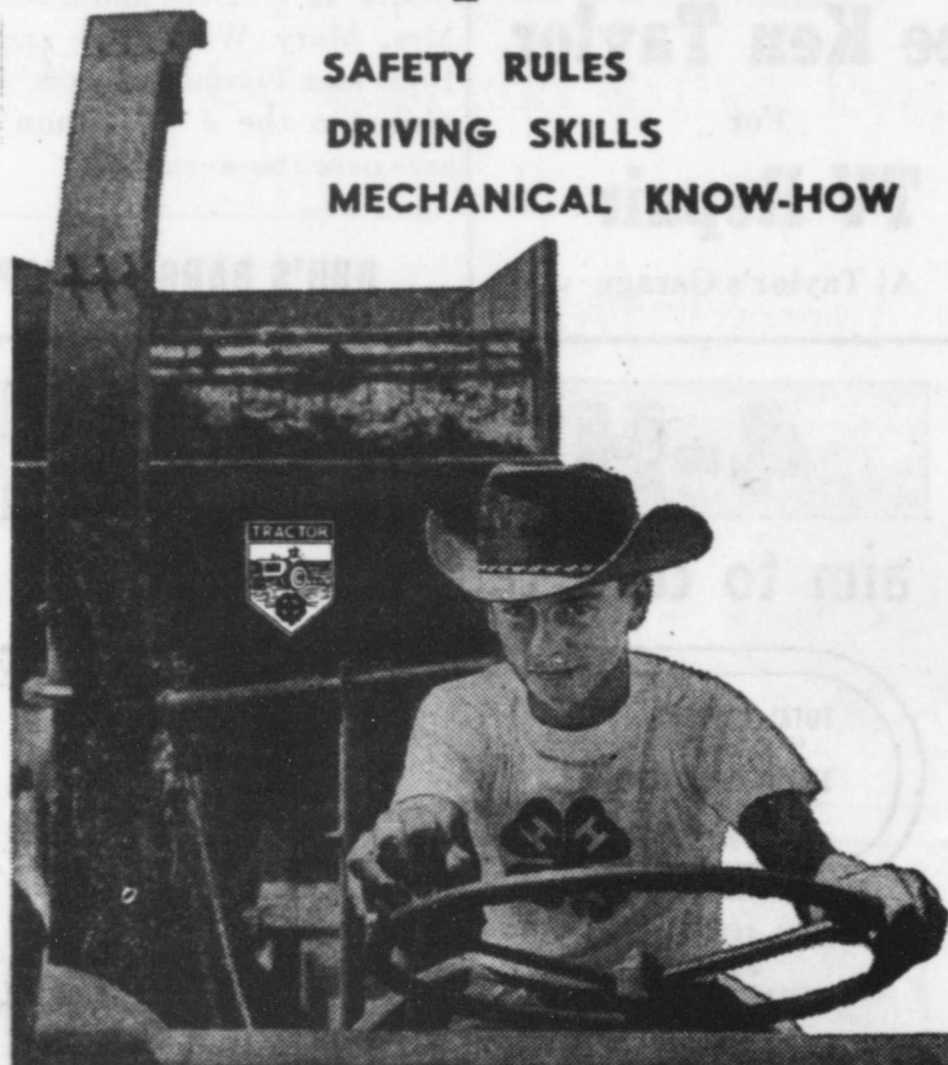

SAFETY RULES
DRIVING SKILLS
MECHANICAL KNOW-HOW

The 4-H Tractor program has trained well over a million youths to drive safely, handle the big machines and keep them in working order year around. The project is planned and supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service. In this state and five others, educational aids and awards are provided by the Humble Oil & Refining Company.

With today's big investments in farm equipment, it is vital that tractors are adequately maintained and put to maximum use, points out 4-H Club leaders. A breakdown could mean financial loss on crops.

There is always plenty to do in this project, even for the beginner. The program is divided into four sections. The first year participation acquaints the member with the tractor and safe rules for operation.

Second year members learn to operate the tractor and what it takes to keep it going. Care of battery, spark plugs, cooling system and tires is taught. Operating costs, including fuel and lubrication also are studied.

"Improving Your Skills" is the title of the third unit. This emphasizes highway safety, power take-off, brakes, power transmission, winter care and ownership costs.

The fourth year and advanced unit goes into detail on machinery care such as servicing and maintaining tillage tools, planters, harvesters and sprayers. By the time 4-H'ers have completed the fourth year, they usually have assumed responsibility for not only the farm tractors, but other machinery as well.

Over the years thousands of young 4-H farmers have been recognized in various ways for doing a superior job. The program sponsor this year again will provide an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago for the state winner. College scholarships worth \$500 each will be awarded to the top 12 members across the nation. They will be designated by the Extension Service.

New Hunting Regulations

Austin—A new regulation requiring retention of one fully feathered wing on dressed migratory game birds as a ready means of field identification has prompted some questions by Texan, according to J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator for the Parks and Wildlife Department.

"This regulation was adopted by the Parks and Wildlife Commission from the framework supplied by the U S Fish and Wildlife Service and applies to all migratory game birds," he said. "That means the average hunter will be primarily concerned about mourning doves, white-winged doves, wild geese and ducks. Likewise the new rule applies to rails, gallinules, jacksnipe and woodcock which also are migratory birds."

Phillips said the wording of the regulation speaks for itself. It is: "The retention of one fully feathered wing on dressed migratory game birds as a ready means of field identification of species is required."

Hunters are also reminded that the shooting hours for mourning dove are from noon until sunset. The daily limit is 12 and the possession limit is 24. The north zone season is from Sept. 1 to Oct 30.

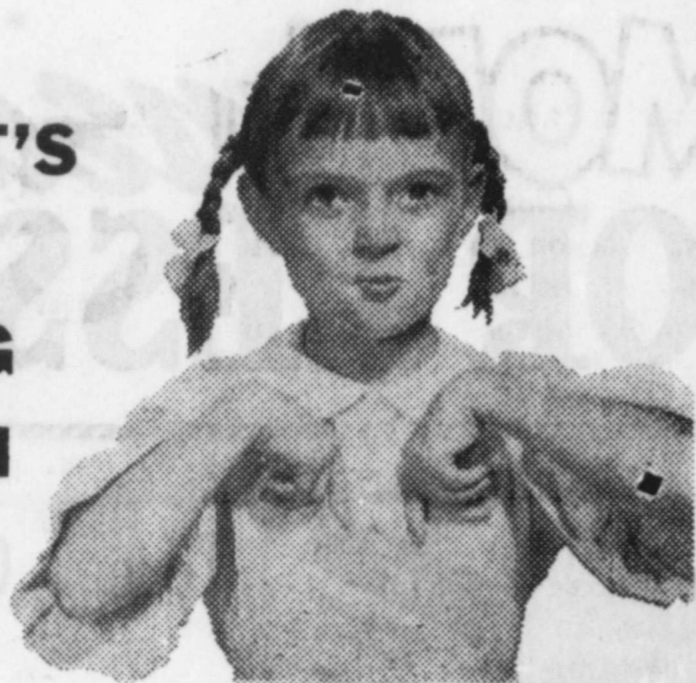

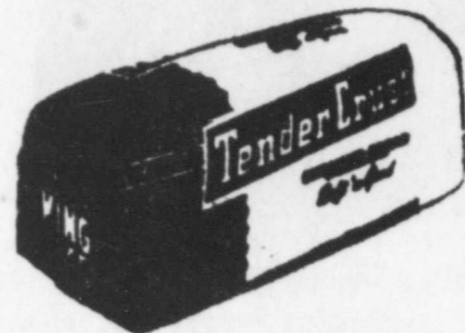
