Greenbelt Dam

The contract for the construction of the pipe line between the Lake Creek site and Quannah is scheduled to be officially signed by the Greenbelt Water Authority this Thursday. The contract is with the R. H. Fulton firm of Lubbock, and is to start in 45 days and be completed by June 1, 1965.

Also the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority revenue bonds, series of 1964, in the amount of \$4,100,000 are to be issued. Interest rate is less than 3.65%.

Hot Spaghetti-Cheese Dish

1 pkg spaghetti or macaroni
½ lb. cheese (chipped)
2 tbsp. sweet pepper

1 small can pimentoes

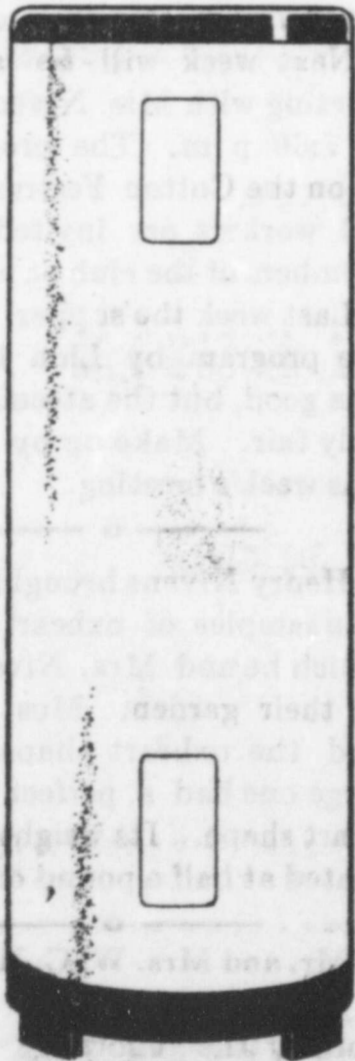

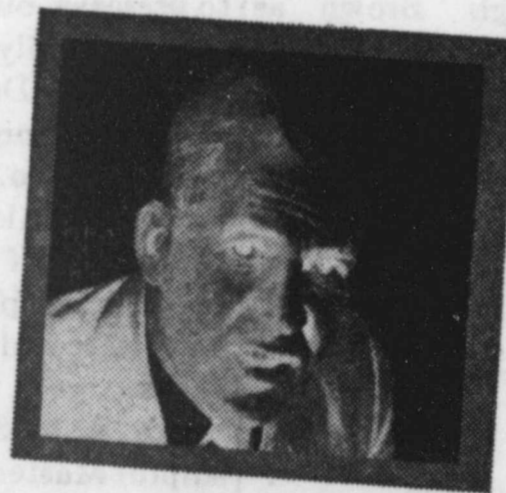

Vehicle Inspection

Austin—Col Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that the time has arrived for Texas motorists to have their vehicles inspected again.

Garrison said Sept. 1 marked the beginning of the 1965 vehicle inspection period as prescribed by the Public Safety Commission. As in previous years, the period will end on April 15, 1965.

"This means that between now and April 15, 1965, more than 5,200,000 Texas registered vehicles will have to be inspected at the 5,200 official inspection stations in Texas," he said.

Garrison urged motorists to have their vehicles inspected in the routine visits to garages for ordinary maintenance and repairs and thereby eliminate the necessity of having to wait in line at a later date for an inspection sticker.

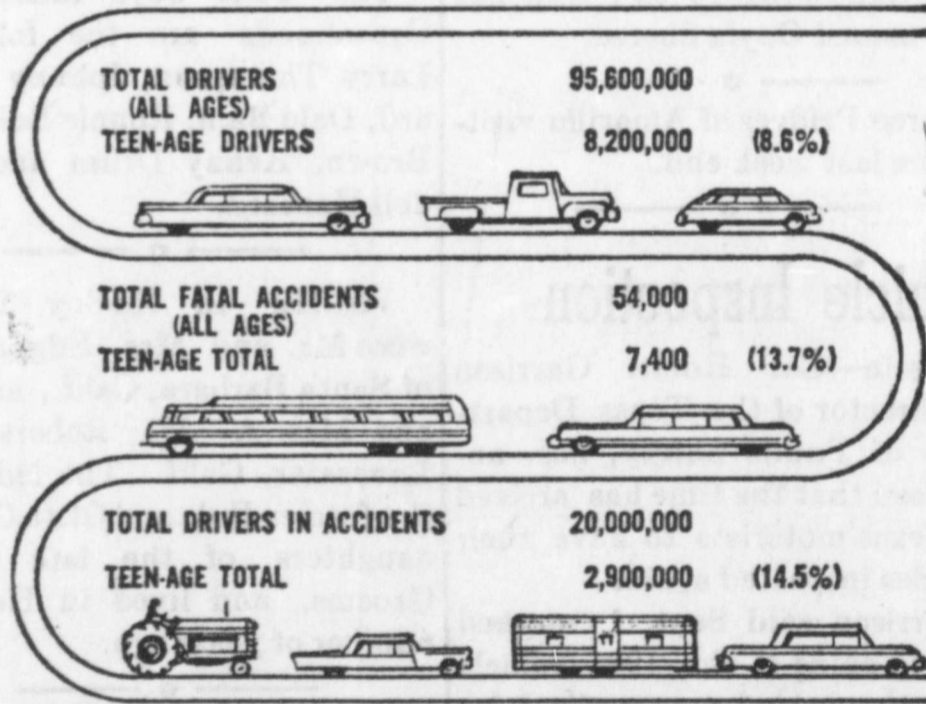

4-H drivers aim to curb teen-age accidents



Motor vehicle accidents are the leading cause of death among persons under 25. Young drivers have the highest accident and death rate of any other driver age group. These appalling statistics are the concern of 4-H boys and girls enrolled in the National 4-H Automotive program conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service.

New Hunting Regulations

Austin—A new regulation requiring retention of one fully feathered wing on dressed migratory game birds as a ready means of field identification has prompted some questions by Texan, according to J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator for the Parks and Wildlife Department.

"This regulation was adopted by the Parks and Wildlife Commission from the framework supplied by the U S Fish and Wildlife Service and applies to all migratory game birds," he said. "That means the average hunter will be primarily concerned about mourning doves, white-winged doves, wild geese and ducks. Likewise the new rule applies to rails, gallinules, jacksnipe and woodcock which also are migratory birds."

Phillips said the wording of the regulation speaks for itself. It is: "The retention of one fully feathered wing on dressed migratory game birds as a ready means of field identification of species is required."

Hunters are also reminded that the shooting hours for mourning dove are from noon until sunset. The daily limit is 12 and the pos-

session limit is 24. The north zone season is from Sept. 1 to Oct 30.

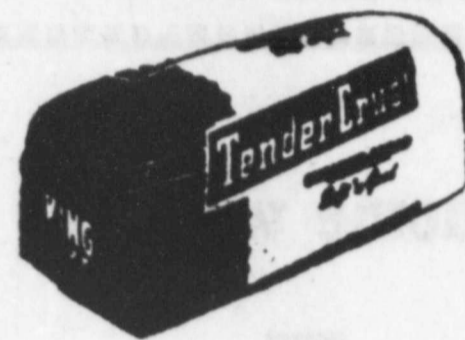
